Star Publisher passes away after battle with cancer

Longtime Publisher and Editor Ron Carr, 78, lost his battle with cancer and passed from this earth on Monday, November 6, 2017.

Ron joined the Friona Star the same day that the June 2, 1995 tornado wrecked havoc across Friona and the area. Earlier in the day, he had asked Bill Ellis "Does anything exciting ever happen here?" and Bill replied, "Not really. This time of year we have to search for news to have a headline

Ron moved with his family from Tulsa where they resided for six years. He previously owned and operated a travel agency in Dallas for over 20 years. The family's move to Friona was prompted because his mother and stepfather, Hannah and Harry Lookingbill lived here, as well as his brother Rick.

During his many years in the travel industry, he wrote articles for the travel trade, as well as training manuals, travel brochures, and newsletters.

Grandpa's brick

Quite a few years ago when I began working at the Friona Star, Ron let me write a column about the Lubbock Veteran's Memorial and my Grandpa Hefner. Grandpa passed away about a week after the column first ran.

I thought it was appropriate that I bring it back this week in honor of grandpa and all the veterans that have served so valiantly for their country.

1941. What December 7, thoughts come to mind? Is it just another day?

I was not born until 1961, so my memories of Pearl Harbor are from a history book, old movies and the History Channel. My grandpa remembers the day

very clearly. He was supposed to be on his honeymoon. He had married my granny the day before. He always used to wink and say that he started two wars in two days. Granny would do her usual of giving him a look. Nevertheless, she knew he meant it with love.

Sunday, December 7, 2003 marked the sixty-second anniversary of the Pearl Harbor bombing.

It was observed in Lubbock with the dedication of the Lubbock Area Veterans War Memorial. Unfortunately, granny did not get to see this memorial. She passed away in January of 2000.

Grandpa was able to attend though. He was in a wheel chair and had his ever-present oxygen tank but he was surrounded by family; his wife, Leona; daughter, Tana Young; myself, my husband Coy, our two sons, Tyler and Joshua; and a family friend, Kary Mathys from Farwell.

Near the entrance to the memorial we found grandpa's brick. He was speechless. He was finally getting to see his birthday present. The brick was the only present he wanted this year for his 84th birthday.

The American Legion sold bricks to fund the special memorial and that was all he wanted. Each brick held the name, rank, place of deployment and various other information. Grandpa's brick reads Jacob M. Hefner, MSGT, USA 1941-45, World War II, Frederick,

As I helped grandpa past the

hundreds of names on the memorial he would reach out, touch some of the bricks, and wonder out loud if the name belonged to someone he had known.

The ceremony started promptly at 2 p.m. with the playing of patriotic music by the Westwinds Brass Band and "Amazing Grace" by Bagpipers Jonathan Milton and Associates. The colors were presented by the EMS Honor Guard. Ray Hill of The Buffalo Springs Community Church offered the prayer. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Dr. James Reckner.

Kenny Maines, formerly of the Maines Brothers, sang the National Anthem. Various other speakers were presented including City Councilman T.J. Patterson and Congressman Randy Neugebauer. "God Bless America" was followed by a 21-gun salute from the United States Marine Corp. "Taps" was played and the colors were retired. Congressman Neugebauer made a special presentation of the flag flown over the Capitol.

Members of each branch of the service raised the colors for the official opening of the Lubbock Area Veterans War Memorial.

After the ceremony grandpa was quiet as we rolled him back to his car. He finally spoke when we were back at his home. He said how nice the memorial had been and held back tears remembering what the day before should have been.

Grandpa is one of so many that have gone forth and served their country with honor. They are the ones that have made the sacrifices that so many of us have never made. We should honor our veterans every day.

If you should ever get the chance to visit Lubbock, swing by the Lubbock Area Veterans War Memorial on 82nd and Nashville. It is such a beautiful and serene park. But not just that, it is a place to honor those who sacrificed so much, so we can be a free nation.

Our country needs to remember all the veterans, every day. We need to put aside our petty issues and be thankful for what we have.

To all the veterans out there... Thank you!

My dear friend, Ron, passed away Monday, November 6, 2017 after needed to find my own way. He couldn't tell me what to do, I had to a hard fought battle with cancer. Four little words and he described it to a tee.

When he first bought the paper I applied for a job as a typist. I was hired to type up everything from classified ads to obituaries to press releases. He trusted me to get them done and spell all the words right.

When I started, the staff included Ron, Marlene Mueller, Nathan Parson, and Sherry Carr. Laura Hart and Holly Campbell were not full time but they were part of the Friona Star family.

As time went on, I felt like I could do more. I would watch him on the sidelines of football games and finally got up the nerve to ask him if I could do that too.

I am sure he was frustrated when I started because I could use a whole roll of film and maybe, on a good day, get one good picture for the paper. But he kept sending me out to take pictures at events, accidents, etc. and eventually digital cameras were invented. That was the break-through. No more film...no more wasted money and time.

I had read his columns for years and I still don't know where he came up with all those words. Those words encouraged, outraged and even comforted his readers. And in the end, inspired me.

He eventually let me write for the paper and my first being run over by a referee at a football game, "Look out for that zebra!" All I remember from the experience was that the camera was in three pieces and Ron was going to kill me if I couldn't fix it.

