The Friona Chieftains opened their 2017 season with a 28-16 win over the Farwell Steers Friday, September 1 in Farwell.

Sergio Flores led the team with 23 carries for 151 yards and one touchdown. Marco Monreal had 11 carries for 27 yards and one touchdown. Julius Orozco carried four times with four yards. Rodrigo Munoz carried once for five yards and Marco Maldonado carried three times for 16 yards.

Maldonado led the Chieftains with four receptions for 114 yards and two touchdowns. Jonathan Hernandez had three receptions for 48 yards while Rocky Barrios had three receptions for 33 yards. Angel Hernandez had one reception for seven yards.

Monreal passed 21 times and completed 12 with two touchdowns and one interception. Punter Hernandez punted once for 47 yards. Little Miss Friona pageants. The offense had 71 plays for 421 yards at an average of 5.9 yards per play.

New law prohibits drivers from texting while driving

Effective September 1, 2017, texting while driving will be illegal across the state of Texas as the result of a new texting-whiledriving ban passed during the 85th Texas Legislative Session. The law prohibits motorists from reading, writing or sending electronic messages while driving.

"One in five crashes in Texas is caused by distracted driving," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "We are pleased the Texas Legislature recognizes the extreme danger caused by texting and driving. The new law sends a very clear message to Texans to put down their phones and focus on the road. We are hopeful this new law will help save lives and reduce injuries."

Last year, 109,658 traffic crashes in Texas involved distracted driving. Those crashes resulted in 455 deaths and 3,087 serious injuries.

While distracted drivers risk injuring or killing themselves and others, they also now face penalties under the new statewide law. A first offense is punishable by a fine up to \$99; any subsequent offense carries a fine up to \$200. Drivers should be aware that some cities have additional ordinances that are more restrictive. Exceptions to the new law include emergency communication or electronic messaging when the vehicle is stopped.


For those under 18 years of age, Texas law already bans all cell phone use while driving, including hands-free, except in the case of emergencies. Additionally, drivers are currently banned from texting and using hand-held cellular devices while driving in school zones. School bus operators also are prohibited from using cell phones while driving if children are present.

To help educate the public on the new law, TxDOT will be posting information on portable roadside message signs as well as permanent signs along interstate and U.S. highways.



Enrollment open for Texas College Tuition Program

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds families that open enrollment in the Texas Tuition Promise FundSM, the state's prepaid college tuition program, began September 1 and runs through February 28, 2018. The Texas Tuition Promise Fund offers parents and loved ones the chance to prepay a child's education at Texas public colleges and universities at today's prices.

"A Texas Tuition Promise Fund account is an opportunity to start paying for future college expenses and is a good way to give your child a path to a college education," Hegar said. "Planning for your child's education today helps save money on tomorrow's expenses."

Participants in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund purchase prepaid "tuition units" that can later be used toward undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at Texas public colleges and universities. Prices are based on 2017-18 academic year costs for the state's public colleges and universities.

Type I units, priced for undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at the most expensive Texas public four-year university, cost \$137.92 per unit.

Type II units, based on the weighted average cost of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees across all Texas public four-year schools, cost \$97.90 per unit.

Type III units, priced at the weighted average cost of in-district tuition and schoolwide required fees across all Texas public two-year community colleges, cost \$25.05 per unit.

Under the plan, 100 units equal roughly one academic year consisting of 30 semester hours of undergraduate resident tuition third place winners from each of the grade groups. Winners will be and schoolwide required fees at the Texas public school that most closely matches the unit's pricing base. Participants can purchase

up to 600 Type I units — approximately six academic years — or the dollar equivalent of Type II or III units.

The plan's payment options include lump-sum payments, installment payments that include 8 percent interest or a pay-as-yougo option that allows participants to gradually add more units when the family budget allows. Enrollment requires payment of a one-time application fee of \$25 and the purchase of at least one tuition unit of any type. Payments can be as low as \$15 after an account is established.








PPHM debuts Lonesome Dove exhibition Sept. 8

Go behind the scenes of the LONESOME DOVE miniseries, one of the most loved westerns of all time. Photographs from the filming of LONESOME DOVE are on display at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum September 8 until December 3, 2017. LONESOME DOVE is a traveling exhibition created by the Wittliff Collections at Texas State University in San Marcos, in partnership with Humanities Texas, the state affiliate of the National Endowment for

Taken by Bill Wittliff, award winning screenwriter, author and photographer, the photos capture the essence of the four-part drama. Wittliff wrote screenplays for the iconic miniseries and won a Writers Guild of America Award in 1990 for Season 1, Episode 1: "Leaving." and a Bronze Wrangler award from the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum. The television phenomenon was watched by 26 million, at a time when the western genre was considered dead by those who thought they understood what

It was an adaption of a 1985 novel of the same name by Larry McMurtry. At the time of publication, Lonesome Dove was the first published book, but third installment of series written by McMurtry. It won the 1985 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. The novel and the miniseries focused on a trail drive made by two former Texas Rangers - Captain Woodrow F. Call and Captain August "Gus" McCrae. When asked by readers about the origin of the characters, McMurtry said they were not modeled after historical character, but had similarities with real-life cattle drivers Oliver Loving and Charles Goodnight.

Time will tell what Harvey did to coastal landscapes

Unlike people and animals, plants can't evacuate when threatening weather approaches, and long tenures in flood waters can take a toll.

But as water recedes and people recover their homes in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, landscapes also will need to be watched for signs of stress, said Stephen Brueggerhoff, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service horticulture agent in Brazoria County.

"A little bit of rain is not too bad, but too much rain can be detrimental to the health of any plant," Brueggerhoff said. "These were extraordinary circumstances, so at this point it is really just a matter of waiting to see what the impact be supersaturated, and the plants are absorb-

Brueggerhoff said soil saturation is key.

"For perennial plants, what we really are concerned with are saturated soils that create conditions for root rot," he said. "When the rain saturates the soils causing a collection of water, plants may be standing or submerged in water."

Once saturated, there are not many options to help perennial plants, he said, except to watch for signs of stress.

"The roots of all plants need oxygen through the soil," Brueggerhoff explained. "Once the soils get saturated, that creates an anaerobic environment where the roots are not getting proper oxygenation within the soils.

"Just wait a little bit for the plant to tell you if there are signs of decline. It is not necessary to move the plants immediately," he said. "But if stress does begin to show, the owner may decide to move those plants away from the saturation."

Stress reveals itself in plants through discoloration, often as yellowing or purplish leaves, he

Another situation that might impede plant recovery is debris that remains from floods.

"When the water recedes, there may be other organic matter deposited on the plants," he said. "As soon as you can get to the plants, pull off that matter and let that area dry out a little

When the soil is less saturated, Brueggerhoff said, residents can return to "regular mainte-

"If we get into the rest of our summer without unusually heavy rains, soils appear not to ing moisture from the soil, re-mulch them," he

Woody species such as shrubs and trees take longer to show stress, he noted.

"They often don't tell us too quickly what is going on with them as far as decline. Sometimes we will not see a tree or shrub responding to those kinds of environmental conditions for six months to a year," Brueggerhoff said.

He described an ash tree that stood in 4 feet of water near his home for two days.

"The water receded quickly, so two days of saturation probably is not going to hurt that tree," he said. "But if we have plants that are under saturation for up to a week, for some plants it can cause a decline in the long run. Sometimes those kinds of conditions can be an entry point for other pathogens to grow. And things of that nature can cause the plant to decline in the long run.

"At this point, it is just a matter of waiting to see how our plants respond."

Back-seat belt use overlooked aspect of traffic safety

While the overall use of safety belts has increased over the decades, a look into the back seat of many vehicles today tells a different story," said Bev Kellner. Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service traffic safety program manager, College Station.

"According to a recent Insurance Institute for Highway Safety survey, four out of the five adults who admit to not using a safety belt in the back seat said they are least likely to use them during short trips or when using a taxi or rideshare service," Kellner said.

She said the survey exposes a common misperception among vehicle passengers that sitting in the back seat of a vehicle is safer than sitting in the front.

"Using a safety belt in the back seat is just as important as using one in the front seat," Kellner said. "It may have been true in the past that the rear seat was safer, but that's not really the case now thanks to new technologies and improved vehicle manufacturing."

The tendency to not wear safety belts in the back seat of a taxi or ride-share vehicle could become a habit for the non-use of back seat safety belts in a regular vehicle, she said. And this was validated by the study, which showed those who reported most of their trips as a rear-seat passenger in hired vehicles were also less likely to use rear-seat safety belts in their personal vehicles.

"As it becomes a habit for people to use their safety belts, it can become a habit not to as well, especially if there's a mistaken perception that the back seat is already a safe space," she said. "And a habit that develops when using a service like a taxi, Lyft or Uber can carry over into the use of a personal vehicle."

In its study of 1,172 respondents, the IIHS study found that among respondents who said they had ridden in the back seat of a vehicle during the preceding six months, 72 percent said they always used a back seat belt while 91 percent said they always use their front seat belt.

The study showed adults 35 to 54 were the least likely to fasten their safety belts while in the back seat of a vehicle. Only 66 percent of this age group buckled up in the back seat, while 76 percent of adults 55 and older and 73 percent of adults 18 to 34 reported buckling up. In addition, women and adults who had attended college were more likely to use a safety belt in the rear seat. And only 57 percent of passengers in hired vehicles reported always using their belt in the rear seat.

"Another misperception addressed by the IIHS study is that rear-seat passengers feel in a collision their non-use of seat belts will not have any effect on the driver or front-seat passengers," Kellner said. "But the fact is any item or person in the back seat can become a 'pro-

jectile' to be tossed around the interior of the vehicle and kill or badly injure other passengers. That's one of the reasons you should never hold a child in your lap while inside a vehicle. And in the case of rollover crashes, unbelted passengers, whether in the front or rear seat, can easily be thrown from the vehicle."

"Front-seat occupant safety has received a great deal of attention and vehicle manufacturers have taken great strides by enhancing protective features in those positions," said Joseph Colella, owner of Traffic Safety Projects based in Charleston, South Carolina, and a nationally recognized traffic safety expert. "While rear seats have not received the same level of attention and progress, crash statistics prove that buckling up properly is crucial for all occupants, regardless of their seating positions. Unless everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained, none of the occupants are optimally protected."

Kellner said while the study noted the main reason people gave for not buckling up in the rear seat was they felt it was safer, other reasons included not being in the regular habit of using a safety belt, belts were uncomfortable or fit poorly, and belts were difficult to find and use.

"The survey also showed not having a law that required rear-seat passengers to buckle up was an impediment," Kellner said. "Fortunately, in Texas our law requires all passengers — both front and back, including those in multi-passenger vehicles — to use their seat belts. It also requires children under 8, unless taller than 4 feet, 9 inches, be put in a car seat used according to the manufacturer's requirements."

Kellner said while it is the responsibility of the rear-seat passenger to buckle up, technology and others in the vehicle can help ensure they


"Another interesting part of the IIHS study was that almost two-thirds of occasional or non-users of rear-seat safety belts said an audible reminder would make them more likely to buckle up," she said. "Unfortunately, only a very small percentage of vehicles currently on the road have such reminders. But drivers and other passengers can have an influence on rear-seat passengers by politely asking them to buckle their safety belts."

The study also showed having more comfortable belts would improve the likelihood of rearseat passengers using them, Kellner said.

"Those surveyed said softer or padded belts and adjustable shoulder belts that don't irritate the neck would be preferred, as would somewhat looser or less restrictive belts," she said. "But even though passenger comfort is desirable, a little discomfort or annoyance while buckling up is a small price to pay for one's personal safety and the safety of others."


