



By and by, chicken-raiser Smith told corn-raiser Brown that everything had gone up still more, so he just couldn't hire out for less than \$10 a day. Brown said that seemed fair to him, but since everything he used was going up too, he'd have to get \$10 for five bushels of corn, which was agreeable with Smith.

Smith told his wife: "Ain't it wonderful . . . \$10 for a day's work."

You and I should write our Senators, Congressmen and the President of the United States and say:


