## Salvation Army Fund Campaign Next Week

Claude Mansell, chairman of the local service unit of the Salvation Army, has announced the annual fund campaign to begin next Wednesday, November 20.

Members of the committee had a meeting Tuesday at the chamber of commerce and at that time Joe Forman, treasurer, gave a report of expenditures for the past twelve months. This report showed that about 200 persons have been given emergency assistance during the year. This help included groceries, fuel, medicine, optical and dental aid and lodging, meals and transportation for some transient families.

At the meeting Tuesday Jack Moore was named fund chairman and he has accepted and is now in process of organizing for the drive. He announced Wednesday that approximately 80 people would be used this

year to make the campaign a success. He stated that the people of Ballinger have been able to see the work of the Salvation Army time and time again. He asks for generous support of the campaign from all the people and expects the workers to be able to go over the top with their effort to raise \$1,500. The campaign will begin Wednesday with a breakfast at 7 a. m. at the Acapulco Cafe for all workers.

Mansell points out that there is no "red tape" to Salvation Army work in Ballinger. All decisions as to who will be helped and the amount of assistance is left to the local committee. Committee members are: Claude Mansell, Joe Forman, W. C. Witt, E. B. Underwood, Clifford Cook, C. A. Bissett, Mrs. Virginia Parrish and Foy Farmer. Also serving with the committee are John Agnew at Miles and Joe Dierschke at Rowena.

## Christmas Seal Sale Is Launched Next Week

Every family in Runnels County should get an envelope containing Christmas seals this week as Runnels County Tuberculosis Association is launching their annual Christmas seal sale.

Homey Hudgins of Winters is county chairman.

Here are some of the facts he would like you to know before you hesitate in mailing your contribution for the seals. The sale of these seals would mean finding all active, contagious cases so they could be cured. It would mean through education and rehabilitation of all former patients in order to help prevent relapse. It would mean safeguarding the health of those infected and that means approximately one-third of the nation, to prevent them from breaking down with the active disease. In addition to its local program of case finding the association joins with the 3,000 other TB associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association in a program of medical research. Much progress has been made but the work must go on. Moreover, however, the association needs the support of every citizen in its efforts to protect our home from TB.

Once known as the White Plague, TB killed 200 out of every one hundred thousand Americans in 1900. In 1955 the death rate was less than ten per hundred thousand. It is estimated that one-third of the nation is infected with the germ that causes TB.

Through the years Christmas seals have paid for vital research, education, and other demonstrative programs.

The Runnels County Tuberculosis Association says there are three patients in Carlsbad State Hospital for treatment. They are no danger to us because they know they have TB and they will be treated until it's safe for them to come back into the community. But there are others who have TB and are not under treatment. These people must be found for their own safety as well as for our protection. When we buy Christmas seals we help find them.

"You will receive a letter containing Christmas seals from the Runnels County Association," says Mr. Hudgins. "Answer your letter and send in your contribution today."

### FEW FIRMS OBSERVE HOLIDAY ON MONDAY

## Rain Damaging Cotton Of Area Ranges Helped

Rain and continued drizzling weather is taking a heavy toll on Runnels County cotton. C. T. Parker, county farm agent, said Tuesday that each day was lowering the grade and making it harder for farmers to gather the cotton already for harvest.

Reports showed most pickers entering this area were moving on because of the local condition of fields and the delay here because of wet ground. Local cotton men stated that many farmers were planning to use strippers but that it would require considerable time and good weather before strippers could be taken into the boggy fields.

Mr. Parker added that while cotton was being damaged, small grain and ranges were being benefited by the rain. He told of some ranchmen who have been building fences that stated they did not find dry dirt in deep foot-holes. Most farmers and ranchmen agree that this is the best winter season for many years and will go a long way towards making a crop in 1958.

Runnels County is still expected to produce around 20,000 bales of cotton but farmers will lose heavy because of the lower grade caused by wet weather.

