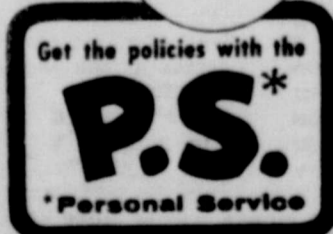
and Miss Myra Tankersley, a former agent in this county.

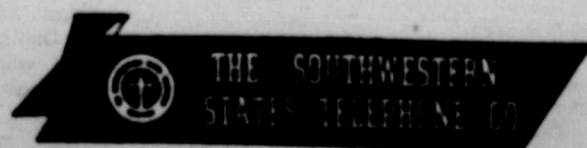

Gas Range Dealers Launch Campaign

Ballinger dealers in gas ranges are cooperating with Lone Star Gas Co. in the annual Home Economy Gas Range Sale which starts this week-end and continues all during April. First ads announcing the annual sale, along with a wide selection of the best known brands of stoves, are carried elsewhere in this newspaper.

Modern gas ranges are fully automatic in every sense of the word. They are also replete with an array of special features—some 67 in all—which offer today's homemaker widest selection in gas range history.

Keeping in mind the increased demand for color in the kitchen, manufacturers are offering ranges with colored enamel and metallic finishes. These come in black, blue, gray, green, pink, red, tan, yellow, copper-tone and white, stainless steel,

chrome satin, bright chrome, antique copper and antique bronze.

Recent surveys indicate that gas range buyers are influenced by features. Among the most wanted are: Top burner heat controls, separate simmer burners, top burner safety pilots, timed shut-off burners, "burner-on" indicators, giant and super-giant burners, new low-heat pilots.

Also automatic "on-off" clock controls, thermostatic timed shut-offs, "oven-on" "oven-ready" indicator lights, removable rack guides, chrome oven liners, retained heat ovens, chrome cooking tops, warming shelves and compartments, lift-up cooking tops, double ovens, built-in meat thermometers, rotisseries, deep well cookers, griddles and deep fat fryers.

While all these meet the public's demand for "automation in the kitchen," three of these features are worthy of special mention. They are the revolutionary new top burner heat controls, built-in meat thermometers and high-speed super-giant burners.

The remarkable new top burner heat control is revolutionizing top of the range cooking. This new device consists of a small sensing element in the center of the burner which literally "takes the temperature" of the cooking utensil and signals it to the thermostat controlling the burner. When the food is cooked, the "burner with a brain" cuts the flame low to keep the food warm until ready to serve.

One model of the built-in meat thermometer reads the

doneness of roasts from inside the meat and registers the reading on a visible range-top dial. Another model plugs into a connection recessed in the oven wall. The dial is set to rare, medium or well-done or some in-between setting and when the meat is cooked to the degree desired the oven turns off automatically. When hooked up to the oven clock, the entire roasting operation can take place while the housewife is miles away from the home. Instant, automatic ignition of oven and broiler as well as top burner units is another convenience the owner of a gas range enjoys today.

Griddles are available on most lines of gas ranges. Some griddles have heat settings and many interchange with a giant fifth burner and a porcelain

work surface. These griddles can cook an entire meal, and the homemaker will not have to use pots and pans. The griddles are also fine for quick snacks. Conveniently located grease traps make cleaning no problem at all.

New tiny pilots leave the gas range cool to the touch. Tiny top burner pilots on oven and broiler burners are found on top models of all gas range manufacturers.

The growing trend outdoor-type cooking done indoors is reflected in the many gas range series now offering rotisseries. These let the homemaker prepare meats, fish and poultry on her regular range yet still give the "outdoors" flavor, adding variety to her every day menus. Most of these rotisseries can be removed and stored when not

in use. The gas rotisseries are self-basting.

Another range provides a sparkling clear plastic shelf for convenient work space when it is needed. Its non-breakable, shadow-free surface folds down when not in use without hiding the beauty of the instrument panel. A one-piece lift top makes cleaning this range quick and simple. The lift top goes up at a touch and stays there to clear the way for perfect cleaning in all the usually hard-to-reach spots.

Range manufacturers are still aware of the popularity of the smaller models, and their new lines clearly reflect this popularity. There are 24-inch ranges which combine the finest features of gas cookery with great savings in space. The bigger 30-inch ranges have extra-large ovens, big enough for a turkey with room to spare, and there is plenty of space above for top-burner cooking. These space-saving smaller ranges have many of the automatic features that make gas cookery so quick and simple on their larger cousins.

