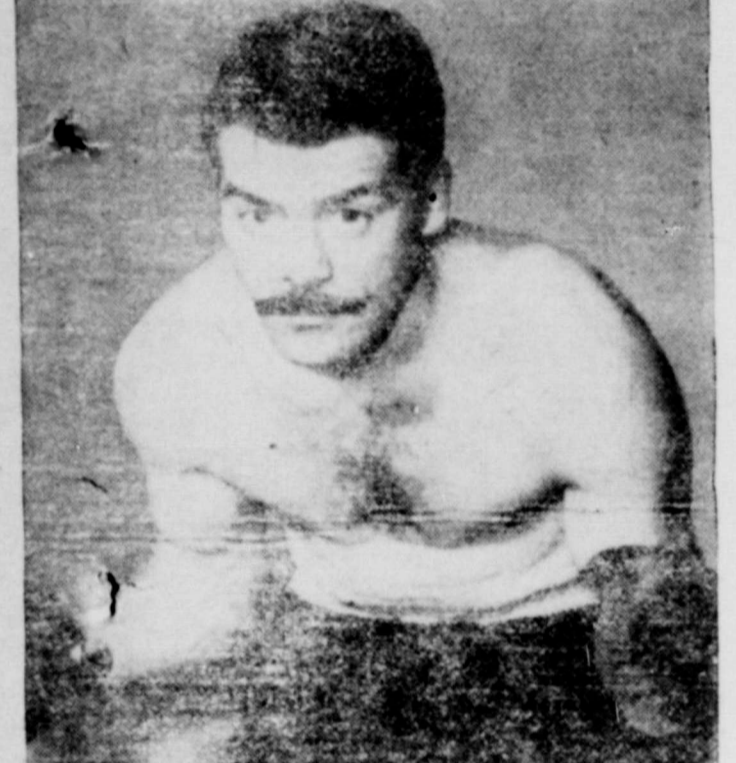

**WEST TEXAS NOTES**

The city council at Brady passed an ordinance Tuesday of last week raising gas rates in that city 12 1/2 per cent, a compromise with the Empire Southern Gas Co. The company had asked the council to give them a raise of 17 per cent. The new rates are effective immediately and will be included on the next bill sent to Brady customers. At the same time the council offered the Southwestern States Telephone Co. a raise in rates amounting to 20 per cent. Company officials stated that they would consider the raise offered.

At a special meeting of the city council at Bronte last week the city officials passed an ordinance which provides for a contract between the city and the State Highway Department for the widening of Highway 277 through the city limits of Bronte. In the deal the city will have to provide a small amount of new right-of-way. The department will reconstruct the highway through the city, a part of it being made into a four-lane job. The city will be responsible for damages which may occur from construction and maintenance of the highway.

The Winters fire chief last week issued a warning to all people who have trash to burn at their homes. He added that the department had been called to several trash fires that got out of control and did damage to nearby buildings and fences. He urges property owners to burn only when conditions are

right and to be sure they are not too close to other property. He stated that a garden hose should be attached and ready for use should the trash fire get out of control. The chief also warned those who burn to keep small children away from the flames.

Oil, gas and mineral leasing of some 30,000 acres of land in Menard and Kimbel Counties has just been completed by H. M. Naylor Oil Co. of Houston. The amount paid for the leases was not revealed, but in addition to the bonus consideration for 10-year commercial leasing, a test well will be drilled through the Ellenburger to test the Hickory sand unless commercial production is found sooner. The Hickory sand is approximately 4,250 feet deep in that area. The geologist in charge stated that gravity meters and magnetometer work on the entire acreage will start at once.

Representatives of a Fort Worth firm arrived in Colorado City last week to start the job of property revaluation and tax equalization for that city. It will be the first project of the kind ever sponsored in Mitchell County. The members of the commissioners court voted to hire the firm for county tax work at a meeting last week and the engineers will complete their job in about one year. The revaluation will include values on all industry, public utilities, railroads, oil and gas property and other real and personal property in the county.

Joe Swan, public director for Howard Payne College at Brownwood, has resigned his position effective September 1 to become director of public relations and instructor in journalism at Wisconsin State College at Superior, Wisconsin. He will assume duties with the school at the opening of the fall term. He is a graduate of Brownwood High School and is a former military writer and army newspaper editor. He was employed in public relations work in Dallas until a year ago when he returned to Brownwood and to work at Howard Payne College.

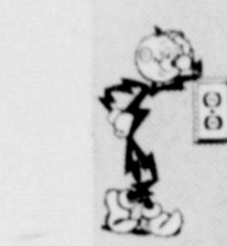
