Opplinger perishes in helicopter accident

Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries reported Sunday that Don Opplinger, one of the area's largest agribusiness operators was killed in a helicop-

ter crash. Castro County Sheriff Sal Rivera reported that the crash scene was in the southwestern area of Castro County in a wheat field approximately one half mile south of the 200 block of County Road 623.

Geries and Rivera reported that Opplinger was the only occupant and piloting the helicopter. His family began looking for him after they realized he had gone missing on Saturday, June 3. The accident site was found by an Opplinger employee.

Opplinger was pronounced deceased at the scene by Castro County Justice of the Peace braska in 1998.

Oreda Campbell. An autopsy was ordered.

The cause of the crash was not immediately known. The investigation into the crash is also being conducted by the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Bureau.

According the company website the Opplinger Companies started with a feedlot outside Farwell, and have grown rapidly in size and now include six large-scale feedlots, over 55,000 acres of irrigated farmland, a dairy and thousands of acres of ranch land. The Farwell feedlot started with 15,000 head of cattle. Opplinger then acquired a 35,000 head feedlot near Clovis in 1991 before expanding again to Lincoln County, Ne-

Morton named 2017 Sherwood Award winner

Former Friona Chieftain this past season. head coach and athletic director James Morton was awarded the 2017 Sherwood Award during the 2017 ASCO Football Classic held Saturday, June 3 at Lowery Field in Lubbock.

James Morton is a 1983 graduate of Eastland High School. He helped lead the football team to the 1982 Class 2A State Championship. He went to ranger Community College and West Texas State University carving a niche at both places. After his senior season he had a brief stint with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Morton then served one season at his alma mater as a GA, one season at Richmond University and another year back at his alma mater.

Coach Morton spent one year as an assistant with the Friona Chieftains and the next five years as the head coach/athletic director. The Chieftains had much success including winning their first District 1-3A title since 1965. They also had a State Semifinal appearance.

Coach Greg Sherwood hired James in 1998 as the head coach/athletic coordinator for the Lubbock Monterey Plainsmen. He led the Plainsmen to the post season nine times in his 11 years. The Plainsmen won or tied for six District Championships and reached the Division 1 quarterfinals four straight sea-

In 2009, Coach Morton went to Midland as the head coach/ athletic coordinator for the Midland Lee Rebels. He spent seven years guiding the Rebels to playoff appearance and co-District Champions.

In 2016, Morton became head coach/athletic director for his hometown, the Eastland Mavericks. The Mavericks made an appearance to the 3-A Division 2 Area round football playoffs

James served on the Texas High School Coaches Association Board of Directors for four years. In 2009, He was inducted into the West Texas A&M University hall of Champions.

In 2003, the West Texas Classic was created. Coach Johnny Taylor and Coach Morton had a vision to bring an All-Star game to the West Texas area, as well as help players who had been permanently injured while playing or practicing the game of football. In 2004, the West Texas Classic became the ASCO All-Star Classic, which now includes both boys and girls basketball. Coach Morton has been instrumental in raising nearly \$245,000 through these games.


James has been married to Suni for 21 years. They have three children: McKayla, Maggie McKall and Behren.

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

Dry Rain



The problem when seen at the post office or around town comes from the prayer requests I receive. "Hey, Jeff keep that rain in your prayers, we need a good start to that dryland milo." "Hi Jeff, pray for few good clear days so we can get that wheat crop out." So, you see the quandary. Things really get exciting when I get asked by the farmer who has wheat and milo and needs a slow, steady inch on the place out north of town, but wants me to ask the Lord to keep it dry just a couple miles over. Now I know that is not impossible. I have seen it rain on the old Pruitt place and across the turn-row my granddad got nary a drop. How does one pray for dry rain?

It is almost a cake and eat it too scenario. But the truth is we often struggle with prayers that seem contradictory to each other or at the least just a little bit particular. One prays for God's healing, another for God's speed to carry the loved one home, yet both are praying to the same God about the same person.

I am not often given much insight as to why God does what He does. In fact, most often I do not try to out guess what God may or may not do. Our prayer is our speaking to God. I think the problem comes from doubting what we pray. True enough God may say no to our request, but will I trust Him even if it is no. Or if it rains on the wheat and skips the milo? Can I learn to simply pray "Thy will be done." Yes, I should make my requests known and be specific if you need, but also trust that regardless of how God answers, you will continue to come before Him and not quit because you do not like the answer.

For the record, I do not pray for dry rain. I pray that God provide each what he needs for today, because that is all we really have anyway. Today.

When we go to church, it is my prayer that it is about more than a building. May it be seen as a community gathered by Christ for worship, learning, mutual support, and service.