## Local Hunters Ready To Open Deer Season

Ballinger hunters started leaving today for the Hill Country and other places where they have hunting leases. Most of the groups plan to be away for a week or more and some may make the second trip to their leases if they fail to get their limit.

Some of the Ballinger hunters are on leases where they have hunted for a number of years. For the past two weeks local people have been visiting their leases, putting up tents or getting other shelter ready for use. They report the ranges in the best condition in a number of years and also say that deer are plentiful and are fat and healthy.

A party that has hunted together for many years is composed of R. F. Davis and his sons, Bob and Charles Davis of Longview; K. V. Northington, Ballinger; K. V. Northington Jr. of San Angelo; Bob Northington of Midland and Johnny Logan of San Angelo. They are on the August Jordan Ranch southeast of Mason where they have been hunting for the past 12 years. This group left today and plans to return home November 22.

The 9-Point Hunting Club left this week-end for Schleicher County and will hunt on the Bob Sykes Ranch between Christoval and Eldorado. This will be their second year on this ranch where summer rains have put ranges in fine condition and deer are reported plentiful. Members of the club include W. O. Wallace, D. G. Posey, E. C. Grindstaff, J. G. Tuckey, Carl Murman, J. E. Dankworth, M. A. Poy, E. T. Branham Jr., Guy Swann and Clyde Gabbert.

A party hunting south of Junction in Kimble County near Segovia is composed of Dr. Z. I. Hale, E. B. Underwood, Bill Hale, Midland; Percy and M. L. Underwood, Fort Worth and Dr. Henry McCright, Winters. This group hunted on the above lease last year and had excellent luck. They visited their lease recently and reported it was in fine condition.

A party composed of C. A. Bissett, Derward Bissett, T. A. Parrish, J. T. Gregory, Dr. Chas. F. Bailey, Mark Davis, Lubbock; J. Carson, Midland and James Gregory of San Angelo will leave Friday for their lease in Schleicher County. They will be on the Howard Derrick Ranch southwest of Menard. This is a new lease for this party and on a recent trip of inspection they found good prospects. Members of the party were there last week to pitch tents and get the camp ready for use.

Returning to a lease in San Saba County for the eighth time will be a party composed of C. E. Maedgen, Arthur Giesecke, Alvin Holbrook, Vernon Webb, Marvin Williams of Lubbock and Oma McGabe of Big Spring. This group has an old school bus at the camp site which is heated and used as a dining room and kitchen. They also have sleeping quarters and other conveniences.

A Ballinger party composed of J. L. Candler, Chas. Webb, Morris Stokes, Tommy McEntire and Lee Parker of Talpa will return to their same lease this year. It is located near Harper in Kimble County. Members of the party were there last week to get the camp set up and ready and stated that they saw a number of nice bucks and that ranges were in excellent condition. The group will leave here Friday morning and will be ready for the opening of the season Saturday morning.

Leaving Friday for Kendall County below Fredericksburg was a party composed of Albert Lippe, Gus Behnke, Louis James and son and Bill Ahrens. They will be on a lease which they had for the opening of the season last year. They have a camp house on the ranch which they will use on their stay. On a recent trip to the lease the Ballinger hunters found plenty of deer and good ranges.

A party will leave here tomorrow (Friday) for the Andy Bode Ranch in Val Verde County where they have a hunting lease for this season. In the group will be Doyle St. John, George Newby, R. E. Bruce, Earl Barr and Lloyd Herring. They will set up a comfortable camp from which to hunt and expect to bag their limit this year on the lease which is in excellent condition.

Going back to their same lease in Menard County will be a party composed of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Hale and Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Alcorn of Talpa, Major and Mrs. Ralph Routh of Abilene, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Hale of Miles and Play Brevard of Ballinger. Mrs. Brevard will not get to go for the opening of the season but plans a trip later this year.

