## Farm Bureau to Seek Members October 7-12

The Runnels County Farm Bureau will launch their annual membership drive on October 7 and run through October 12. This announcement was made this week by Ben J. Ferich, county membership chairman.

The goal for the drive has been set at 571 members. The organization already has 414 new members and renewals signed up for the new year. Last year the membership was 533.

The Texas Farm Bureau is concentrating efforts now to enroll as many new members as possible in the last part of the year. The Runnels County Farm Bureau is making every effort to get all possible members by the end of the fiscal year on October 31.

The state organization has a quota of 75,000 members for 1957. Many counties have voluntarily accepted goals higher than their quotas. This could bring in 80,000 members this year, enough to make Texas the largest farm bureau state in the south. Kentucky with 77,000 in 1956 is currently tops in the region. Texas had a membership of 70,159 last year.

The farm bureau is the largest general farm organization in the world with bureaus in 48 states and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. Among the more important things the bureau does for its members and agriculture in general, is to protect the interests of the farmer and ranchman in the state and national capitals. Policies which guide the farm bureau are developed at a "grass roots" level.

Runnels County workers will be busy during the one week set aside for the campaign and every person connected with agriculture is wanted as a member.

## American Legion Sells Post Home To High Bidder

At a special meeting of the American Legion held Tuesday afternoon the bid of Eugene Loika on the Legion's property at Bruce Field was accepted.

In the sale Mr. Loika will receive the building, heating equipment, kitchen stoves, the hot water heater and numerous other items.

The Legion will retain the pool tables, game tables, air-conditioners, furniture and radio. No decision was made at the meeting Tuesday in regard to what they will do with the equipment. A committee has been named to consider the renting of a place in town to which it could be moved and a small club established. A deal was also being considered to move into a building with the Jaycees for operation of a joint club. Bids will also be welcomed on any of the equipment and furniture and it may be sold by the piece.

Pool tables were bought several years ago and are in bad condition. New rubber rails and coverings would be necessary before they could be used for games. The Legionnaires have operated their place at Bruce Field for more than ten years and have provided quarters for many outside meetings and for family reunions during summer months. They have a large number of requests for reservations for such meetings in 1958 and these will be turned over to the new owner.

Members of the local post felt that the property was too far from town for their use and it was impossible to move the building without tearing it down.

## Directors Talk Christmas Seal Sale At Meeting

Approximately 50 officers and directors attended the second quarterly meeting of the Runnels County Tuberculosis Association September 17 at the Acapulco Cafe.

Dr. John E. Green, Jr., president, directed the business and also reported on the state meeting held in Austin. He announced that the next state meeting would be held in March 1958. Mrs. Seth McLarty, executive secretary, reported on meetings held in August for the purpose of electing a new secretary. Mrs. Willard Renfro resigned as secretary and Mrs. McLarty was elected to fill the vacancy.

The treasurer's report is as follows: after the expense of the coming seal sale, office and salaries, X-ray finding and 18¢ paid to Texas Tuberculosis Association, there was a balance of \$1,091.74 on hand.

Homer Hudgins of Winters, seal sale chairman for the county, gave brief remarks on the plans for handling the coming seal sale. Others on the seal sale committee are: R. E. Mrs. Aurelia Webb, chairman of the constitution and by-laws committee, reported that the committee had revised the constitution and a copy would be sent to each member before the next quarterly meeting in January.

Dr. Green introduced the two guest speakers, W. C. Mitchell, vocational rehabilitation representative for the San Angelo district, who stated ways the county could help the physically handicapped TB patient in getting vocational rehabilitation so that he may be able to provide for himself and his family, after he is dismissed from the hospital.

Seth Henderson, vocational rehabilitation counselor at McKnight, told of how patients may rehabilitate their lives by learning vocations. He also told of the Christmas Gift Shop at McKnight State Hospital for the more than 500 patients and their families, and suggested items for patients such as soap, pajamas, tooth paste, and other toilet articles as gifts to patients who are unable to purchase these necessities.

Mr. Henderson stated that 45 patients have completed some phase of vocational education at McKnight, and that he was always ready to help patients who have a reasonable chance of applying themselves. He said 84% of the patients there are in the advanced stage of the disease.

## Paying of Taxes To Start Tuesday At Three Offices

Starting next Tuesday, October 1, it will be tax paying time again. Three local offices will be ready to start accepting payments on the current rolls at that time.

At the court house the county tax collector will be ready to issue receipts for state and county taxes and will offer a three per cent discount during October. Discounts for the remainder of the year will be 2 per cent in November, 1 per cent in December and nothing if paid after December 31. February 1 is the final date for all tax payments before they become delinquent.

The school board office, located on Hutchings Avenue, next door to the chamber of commerce office, has their receipts ready and will start accepting payments Tuesday morning.

Bound receipts were received last week by the city and they will be ready for those who wish to pay early. Both the city and school do not offer discounts for early payments.

Property owners will be paying regular taxes which have a combined rate of \$4.80 on the \$100. The county rate is 78 cents, the state 42 cents, the school \$1.50 and the city \$2.10. In addition those who live in road district No. 3 will be paying an additional 20 cents for the retirement of bonds. For those who live in Ballinger, the total tax rate for this year will be \$5.00 on the \$100 rendered for tax purposes.

## Check All Heaters Before Cold Weather

Now is the time for homeowners to have their gas heating equipment inspected and adjusted for winter use, it was pointed out today by H. E. Lawson, Lone Star Gas Company manager. He urged people not to depend on the first cold day to remind them to call for such service.

"Heating service companies and Lone Star," he said, "receive hundreds of calls for service within a period of a few hours on the day cold weather makes its first appearance. This means a considerable delay in filling many individual service orders."

He suggested that users of gas floor furnaces, wall heaters, unit heaters, central heating plants and other gas heating equipment arrange now to have them inspected.

### Boy Scout Fund Campaign Oct. 8 In Local Areas

Ballinger boy scout leaders have set the date for their annual finance campaign for October 8. A full crew of workers is being secured and within a few days the chairman will be announced and all plans completed for the 1957 drive.

While no goal has been set for the Ballinger workers, the budget for the Concho Valley Council for the next year will be \$92,214 which is slightly higher than last year. Increased costs have called for more money for leadership training, advancement, camping, health and safety, campaign expense, utilities, insurance and other expenses. It is noted that salaries in the council will be less next year than for the present year.

### General Rainfall In Area Saturday Is Great Benefit

General rains fell over a wide area of Texas Saturday with Runnels County getting from one-half to four inches. Heaviest reports came from the Norton area where rain started Saturday afternoon and fell fairly slow until 11 o'clock that night.

Ranges and fields were greatly benefited by the rain which came on the heels of an earlier rain this month to make from three to five inches over the county.

Sunday all major streams were running with some up several feet. Most surface ponds and lakes received considerable water from the rain Saturday but few were filled.

Cotton picking in the county will soon be underway with the late cotton beginning to open. Most estimates still place the 1957 crop at around 25,000 bales, with some sections having the best crops since 1949.

Wind was high for a short time Saturday but no damage was reported.

The rain Saturday came from the north with the first norther of the year blowing in to drop the temperature considerably. Air-conditioners were shut off and a few reported the lighting of heaters Sunday night.

Tonight the junior team will go to Lake View to meet the Little Indians. This is likely to be their hardest game so far this season. The B team will also play an early game at Lake View starting at about 6:30.

Saturday night the Bearcats B team will go to Winters to meet the B Blizzards.
