Sales Tax Holiday this weekend

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 11-13.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Most folks won't hear the back-to-school bell for another month, but it's never too early to take advantage of the opportunity to save money on everything from ball caps to ballpoint pens," Hegar said. "As the father of three young children, I know how these expenses can add up."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased taxfree can be found on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$87 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

Texas' tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.





Just an oversight?

As most of you know from reading the Friona Star, the Parmer County Courthouse is celebrating its 100th anniversary year in 2017. I hope you were able to take advantage of the tours offered by the Parmer County Historical Commission. Following this celebration, someone pointed out that, although our courthouse is a long celebrated architectural structure in our county, the said courthouse is missing a very important detail: its name on the building.

Could this be just an oversight by the Architects C. Risser & Company of Amarillo due to the death of Mr. C. Risser during its construction, "A History of Parmer County" by Nelson Lewis c. 1974? Did they not request it in the plans, which alone cost \$1,320 or mention it in the required \$15,000 bond also issued by the Risser Company?

County officials set aside a budget of \$50,000 in a bond election in 1913 for the construction of a courthouse (without furnishings) to be completed in 1916. Did no one mention it when the county paid the bill for the Courthouse construction for \$43,243.64 to Wm. Rice Construction upon completion in 1917?

County Clerk B. N. Graham stated for the record that the county moved into the courthouse in 1917. Perhaps they were to add the name later and never finished. Did no one notice?

In fact, there are no directional signs either, an oversight perhaps now more easily remedied; but which again, seem to have escaped our notice until now... Even when the site markers for the county seat noted 200 acres at Parmerton Hill and a temporary courthouse on May 8, 1907 and later in Farwell, did no one notice?

An election held Dec. 10, 1907, to move the courthouse records from Parmerton to the Hamlin Block in Farwell (later destroyed by fire): Farwell 99, Parmerton 26 and Friona 1. First records recorded in Farwell May 9, 1908. The temporary Parmerton Courthouse building ended up in Friona [Most of you may have seen the model of this

building in the museum].

In addition, have we just assumed it was marked? At the time of the courthouse construction, county officials also set aside \$3,000 for a county jail, would they not have planned for the name on the courthouse?


Moreover, they did not spend all the money in the original budget! Maybe some of it was for the name.

Of the 254 county courthouses in Texas, most of them are marked in one way or another: by engraving with the familiar 'COVNTY COVRTHOVSE' or by attaching three-dimensional letters or by other signage. According to "Historic Texas Courthouses" by Michael Andrews, c. 2006 the golden age [of courthouses] was 1881-1902, a new century 1900-1929 and Texas Moderne 1928-1941. Not all 254 made the list including our own Parmer County Courthouse 1917 in fact, only about half of the total number are in this book. Not all of them are marked, while others have engraving with not only the name and date but some also include famous quotes (lots of engraving).

Personally, I think the courthouse should be marked in some permanent way. I have noticed that the Cruce building in Texico is marked with engraving done in 1910. I think the lack of a name on our courthouse might have been an oversight. I am not sure what such engraving would cost in today's dollars, but think it is long overdue. I would really love to be able to ask Hugh Moseley about this...DB







Beware of internet scammers

Internet scams are so common these days it seems as though there's a "scam of the month."

Yet another deception has been reported in the local area recently.

Computer owners or FaceBook users may receive a call out of the blue claiming they have a virus in their machine, and that the caller can remotely connect to their computer for only \$300 the caller will remotely connect to their computer to fix it.

Should the computer owner make the mistake of permitting the caller access to their computer, the scammer installs trojan horse sofware that lets them record the computer owner's keystrokes and remotely access their PC at any time.

One tactic of scammers is to install a virus that locks up the computer and requires a password. A phone number to call is displayed, but the computer owner can only obtain the password by paying money.

Scammers offer to rid the computer of malware for fees ranging from \$130 to \$330--all for completely unnecessary repairs and warranty programs, and for software programs that are available free.

Computer owners should heed the warning not to allow anyone to access their computer remotely, and not to trust any pop-ups proclaiming their PC has a virus.

The Federal Trade Commission has cracked down on a massive international scam that tricked tens of thousands of PC users into believing their computers were riddled with malware, and convinced them to pay scammers large sums to "fix" the problem.