A local hunting party will leave Friday for their lease near Fredericksburg where they have hunted for the past three years. They will arrive Friday in time to set up camp and be ready for the opening of the season Saturday morning. In the group are Bill Goetz, Jack Carwell, Willie Tipton, Emil Vorbeck and Gary Lynn Goetz.

J. V. Smith and John Cameron will be joined in Ballinger Friday by Vernon Smith of Snyder and Bennie Ray Thetford of San Angelo for their annual hunting trip to Harper.

## Nazarene Church Jubilee Year To Begin On Dec. 31

Rev. Joe Pennington, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, announces that he and his congregation are looking forward to the 1958 golden anniversary year of the Church of the Nazarene. Dr. S. T. Ludwig, general church secretary, has outlined a series of simultaneous events in which every church of the denomination will participate.

Pastors of all Nazarene churches are now planning for individual or union watch services on December 31 which will usher in the jubilee year. Other simultaneous services in which all churches around the world will take part are: January 5—Worship service marking the start of the anniversary year.

April 6—Easter offering for world missions, goal is \$1,000,000. November 23—Thanksgiving offering for world missions, goal is \$1,000,000.

Official birthday of the Church of the Nazarene was October 13, 1908 at Pilot Point, Texas when a group of smaller churches in the east, west and south formally united. Sharing a belief in the Wesleyan doctrine of entire sanctification, or heart purity, the original 228 churches and 10,000 members have increased in 50 years to 4,500 churches with approximately 300,000 members.

## New Locations Near Ballinger Made This Week

Location of two new oil well tests in the Ballinger area was announced this week. Ambassador Oil Corp. No. 1 Roy A. Miller, 11 miles southeast of Rowena, is slated for a 4,500 foot test. Work is due to be started soon in a new area.

George Baumgart of San Angelo has staked the No. 1-H Giesecke Jr., four miles southwest of Ballinger. It is due to be drilled to 4,000 feet with rotary equipment.

Murphy Corp. of Denver has completed their No. 1-A W. M. Ford, four miles west of Winters in the Fennell (King) field. It flowed 96.6 barrels of oil in 12 hours through perforations between 2,790-2,800 feet.

A Gardner sand discovery well is indicated three miles north of Winters. It is Stanley, Wynne and Grimm of Abilene No. 1-T. V. Jennings. On a drillstem test between 4,320-44 feet recovery was 1.853 feet of free oil. Casing has been set and operator was waiting on weather to complete.

Geochemical Surveys of Abilene has spotted their No. 2-J. R. Harris, two miles northwest of Hatchel in the Ballinger, Northwest field. The test is slated for a 4,300 foot test.

A Sanford (Fry) field location was staked one mile east of Wingate by Midwest Oil Corp. of Fort Worth to be their No. 2-A. J. Spann. The proposed depth is listed at 4,500 feet in the application.

Dan Johnston, field representative of the Salvation Army, was here this week helping to organize the annual fund campaign.

The Ballinger Ministerial Alliance has announced plans for the annual Thanksgiving service for Ballinger. They will follow the usual custom used here in presenting the service at 7:30 on Wednesday evening.

This year the service will be held at the First Baptist Church with Rev. O. D. Carpenter, pastor of the Seventh Street Baptist Church bringing the message. Bob Allford, Minister of Music at the First Baptist Church, will have charge of the music.

A complete program will be arranged within a short time and announced. This will include ministers of the town who are members of the Alliance.

Last year the attendance at the service was the best in many years and another special effort will be made to have a full house and all people in this immediate area are invited to attend.

Plans were made for the traditional "End of the Football Season" dance with the date to be either November 16 or 23, depending upon when an orchestra can be secured. Announcement will be made at school on the exact date. Only members of Teen Haven will be eligible to attend this special event and membership cards will be presented for admission.

## Sewer Disposal Plant To Be Completed Here

The Ballinger City Commission was in session Tuesday afternoon to take up a number of pressing matters.

