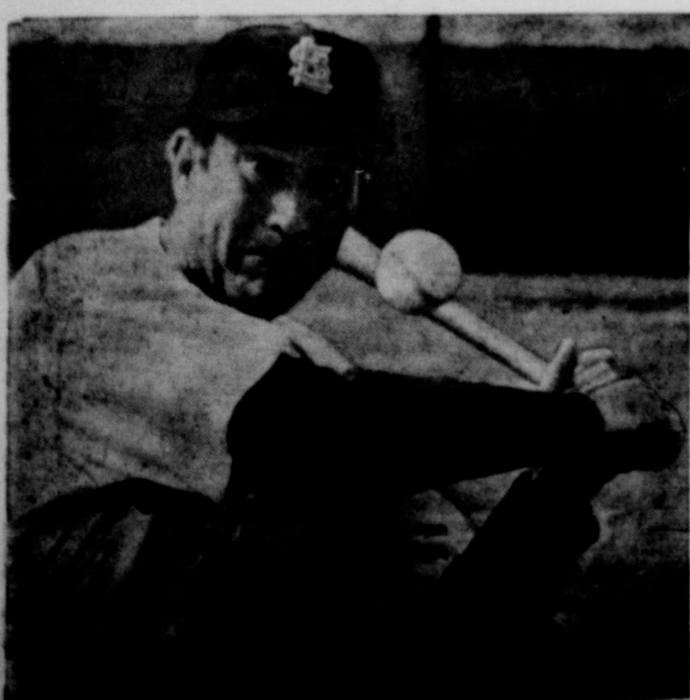

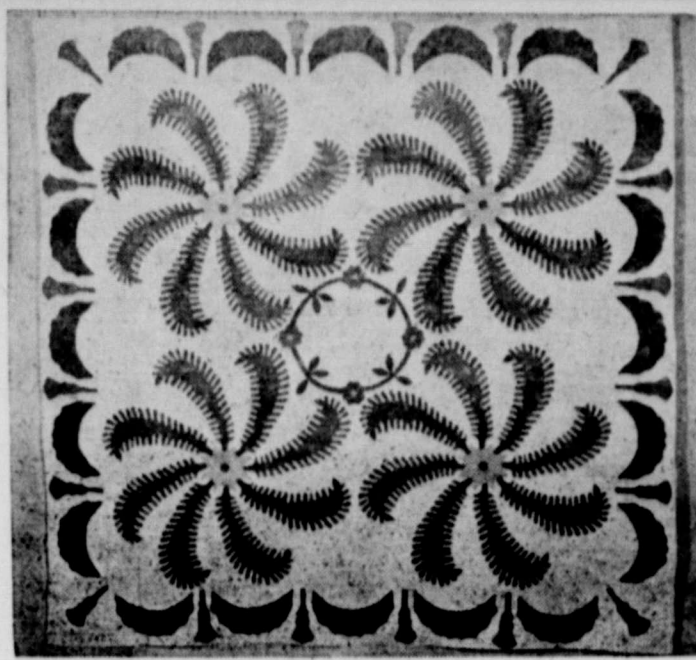

Lynn Herring, editor of Cat Tracks, was toastmistress for

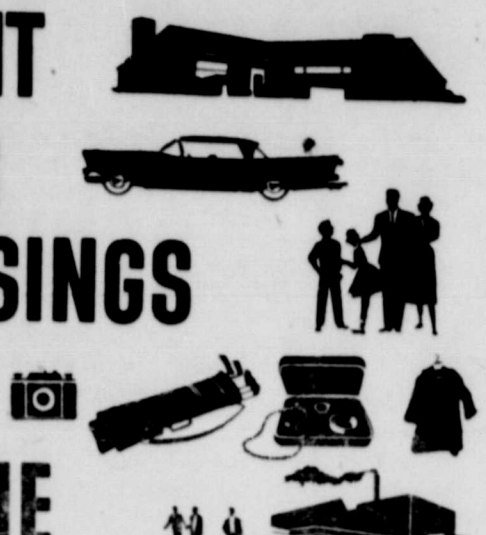
the program. Dance numbers were presented by Diana and Paula Downing and the talented young ladies were called back for their second number.