Some scammers claim to be affiliated with legitimate companies such as Dell, Microsoft, McAfee, and Norton, and play on people's fear of computer infections and hackers.

Law enforcement has difficulty going after scammers working outside of the U.S.

At the request of the FTC a U.S. District Court judge has frozen the assets of six scamming operations named in FTC complaints.

Xcel Energy warns customers of scams from callers claiming to be customer agents threatening to disconnect service if a "past due balance"isn't paid over the phone. Xcel reminds customers that disconnect notices come by mail with options for multiple ways to make payments.

Xcel says if you receive a call demanding payment and haven't received a disconnect notice by mail, hang up and call 800-895-4999 or 800-481-4700 for businesses.

Farm Credit Bank of Texas reports loan growth

Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT), a wholesale bank that funds 14 rural lending cooperatives in five states, reported growth in earnings and loan volume in the second quarter of 2017.

The bank has a diversified loan portfolio consisting largely of direct notes to Farm Credit cooperatives that lend to farmers, ranchers and other rural borrowers. It also participates with other lenders in loans to businesses that ag producers and rural communities rely on, such as food processors, agribusinesses and rural infrastructure companies.

Loan demand in the rural communities in the bank's territory contributed to a record \$16.5 billion in total loan volume and \$22.1 billion in total assets at June 30, 2017, increases of 3.9 percent and 4.0 percent since year-end. Credit quality remained very strong, with 99.8 percent of the bank's overall portfolio considered acceptable or special mention.

"Our year-to-date earnings exceeded our projections due to asset growth," said Larry Doyle, FCBT chief executive officer. "The continued demand for loans reflects the economic stability in our five-state territory, which is home to a vibrant and diverse agriculture industry."

Net interest income was \$62.7

million and \$124.4 million for the three months and six months ended June 30, 2017, increases of 7.7 percent and 8.1 percent compared with the same periods in 2016. The bank reported net income of \$45.6 million for the quarter, a 1.2 percent decrease year over year due largely to an increase in operating expenses and a nonrecurring gain on the sale of an asset in 2016. Earnings for the six months ended June 30, 2017, totaled \$92.3 million, a 4.7 percent increase year over year.

Capital and liquidity continue to exceed the regulatory requirements set by the bank's federal regulator, the Farm Credit Administration. At June 30, 2017, the bank had a permanent capital ratio of 16.05 percent, tier 1 capital ratio of 16.04 percent and shareholders' equity of \$1.7 billion. Cash and investments totaled \$5.3 billion, providing 208 days of liquidity.

"As a financial institution and cooperative owned by the customers we serve, the bank has a duty to manage capital responsibly," said FCBT Board Chairman Jimmy Dodson. "Our careful approach to risk helps us carry out Farm Credit's mission to ensure that agriculture and rural communities have access to a stable, reliable source of funding."


The bank and its affiliated lending

cooperatives across Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas constitute the Texas Farm Credit District. Collectively, the district institutions reported \$23.1 billion in loans and \$28.8 billion in total assets at June 30, 2017, increases of 2.9 percent and 3.1 percent, respectively, since the end of 2016. Credit quality remained strong, with 98.4 percent of district loans classified as acceptable or special mention.

The district reported combined net income of \$99.4 million and \$211.1 million for the three months and six months ended June 30, 2017, increases of 10.8 percent and 0.5 percent compared with the same periods in 2016.

The district is part of the Farm Credit System, a nationwide network of lending cooperatives established in July 1916. Nationally, the System reported combined net income of \$1.24 billion and \$2.48 billion for the three-month and sixmonth periods ended June 30, 2017, compared with \$1.18 billion and \$2.34 billion for the same periods in 2016.

Zebra mussels could invade High Plains reservoirs **By Jim Steiert**

Zebra mussels that have invaded reservoirs in North and East Texas, and the pristine Guadalupe River Basin, have fisheries managers in the High Plains concerned. An official with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's inland fisheries division told members of the Panhandle Texas Master Naturalist chapter that zebra mussels could impact rocky canyon lakes that are prime sport fisheries in the High Plains.

"The inland fisheries division is spending nearly all of its budget fighting invasive species," said John Clayton, assistant district supervisor for the Amarillo District Inland Fisheries office of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at Canyon. " Lake Alan Henry, near Justiceburg, is second only to Lake Fork as a premiere bass fishery in Texas This outstanding sport fishery, and Lake Meredith, north of Amarillo at Fritch, are prime candidates for invasion by zebra mussels. They are rocky canyon

lakes favored by zebra mussels." Rapidly reproducing zebra mussels, originally from Eurasia, can have serious economic, environmental and recreational impacts on Texas reservoirs and rivers.