A letter from the State Health Department has given instructions to the city to make certain improvements to the disposal plant by March 1. Back when World War II, certain materials were hard to get and the state department gave permission to put the plant in use before it was properly finished. Several times since then they have asked for the completion of the plant to make needed corrections.

Now they set the time limit as March 1, 1958 for the final work to be done. The city commission Tuesday hired J. L. Leach of Coleman to draw plans for a chlorinator and circulating basin along with a few other items to bring the plant to specifications of the state. As soon as these plans are completed they will be submitted to the state for approval and the work started.

Other work attended at the meeting of the commission Tuesday included the approving of monthly bills. Two new street lights were approved after they were recommended by the city police. One will be installed at the corner of Park Avenue and Fifth Street and the other at the corner of Bonhall and Ninth Street.

The commission approved the purchase of a portable megaphone to be used by the police and fire department. The need for such an instrument was felt during the recent flood and it will be provided for future use.

The city attorney has drawn a contract between the city and Bob Dickinson for the operation of the airport. The contract will be submitted to the Civil Aeronautics Association and if approved will be signed by the city officials and Mr. Dickinson.

As soon as the city commission authorized the advertisement of bids for a new police car.

## Tart Cherry Sauce Tops Dessert Sweets



If we say "cherries" and you think of "pie," you'd score one hundred percent. But we'd give you an extra gold star if you thought of pound cake, Bavarian cream, custard or ice cream with cherry topping.

That gold star would be for knowing that canned tart red cherries blended into a smooth sauce can add the "spice and everything nice" to a humdrum week-night dessert for the family, or the spark of glamour to a snack for unexpected company.

A special favorite with company is both inexpensive and easy to make. Just layer the tart red cherry sauce between layers of thick vanilla pudding into tall parfait glasses. Top with more of the cherries.

As for the sauce, it's made by simply adding sugar and cornstarch to the cherry liquid from a pound can of water-packed cherries in a saucepan, heating, then combined with cherries and a spoonful of brandy flavoring.

The sauce can be stored in the refrigerator for weeks. If it clouds over, due to the thickening agent, simply heat and it's ready to serve warm and clear.

### Red Cherry Sauce

- 1 can (1 pound) red sour pitted cherries (water pack)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon brandy flavoring, optional
- 1/4 teaspoon red food coloring

Combine sugar, cornstarch, salt and cinnamon in a saucepan. Stir in cherry liquid and water. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil; boil 1/2 minute. Remove from heat; add grated lemon rind, brandy flavoring, red food coloring and cherries. Serve warm or cooled. YIELD: 2 1/2 cups.

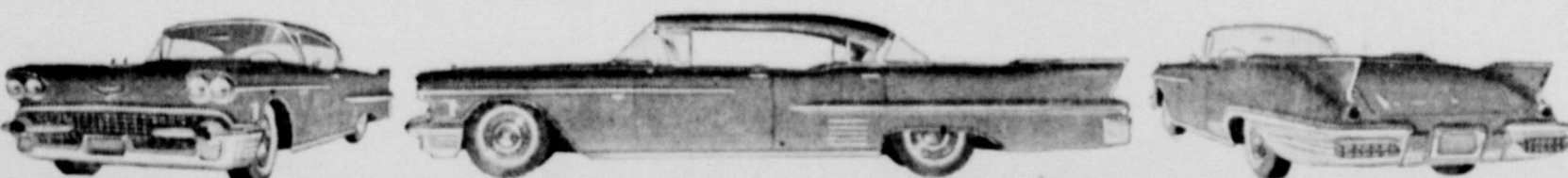

## Bearcats Finish Season With Win Over Winters

The Ballinger Bearcats wound up their 1958 season with a win over the Winters Blizzards Friday night by a score of 20 to 13. They had to come from behind to win and for a time it looked as though the Blizzards were ready to stage an upset and hand the Bearcats a stiff whipping.

