Annual Fat Stock Show Date Set for January 17

The agriculture committee of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and representatives of schools at Ballinger, Miles, Norton and Rowena met here Monday night to make plans for the annual livestock show.

The show was set for January 18, 1958 and will be held again at the hangar at Bruce Field. Prior to the date, pens will be arranged in the building and a judging arena built to take care of all the work of the judges during the one day show.

The usual departments will be operated again this year and will include fat calves, sheep, swine and the division for capons, rabbits and broilers. Broilers were added this year for the first time in the Ballinger show.

Foy Farmer is chairman of the agriculture committee for the chamber of commerce. The chamber is sponsoring the show and will raise the premium money to take care of the prizes and also other expenses of the show.

This year, as was the case last year, 4-H club boys and members of FFA chapters in Ballinger, Miles, Rowena and Norton school districts will take part in the annual show. Officials of the show will select judges within a short time. One has already been secured and others have been invited but have not accepted.

General superintendents for the 1958 show will be Jack Fry and Earl Barr. Superintendents of the capon division are Robert Herring and Fred Spreen; the sheep division, Albert Spreen and B. J. Condra; capons, rabbits and broilers, F. A. Tidmore. No announcement has been made of a superintendent for the swine division.

On November 30, the sheep and hogs in the commercial feeding project will be weighed in at Bruce Field and the fattening period started. Calves were weighed in several weeks ago. The commercial show and contest will be closed at some date in March which will be announced soon.

Jaycee Minstrel Set December 6; Tickets On Sale

Ballinger Jaycees met Monday night at Loftin's Cafe for their regular business session and dinner. Most of the evening was devoted to making plans for the minstrel show which will be staged on the night of December 6 in the high school auditorium.

Tickets for the show have been printed and Monday night were placed with each member of the organization for advance sales. The price will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. There will be no reserve seats and first come will get the best seats.

Plans are well perfected for the minstrel. A cast of comedians has been selected who are now rehearsing the gags which will make up the program of laughter. Song numbers have been assigned to the vocal artists and these are being supported with a large chorus of ladies and young women.

In addition, a number of outstanding vaudeville acts from a West Texas college will be presented to make up a full two-hour program of pleasing entertainment. The show will be with an old-time candy sale with some elaborate prizes to those purchasing the bags of candy.

Money made from the minstrel will go into the regular fund of the organization and will be used to carry on the local civic projects to be undertaken by the club during the ensuing year. In past years the Jaycees have successfully put over a large number of local projects including the observance of Ballinger's birthday anniversary for the past two years.

Salvation Army Workers Seek Funds For 1958

The annual fund campaign for the Salvation Army was launched here Wednesday morning. Jack Moore, fund chairman, organized the workers and contact cards were prepared and given to the solicitors at a kick-off breakfast Wednesday morning at the Acapulco Cafe.

The officials of the local unit of the Salvation Army have set a goal of \$1,500 for this year. This is the same amount as was raised in 1956 and has provided funds for operations during the entire year.

Local officials in their annual report showed that some 200 local families had been given aid during the year and many migrants passing through Ballinger were provided with meals, lodging and gasoline for continuing their trips.

Each year a fund campaign is staged here with part of the money going to the state office and the rest remaining in the local chapter. This local fund is administered by local men and no red tape is attached to the spending of the money.

Ballinger people have been very generous to the Salvation Army in the past years and the same response is expected again this year. Workers will be on the job all this week until they make contact with all their prospects. Business firm managers and individuals called on by the workers are asked to make their contributions as generous and as quickly as possible so the fund can be raised with the least loss of time to the workers.

At the breakfast Claude Mansell, unit chairman, presided for a brief business session after the invocation by Dr. LeRay Fowler.

Jack Moore, campaign chairman, complimented Claude R. Stone Jr., employee division chairman, and Levy Lee, rural division chairman, for their division in the campaign. He announced that workers for the city campaign were being supplied by the Civic-Garden Club, Thirty-Six Club, Beta Sigma Phi, Shakespeare Club, Ballinger Jaycees, Ballinger Rotary Club and Ballinger Lions Club. Campaign chairmen for the following communities have been announced: Maverick, Freddie Tidmore; Norton, Bud Inman; Miles, Tom B. Davis; Rowena, Joe Dierschke.

Jerry Bell Makes Red Raiders Move With Passing Arm

Horatio Alger probably wouldn't approve of Jerry Bell's gambling, but otherwise Texas Tech's quarterback fits well the rags-to-riches theme.

In pre-season estimates, Bell figured as either third or fourth string quarterback, no higher. Now, he's the chief offensive weapon for the Red Raiders, who face the University of Arkansas in Little Rock Saturday afternoon.

