The Parmer County Livestock Show is scheduled to begin Tuesday, January 17 and run through Thursday, January 19 with the premium sale being held on Saturday, January 20.

Steers will be weighed in on Tuesday from 8 to 8:45 a.m. Steer classifications will be made at 9 a.m. and the show will begin at 11 a.m. with Rusty Day judging the event.

On Wednesday from 1-5 p.m. all lambs, goats and barrows will be weighed in. Barrows and lambs will be classified as they are weighed. Rabbits will be weighed at 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. with the show beginning at 7 p.m. James Berry will be judging the entries at the rabbit show. On Thursday at 8 a.m. the goat show will begin followed by the lamb and barrow shows. Robert Scott will be judging the goat and lamb show while Kyle Stephens will be judging the barrow show.

The premium sale will start at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Council discusses cemetery mischief

The Friona city council met Monday January 9 with all members present, including Mayor Rick White who is recovering from bypass surgery on December 29.

The first agenda item was the police department report by Chief Isidro Jimenez. In December the department made 14 arrests, had 125 traffic stops, and issued 43 citations. They received 282 calls for service including fire and EMS calls.

City manager Patricia Phipps asked the Chief about apparent mischief at the Friona Cemetery where vehicles, possibly 4-wheelers, have apparently been doing donuts in the south part of the cemetery. She instructed the Chief to lock the cemetery gates at dark and open them after sunrise, plus to patrol the cemetery three times a day. Anyone with information about the cemetery vandals should call the Friona police department.

The rest of the meeting was financial, with discussions about accounts payable, December financial statement, and the October-December quarterly financial statement. The city manager was authorized to transfer money between accounts to pay the February bond payment.

The meeting started at 6:30 p.m. and adjourned at 6:44 p.m., one of the shortest meetings in our memory. The next council meeting is Monday February 13 at 6:30 p.m. at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Local tax receipts continue upward

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$647.4 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 4.9 percent more than in January 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

"The cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio continue to see significant increases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Houston and Sugar Land saw notice-

able decreases in sales tax allocations."

Greetings! I would like to begin this letter by saying "thank you" for all of the thoughts and prayers I received before, during and after my surgery. 



By late Monday morning, I was likening them to two small children on the playground.


We all have our opinions whether it is about Streep, Trump or whatever.


Parents who desire to nominate their child for this program may contact the principal or counselor in their child's building for the appropriate form.