Winters took the ball on the kick-off to open the game and marched downfield with fine running by Fred Austin and Mack Young to the 1 yard line from where Charles Curry carried over. Young attempted the extra point but Delbert Wiley was through to block.

Ballinger went good until they fumbled downfield and Winters came back with another drive to score their second and final touchdown. A pass from Curry to Matthias was the final pay-off and Young booted the extra point

to put the Blizzards out front 13 to 0.

The Bearcat offense got into high-gear with the red-shirted boys marching downfield to the 2 yard-line from where Jerry Candler went across for the first score. Lyle Young missed the try for the extra point.

Winters got off a wobbly punt that went out of bounds on their own 41-yard line. On the first play, Candler went around right end for the entire distance and the second Bearcat score. Good blocking was provided by the Bearcats on the beautiful run. Young kicked the ball through the uprights to tie the score at 13-13.

Ballinger took the kick-off to start the second half and moved 51 yards in 13 plays to go ahead in the ball game. Candler again went wide to his right to dive across the goal

line for the score. Young in place-kick formation took the ball and passed to Wesley Stokes in the end zone for the extra point.

This was all the scoring for the evening, however, both clubs moved the ball well and were in scoring position. Late in the ball game Winters was held on downs deep in Bearcat territory where the ball went over a five-yard penalty against the Bearcats pushed them back to their own 4-yard but they were able to run out the clock to the end of the game.

Ballinger made 19 first downs to 17 for the Blizzards. In rushing the Bearcats piled up 270 while the Blizzards made 201. Ballinger completed no passes while the Bearcats had four for 51 yards. The Bearcats lost three fumbles while Winters lost none. Penalties against the Bearcats amounted to 20 yards and against the Blizzards 30 yards. There was not a 15-yard penalty assessed against either team for the entire game.

Jerry Candler, star half-back for the Bearcats, went out of

the game in the fourth quarter with a broken bone near his ankle. The accident occurred when he was tackled on the side-line and rolled into some metal chairs in which dads were seated.

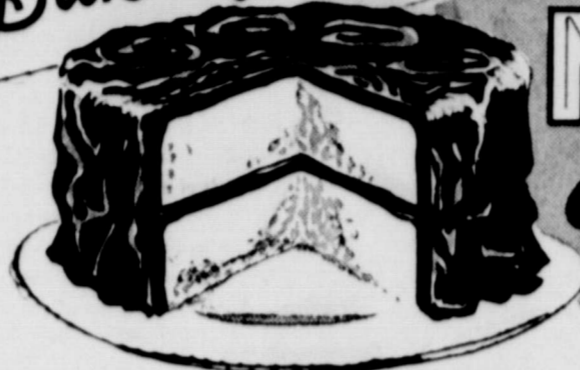

### Mrs. Bryan Dickson Reviews For Shakespeare Club

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### SOCIAL SECURITY REPORTS DUE AT END OF THE YEAR

As the end of the year draws near, it is time for all Social Security beneficiaries to decide if they are required by the law to make an earnings report for the year, said Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office.

Actually, this decision is quite easy to make. If the beneficiary was under age 72 during any part of the year, and had earnings of \$1200.01 or more during the year, then he must make a report to the Social Security Administration whether or not he files a federal income tax return. If the beneficiary was over age 72 during the entire year, or if his earnings were \$1200 or less, then no report should be sent to the Social Security Administration.

For the purpose of the report, earnings include wages, salary, and, if the person is self-employed, the net profit from his business. Even earnings not covered by Social Security must be counted, Ellington said. Earnings do not include income from rent, pensions, interest, dividends, Social Security benefits, or annuities of any kind.

Neil Tarvin, the Field Representative from the San Angelo office will be in Ballinger, Wednesday, November 20, in the County Office Building from 9:30 to 2:00 o'clock to assist anyone with problems concerning social security.

Ellington invited any beneficiary who has a question about annual reporting to ask his office for a copy of Booklet 23, "How Earnings Affect Social Security Benefit Payments."