Injuries to two of Tech's quarterbacks guaranteed Bell a second string berth. His ability to move the team against the Texas Aggies in the season's second game guaranteed him the final promotion.

Bell, a Ballinger High School product, accounted for all 26 of Tech's points—scoring 14, passing for 12—as Tech averaged last year's loss by edging Hardin-Simmons 26-21 Saturday.

But in the same contest Bell twice demonstrated the trait Horatio Alger heroes abhor. He gambled like he was riding down the Mississippi in a riverboat.

In one punting situation in the third quarter Bell passed to halfback Jimmy Knox of Graham for a touchdown. Late in the game, as Tech was trying to run out the clock, the Raiders were due to punt or run wide with the ball in the hopes of using up precious seconds. So Bell passed again and eventually had the Raiders on the Hardin-Simmons eight-yard line as the game ended.

Throughout the season Bell has taken the big chance on fourth down and usually made it. Not that he dislikes punting, Bell's averaging 38.8 yards to lead Tech in that department. Bell is primarily a passer and ball handler but his chunky build—5-11, 195 pounds—so befits his adequate speed that he is able to run for fair yardage on the split-T keepers.

Passing successfully 11 of 13 times against Hardin-Simmons, Bell now is averaging 53.4 per cent on throwing, 31 completions of 58 passes for 409 yards. He has run for 162 yards more.

A junior, Bell didn't have much of a sophomore year. He took part in about five plays in a game already won. Last fall, out of action with a knee injury, Bell spent the season identifying players for radio announcers.

Bell's gambling has paid off at the ticket window too. Although the Raiders lost their first five home games, Tech fans liked Bell's dare-devil style well enough to set an attendance record.

Jerry was quarterback for the Ballinger Bearcats back in 1953 when the Bearcats went to the state finals in Class AA, losing to Huntsville at Temple. His leadership helped the Bearcats through a season when they were picked to lose practically every game by the sports writers of the area. Ballinger fans are still with Jerry and are watching his fine efforts each week with the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Mr. Jay said that he had tried to secure a den mother for a Latin-American den but so far had failed. There are enough boys interested in joining to have one provided a mother can be located.

In case other boys in the age group desire a den, an effort will be made to secure a den mother and form the organization.

Colorado River Reservoir Not Favored By Engineer

Officers Handle Numerous Cases Past Week Here

Twenty Bearcats To Get Letters; Eight To Return

Coach Paul Stewart has certified 20 members of the Ballinger Bearcat squad to receive letters for the 1957 season. In this list are 12 seniors who will graduate in the spring and who have played their final high school game.

A number of these boys will continue their football career in colleges and universities next fall.

There will be eight returning lettermen next fall around which to build the 1958 Bearcat team. In addition are some fine B team boys and a number of outstanding junior high players coming up next year.

Three seniors received letters for the third straight year. These were Delbert Wiley, Wesley Stokes and Hugh Campbell. Other seniors and the number of letters received are: Kenneth Piqua (1), Jimmy Nicholas (2), Carroll Edwards (2), Bill Clifton (2), Mack Petty (2), Cotton Everett (1), Kennedy Whiteley (2), Tommy Hamner (2) and Lyle Young (1).

Jerry Candler, junior, also received his third letter and will go on next year for his fourth. Other juniors are: Kenneth Wigginton (1), Mike Watson (1), Paul Price (1), Bobby Power (1).

Sophomores are: Calvin Kirk (1), Dalton Hoffman (1) and Stephen Brown (1).

The Bearcats will be able to start the 1958 season with a great backfield, however they will be shy on returning line-men. In the backfield will be Jerry Candler, one of the leading ground gainers in the district; Calvin Kirk, fast charging fullback who had a fine season this last year; Kenneth Wigginton at quarterback and Dalton Hoffman at halfback.

Henry M. Seipt, federal engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation, met with the directors of the Runnels County Water Improvement District Monday night in regard to the recent survey on the proposed water reservoir on the Colorado River northwest of Ballinger.

Mr. Seipt told the directors that the cost of water in such a lake would be too high, based on the present users and the maximum amount of water that could be sold. He estimated that cost of water at the lake for municipal and industrial users would be 30 cents for 1,000 gallons and that irrigation costs would run around \$40 per acre.

The engineer spoke of two sized dams and lakes and using the smaller as the most practical, stated that it would cost approximately \$23,800,000. He then listed the reimbursable and non-reimbursable amounts and from the figure left estimated the cost of the water.

The engineer, using maps, described the watershed of the Colorado River above Ballinger and then pointed out projects where water is already committed. He showed the locations of other projects which have been presented and are now pending and the amount of watershed which would be required for each of these projects.

The visitor stated that a sale for much more water for industrial and municipal purposes would be necessary before the cost could be low enough for practical use. He added that few places have been found in Texas where storage for irrigation was feasible.

Christmas Lights Will Be Turned On Friday

Friday night is the time set for the opening of Christmas show windows and the time to turn on Christmas street lights.

Ballinger merchants voted to start the Christmas season early this year and will begin their displays of gift merchandise one week before Thanksgiving.

In a check-up last week-end it was pointed out by local merchants that gift buying was already started and that many items have been sold and placed in lay-away for the Christmas season. Friday night show windows will be decorated and opened for the inspection of the public. Every Ballinger merchant is invited to take part in this feature of the Christmas season in an effort to attract more shoppers here during the remainder of November and in December.

The big Christmas program will be on Tuesday, December 3, at 6:30 p. m. when the annual parade will be staged. This parade will feature Santa Claus and a large number of decorated floats. Ten floats are being sponsored by local merchants and will be decorated and entered in the contest by school organizations.

Judges will be brought here to inspect the floats and make their selections for the placing of each. All ten floats will receive a cash prize.

In addition to the ten floats in the contest, merchants may decorate and enter their own floats for advertising purposes but will not be considered by the judges. Several firms have indicated they will have an entry in the parade.

The Ballinger High School band will lead the parade and the line of march will wind through all business blocks of Ballinger.

Santa Claus will ride a unique entry in the parade and after the march is completed, he will be in the lower hall of the court house to meet the children of the county and will also have a bag of candy for them.

Time for this parade was set at 6:30 p. m. so that all people in this trade area could attend. Out of town children are especially invited to be present.

The parade committee is still looking for special features for this program and a number of out of town bands have been invited but so far have not given a definite acceptance.

recently presented the highly prized command pilot's wings by his commander, Col. James R. Haun of the 1503rd Air Transport Wing, Tachikawa Air Base, Japan. Major Miller received the wings in an informal office ceremony for fulfilling all requirements to become a command pilot. He has been a pilot for more than 15 years and has flown 5,200 hours. Compared to an eight hour working day, he has spent almost two years in the air.

Just prior to presentation of the wings, Major Miller was named by his commander to be the new Wing Inspector for the 1503rd Air Transport Wing. Major Miller's new duties include supervising an inspection team to inspect 1503rd units at: Tachikawa Air Base, Japan; Tokyo International Airport, Japan; Kadena Air Base, Okinawa; Clark Air Force Base, Philippines; and for units on the world-famous "Embassy Run" which includes, Calcutta, Saigon, Bangkok, Karachi, and New Delhi.

Besides his duties as Wing Inspector, Major Miller flies the giant C-124 "Globemaster" cargo transport aircraft utilized by the 1503rd. He has been flying this craft since 1953 and has more than 100 complete trips from the United States to the Far East in his credit. Major Miller has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and three Oak Leaf Clusters. The first DFC was awarded during World War II when he participated in and successfully completed the first shuttle bombing mission on Germany by flying from England to North Africa. One Oak Leaf Cluster was received during the Korean conflict when he helped fly 5,000 Marines out of an area where they had become hopelessly trapped.

This is Major Miller's second tour of duty with the United States Air Force in the Far East. In 1950 and 1951 he served in Japan and Korea, returned to the United States for duty at Travis Air Force Base,

Roy Anderson, now reside in San Angelo where Mr. Anderson works for the Air Force at Goodfellow Air Force Base. The Millers will reside in Japan until their scheduled return to the United States in 1960.

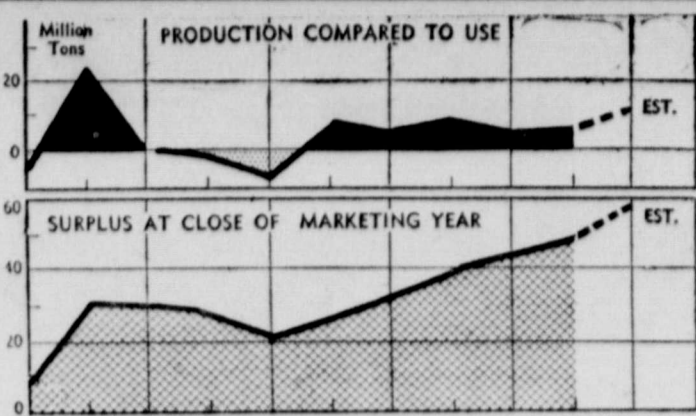