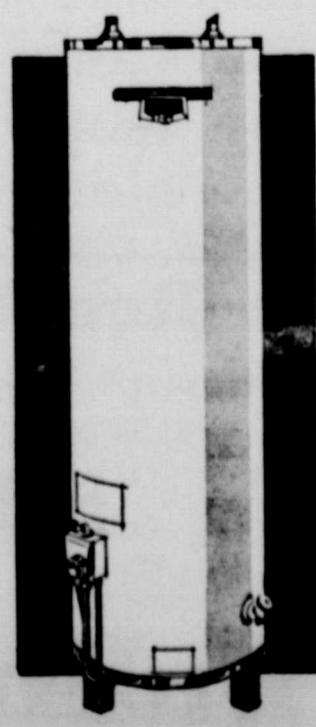

Cotton Acres can be Withdrawn Until March 28
Read the facts below and act!

First of all the total payments made under the soil bank to the community are much less than the income of the community would have been if the land had been planted in cotton.

Second, it was felt that if a large acreage went into the cotton soil bank, it would show on the records that this community is not interested in raising cotton and this could have a serious effect on our future cotton allotments.

Third, as we reduce the production of cotton in this community, all industry connected with the production and processing of cotton will suffer. If, in the future, we try to again go into the production of cotton, we will find a shortage of implements, repair houses, field workers, cotton pickers, cotton gins, cotton buyers, oil mills and compresses.

These are but a few of the effects of the soil bank on this community. This community has always produced a highly desired type of cotton. The community has land suited for cotton, an abundance of cotton gins, good marketing facilities and a modern compress. Why should we sell our rights to plant cotton for a profit or a loss if we so desire? Our churches, our schools, our roads, our city improvements and our farm improvements have all been built with the help of cotton income.

This community has always prospered with cotton planted in the ground and not in a so called soil bank set up by man.

We urge every farmer to seriously consider all of the factors involved before he sells his God given right to plant and produce the commodities for which he is best qualified and his land best adapted.

If too many of our acres are planted in the soil bank, it is felt that not only the economic future but the very existence of this community is in danger.

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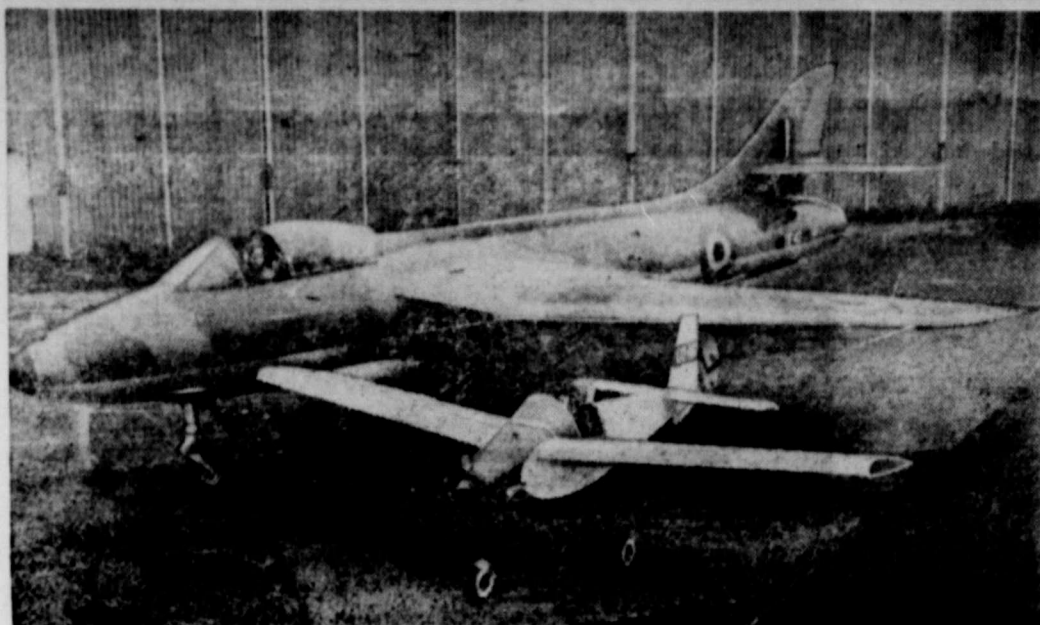