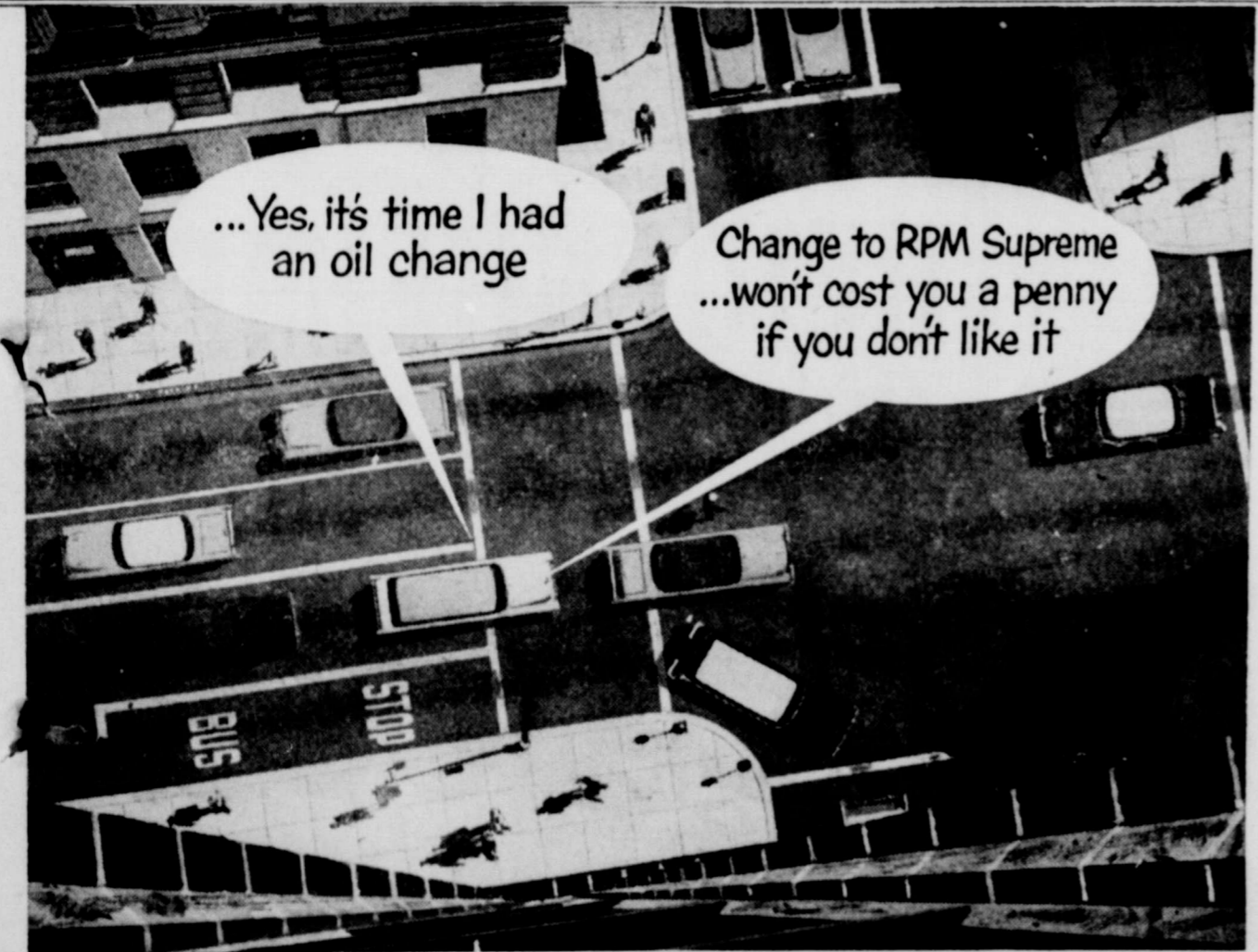
