I was reminded of the movie recently by a very good friend of mine who took the time to explain why the recent events in Washington, D.C. and our country are so extreme and are very much like being


due to the nerves being exposed constantly by the news media. Therefore, we walk around getting our feelings hurt every time someone has the audacity to point out a problem with the system.



### BOOTLEG, TEXAS pop. ?

A few hawks or even a golden eagle, some coyotes, some jackrabbits and even an antelope or two, but the small crossroads area was once part of the famous XIT ranch. You say, never heard of Bootleg. Then you must be a newcomer to the area. Located 18 miles northwest of Friona on first real school here in 1909 Highway 214, Bootleg Corner as it is known, does have some history. When Rex and I were in Seattle, WA in 2003, we marveled at the fact that, although we had cool and gloomy weather, there was no snow as we expected there might be. However, on the national weather news, they reported a blizzard in Bootleg, TX! Our Bootleg? Yes! There is no exact date known for the origin of this small rural area in Deaf Smith County, but there are two stories for the origin of its name. 'One associates it with the Moonshine Sheep Camp where a moonshine still was once located as cowboys and others used the camp when going from La Plata (near Hereford) to Endee, New Mexico,' according to the Handbook of Texas online. Another tale claims that XIT land sale agents had a 'bootleg' school that they used to make prospective settlers believe that a school was

always nearby their land choice. Heritage Center in Lubbock. Although they really did move schools around to where the children were, there were more than one school. Whichever story you believe, they are both interesting.

Some had chalkboards for the daily lessons; many probably had handmade desks or tables for the teacher and the students. Perhaps they owned an American flag and maybe the school had a bell tower. Coal stoves probably provided heat as the wood supply would have been scarce. In addition, BOOKS! Imagine what a precious resource they would have been! I remember pouring over every detail in d'Aulaire's illustration of a log cabin classroom in their classic Abraham Lincoln. (Side note from a former resident of the area: vandals have stolen the Bootleg sign more than 20 times over the years.)

tor his and his neighbors' children. It became the Messenger School. Builders constructed some structures specifically for use as a school; but they probably repurposed others. The schools did move to where the school aged children lived. With colorful names like Crackerbox, Big Square, Buckeye, they all had character and special memories. Many moved permanently to new locations after they no longer served as schools. Messenger was one of these. Three small school districts of Bippus, Messenger and Walcott all eventually consolidated into Walcott district and built a new brick building north of Bootleg. Many know the area as Garcia or Garcia Lake because it was located south of Garcia Lake.

Can you just imagine what these schools must have looked like inside? You can find some authentic examples of one-room schoolhouses at the Ranching



#### Sugarcane aphid research outlines economical control methods **By Kay Ledbetter**

Sorghum producers can reduce input costs and improve their bottom line in the battle against sugarcane aphids in the Texas High Plains through the use of selected varieties and early planting and scouting, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Research study.

Dr. Ada Szczepaniec, AgriLife Research entomologist in Amarillo, has wrapped up her first year of assessing the impact of planting dates, insecticide seed treatments and resistant varieties of sorghum on the timing and severity of sugarcane aphid infestations in a study near Bushland.

"We demonstrated that use of a sorghum hybrid with tolerance to sugarcane aphids has significant economic benefits because it slows down the growth of the sugarcane aphid population and thus can decrease costs of managing these pests when only one well-timed application of insecticides is needed," Szczepaniec said.

She said this first year of study also suggests producers can decrease input costs by eliminating expenses on insecticide seed treatments to suppress sugarcane aphids if they plant sorghum early.

But, she added, neither hybrid selection nor insecticide seed treatment eliminates the need for scouting early and often once reports of sugarcane aphid presence in the region emerge. Data collected suggests a focused effort to scout early will help in making well-timed foliar insecticide applications to provide control.

In her study, Szczepaniec evaluated the effect of planting date - early or traditional; sorghum varieties – susceptible or tolerant; and neonicotinoid seed treatments – treated and untreated, on the rate of increase and abundance of sugarcane aphids and sorghum yield.

The protocol included detailed counts of sugarcane aphids once plots were colonized and foliar insecticide applications when aphid numbers reached the 50-125 aphids-per-leaf threshold

Szczepaniec said there is too much variability in field research to rely solely on a single year of data. There is also a significant need to measure in a more precise manner the economic threshold of sugarcane aphids in sorghum colonized at flowering and beyond.

"If sorghum can tolerate higher sugarcane aphid numbers at later growth stages without impacting yield, it would improve our ability to properly time insecticides to control populations and 'buy' more time from initial colonization to insecticide application," she said.

Szczepaniec also said it would be of benefit to sorghum production in the region if more tolerant hybrids well-suited to the growing conditions were evaluated.





### **Texas Wheat announces biennial election**

The Texas Wheat Producers Board (TWPB) will hold its biennial election to elect five board members to fill expiring positions. The election, to be held by mail, officially begins March 24, 2017 and will conclude April 7, 2017.

Terms expiring in 2017 include Collin Bowers of District I, David Cleavinger of District II, Jody Bellah of District III, Glen Gibson of District IV and Gary Murphy of District IV.

Any person who is engaged in commercial wheat production in Texas is eligible to vote for the district in which they reside. This includes owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers if they are subject to paying the assessment that is collected on wheat within the following counties:

District I: Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Moore, Hartley, Hutchinson and Gray.

District II: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Floyd.

District III: Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Wilbarger, Wichita, Young and Clay. District IV: All other counties in Texas.

Ballots are available from the Texas. Ballots are available from the Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Farm Service Agency offices in each Texas county, local elevators or by mail from the TWPB office between March 24, 2017 and April 7, 2017. Ballots must be mailed to the TWPB, 5405 West I-40, Amarillo, Texas 79106, and will not be valid with a postmark date later than April 7, 2017.

Any person qualified to vote is also qualified to seek a six-year membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board. Qualified persons must reside within the TWPB voting district wherein they seek nomination. The application must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other persons from that district eligible to vote in the election. Such applications must be received at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have the nominee's name placed on the ballot. Nominee applications may be obtained upon request to the Texas Wheat Producers Board office at 5405 West Interstate 40, Amarillo, Texas 79106, or by calling (806) 352-2191.

Current TWPB members whose terms are not expiring are Scott Born of Ferris, Bryan Clift of Stratford, Ken Davis of Grandview, Fred Dwyer of Wichita Falls, Jack Norman of Howe, Scott McGarraugh of Perryton, Corby Shadid of Panhandle, Ben Scholz of Lavon, Freddie Streit of Vernon and Tommy Womack of Tulia.

Board members are responsible for the allocation of funds from a state-wide wheat producer assessment of two cents per bushel. These funds are applied to wheat research, education and market development to further the wheat industry in Texas. The Texas Agricultural Commodity Referendum Law prohibits such funds from being used for lobbying or legislative efforts.