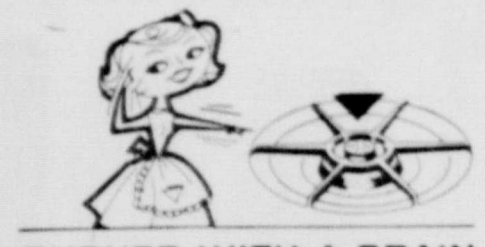

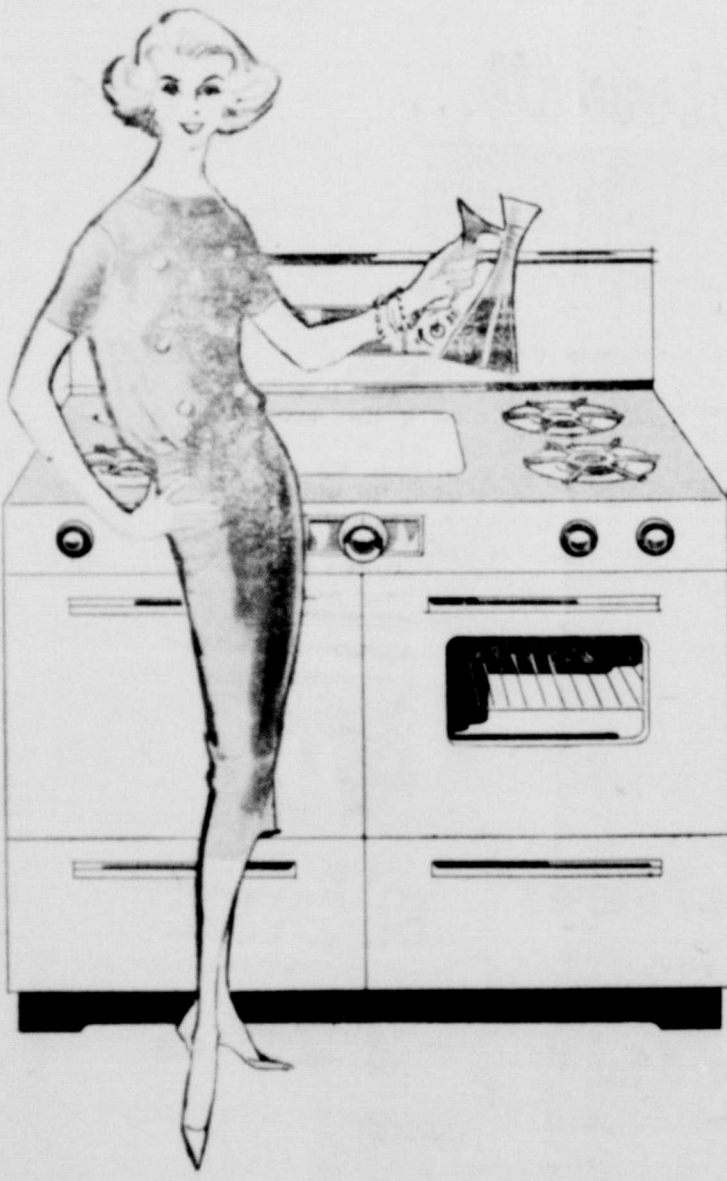

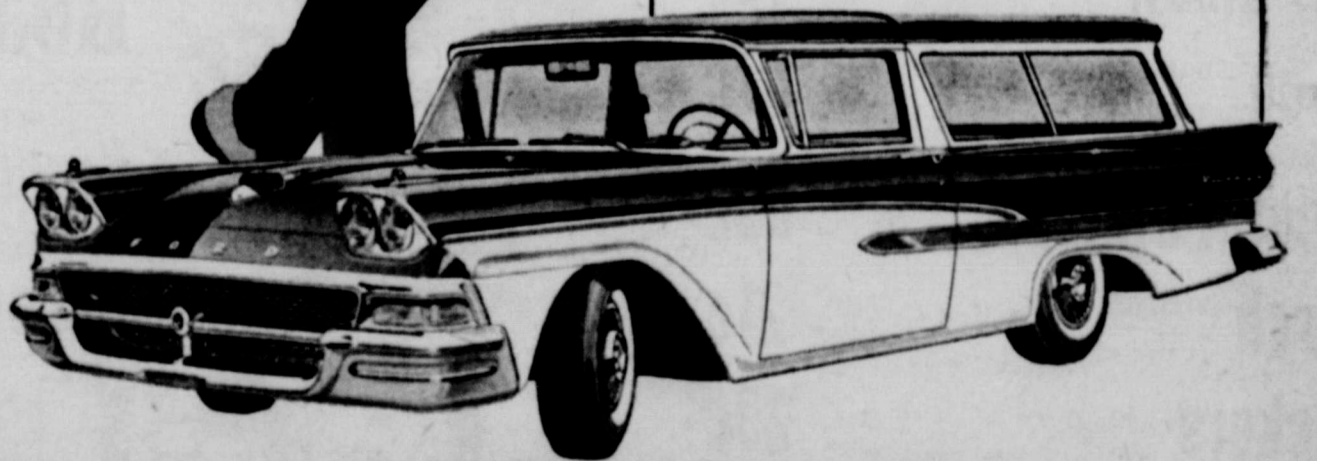