"Zebra mussels cover shoreline rocks and litter beaches with treacherously sharp shells, clog public-water supply intakes, such as those at both Lake Alan Henry and Lake Meredith, and damage boats and motors left in infested waters," said Brian Van Zee Inland Fisheries West Texas regional director for TPWD. Van Zee worked in the Canyon office for several years before moving to his present post in Waco, and knows High Plains lakes intimately. He's responsible for coordinating the Texas statewide fish-stocking plan and fisheries management and research in the central and western portions of Texas. Named Fisheries Biologist of the Year in 2015 by the Southeastern Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, Van

Zee has been at the forefront of efforts to contain zebra mussels in Texas.

Since zebra mussels were first found in Texas in 2009, 10 lakes in four river basins are now classified as infested with an established, reproducing population - Belton, Bridgeport, Dean Gilbert at Sherman, Eagle Mountain, Lewisville, Randell, Ray Roberts, Stillhouse Hollow, Texoma and the prime fishery at Canyon Lake at Austin. The Canyon Lake discovery in June was quickly followed with positively identified zebra mussels for the first time in Lake Travis in the Colorado River Basin in Central Texas.

The Guadalupe River and reservoirs downstream of Canyon Lake are now at risk of invasion as zebra mussel larvae disperse downstream, including Lake Dunlap, Lake McQueeney, Lake Placid, Meadow Lake, Lake Gonzales, and Lake Wood, Van Zee laments.

"Three state-listed threatened

freshwater mussels found in the Guadalupe River basin could now be negatively impacted, including the Texas Pimpleback, the Golden Orb and the Texas Fatmucket. Zebra mussels can colonize on the shells of native mussels, and reach a density that essentially smothers the native mussels," Van Zee said.

Once zebra mussels reach a reproducing population level in reservoirs there's little to be done. For TPWD fisheries folks, it's mostly a vigilance game.

Van Zee said educating the public and local marinas to prevent zebra mussels from spreading further to nearby lakes is vital.

"Public awareness helps the effort to prevent zebra mussels from spreading," Van Zee said. "This is a battle we cannot give up on - the cost of these infestations is large and affects so many people. We have to keep up the fight and try to inform the public as much as possible about how they can protect their lakes from invasive species."

In Texas, it is unlawful to possess or transport zebra mussels, dead or alive. Boaters are required to drain all water from their boat and onboard receptacles before leaving or approaching a body of fresh water in order to prevent the transfer of zebra mussels. The requirement to drain applies to all types and sizes of boats whether powered or not: personal watercraft, sailboats, kayaks/canoes or any other vessel used on public waters.

The nightmare scenario for fisheries managers in the High Plains is zebra mussels being transported here from an infested area of the state, or elsewhere.

An alarming possibility is that anglers could travel to Lake Alan Henry's trophy bass waters with zebra mussels attached to their craft and introduce them to one of the High Plains region's rare angling jewels.

to prevent zebra mussels from spreading to any new river basins," said Van Zee.

"Cleaning, draining and drying are simple steps boaters can take to prevent infestations," said Monica McGarrity, TPWD Aquatic Invasive Species team lead. "With more than 1,500 boat ramps in Texas we can't be everywhere, so we have to rely on boaters, marinas and concerned citizens to help in this fight. A boat can take a readymade colony of zebra mussels to another lake at any time - so preventing the spread within these newly infested basins is still really important. If a boat has been on a lake that is infested with zebra mussels, or if it has been in another state that has quagga mussels, that are literally knocking on our door, it can spread the infestation."

Potentially deadly amoeba lurks in summer recreational water **By Jim Steiert**

A lot of us went through growing-up years playing in local waterholes during the summertime when they were available. There were adventures splashing amidst

the washed sands of old slush pits before irrigation spillways where water cascaded off concrete motor stands supporting roaring engines that drew forth the under-

ground rain of the Ogallala adventurous. Read about a waiting irrigation ditches. The ditches themselves offered inviting, bracing cool wading or dips for the more

aquifer and channeled it to fellow recently who water skied on irrigation ditches years ago. Those were cold, clear water adventures that took the blaze out of July and August days.

Playas proffered tepid, turbid water fun-sometimes you even brushed up against a catfish wriggling its way past. Steel stock tanks provided pools of sorts. Kids of all ages from throughout the Panhandle and beyond waded amidst the red sands and chased after minnows at the water crossings of the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River in Palo Duro Canyon State Park-again, in a time when the stream flow was natural and not primarily composed of treated effluent from a nearby metropolis. Back when, Buffalo Lake at Umbarger was a playground in a different time when it was still spring fed and before pollution from upstream rendered it a nitrate nightmare that remains closed to water contact activities to this day-were there any water.

water enters the nose, and the amoeba travels to the brain. The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that the amoeba can be present in freshwater areas like rivers or lakes, but there are very rare instances of the organism surviving in inadequately chlorinated swimming pools or contaminated

ton who died after a swimming trip with his family to the Brazos River basin that included time in Glen Rose as well as Lake Granbury. Lewis' family has founded the Kyle Cares Amoeba Awareness charity to help people be alert to the dangers of PAM.

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Can also well recall ear aches and sore throats from playing in the water in some of these locales-we lived to tell about it, but suspect it was tough on parents.

Perhaps elders and kids were blissfully unaware in those days, or it is something that developed over the span of years, but these days, we are warned that water in lakes, streams, rivers and ponds, particularly in hotter parts of Texas harbors an amoeba - Naegleria fowleri - that can cause a rare illness that stunningly, proves fatal. It's called Primary Amebic Meningoencephalitis - or PAM, and it is not the friendly stuff that you spray on cake pans and roaster ovens to prevent food from sticking. August, with its high water temperatures, is the prime month in Texas for PAM infections.

It is a stroke of good fortune that confirmed reports of this infection are uncommon. Lending credence to the practice of many a kid of holding their nose before plunging into the water, it occurs when

water. The CDC notes tap that people can't be infected from swallowing water, and the disease cannot be spread from person to person. The infection only occurs when water enters the nose and the amoeba is present.

The Texas Department of State Health Services (TD-SHS) reports that the majority of PAM infections nationwide take place in July, August, or September, when the temperature is often hottest and water levels are lower. While the amoeba is found around the world, it thrives in warm water with a temperature of at least 80 degrees. However, it is not found in salt water. It can also be found in sediment near the water. The CDC reports that from 2006-2015, there were 37 PAM infections reported in the United States, with 33 of those resulting from contaminated recreational water, and four cases attributed to contaminated tap water. The TDSHS says that while the amoeba is a concern, the risk of drowning is far greater than of being affected by PAM.

According to the CDC, initial symptoms begin about five days after infection, but can start as early as one day and as late as nine days after infection. These symptoms may include headache, fever, and nausea at first. Later symptoms can include a stiff neck, confusion, loss of balance, seizures and hallucinations. The disease progresses rapidly and usually results in death within one to five days. The fatality rate is 97 percent, based on statistics from the CDC for 1962-2016. Four people known to have this infection (out of 143 total) in the U.S. have survived.

One of the victims of PAM in Texas was Kyle Lewis, a 7-year-old boy from Arlingstay safe and still enjoy the water.

Several drugs have proven to be effective against the amoeba in laboratory tests. The CDC notes that in recent years, two people survived the infection after being treated with miltefosine in combination with other drugs and efforts to reduce brain swelling. Cook Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth has miltefosine on site to treat patients diagnosed with PAM. Most importantly, a fast and accurate diagnosis of the infection is extremely important. Those experiencing symptoms should see a physician or visit an emergency room immediately. The physician should be alerted to the potential of a PAM infection so that testing may begin as quickly as possible.

One way to greatly reduce the risk of being infected is to avoid submerging your head when swimming in fresh water. Nose plugs can also offer an effective safeguard. The only way to completely reduce the risk is to avoid all freshwater activities. But using nose clips or a swimming mask, holding your nose while going underwater or simply not going underwater offers a way to greatly decrease the chance of infection while still allowing you to enjoy water activities. Also, avoid digging or stirring up sediment in the water.

From 1972 to 2016, 34 cases of PAM were reported in Texas with the median age of those infected 9.5 years, and reports infections in people ranging in age from 3 to 37 years.

Be careful on and in the water out there.