To say he was my mentor seems so trivial. He was my mentor but he also was much more. He taught me that patience will get me the best story and best picture. He taught me to write from my heart.

I am sure I frustrated him more times than he let on. We had our moments when we didn't like each other very much but it always worked

He taught me these lessons:

"If it bleeds it leads."




Panhandle Parables Community, Ties That Bind



On Saturday, the Friona Squaws traveled to Seminole, Texas to take on the Alpine Lady Bucks in the Area round of the State Play-


After meeting Charles Haley, the All-Pro Dallas Cowboys football player, on a stop at Allsups in Plains, the Squaws came out fired up and ready to play.





Allen, Looper honored with Statewide Awards for Service

Friona-born siblings Jodi Allen (Looper) and Lance Looper followed their heart and took a running start and jumped right into the lake. Well, the lake business, that is. They both ended up in the marina industry after graduating from Friona High School and attending college. Marina management became their passion and focus as they began working with two marinas near Austin, Texas on Lake Travis. Lake Travis is a part of the scenic Highland Lakes chain of hill country lakes known for the surrounding abundant wildlife, limestone bluffs and overlooks and beautiful glistening waters. Just west of Austin, Allen manages Lakeway Marina, which is located on the south side of Lake Travis. Her younger brother Lance manages Riviera Marina on the North side of the lake. The siblings' hard work ethic and determination to succeed contributes to recent statewide awards bestowed upon their marinas. Their two Lake Travis Marinas were awarded top honors by the Marina Association of Texas in October. Lakeway Marina received the Outstanding Small Marina of the Year award (based on 350 boat slips or less) and its sister marina, Riviera Marina on the North side of Lake Travis, took the Large Marina of the Year award (having more than 350 slips). The competition is open to 150 marinas across the state of Texas and these two marinas are celebrating this recognition for steadfast, hard work. "I've been wanting to win this award since I started at Lakeway Marina in 2001 but we had a long way to go before achieving it. We finally did it," Allen says.

This West Texas gal and her brother are riding herd over quite a lot. They are just driving and rounding up a different type of animal than you see so often in Parmer County. "At Lakeway Marina, we have 10 runabouts, 8 pontoons, 7 Waverunners, 2 ski boats with drivers, 2 party barges, 6 kayaks, 14 stand up paddleboards and a fishing



Marina. We have a full-service department and fuel dock and I have approximately 25 employees under me during the summer months and 10 full timers year round," Allen says. She says there is an expediency in working within a family owned business that is catapulting them to reaching their goals. "We get things done because we are family owned and operated. My husband and mother in law own the two marinas and working for a mom and pop business is much easier than working in a corporate situation which I worked in prior to 2008. Things get done quicker and much easier because we don't have to go through a lot of politics or higher ups to get to a decision made," Allen says. The Marina of the Year competition is based on overall appearance, quality of facilities and services including launch facilities, food service, ship's store, gas dock, service and repair area, docks, recreation areas, and special awards for service, promotions, civic affairs, employee recognition, as well as unique community service or educational programs. "There are many marinas that apply for these awards each year. This year has been one of the most exceptional years that I can remember as the Marina of the Year Chairman. Both Riviera and Lakeway Marinas have displayed over and above the recommended criteria," says Bill Gausphol is chairman for the annual awards project which is presented by the Marina Association of Texas. "Both of these marinas are an example of what should become the standard for both customer service and cleanliness of the facility. It was a pleasure evaluating both of these marinas this year and I look forward to the future," Gausphol says.

Allen, a 1995 graduate of Friona High School and a 2000 Graduate of Texas Tech University started at Lakeway Marina February of 2001 as the assistant store manager for Lakeway Marina. She became the store manager in 2002 and then the buyer/marketing manager for Sun Resorts International in 2004. In 2008, she became manager

of Lakeway Marina. Looper, a 1996 graduate of Friona High School took the ball and ran from there to Eastern New Mexico University for a degree in 2004. Looper coached in Lubbock for a few years, but he sure couldn't let his sister Jodi have all of the lake business fun. He became employed by Riviera Marina in 2008. He worked his way up the ladder to become General Manager of

the marina in 2013. Looper has flourished as a marina manager using everything he learned from past experiences to grow the boat business. He participates in industry organizations and fundraising projects like the most recent one that benefitted

Allen and Looper are the adult children of Jayn Looper and the late C.B. Looper.

Close in age, the siblings can't "one-up" one another in business goals with some friendly sibling rivalry anymore. The two have worked hard to make their marinas succeed and validation comes with the two Marina of the Year plaques for BOTH businesses.

"This award means a lot to me and to all of us at Riviera Marina and we really couldn't have done it without our great customers, tenants and employees from top to bottom," Looper said.

Totally restored, the boat was then hoisted high above the dressing rooms in the Lakeway Ships Store where visitors and neighbors come to shop for resort attire, beverages, ice cream and the latest lake gear. Jodi Allen has years of experience in buying for the shop which carries sought after lines like Columbia, Billabong and more. A variety of rentals keep things interesting at the two marinas. From ski boats, kayaks and Waverunners to paddleboards, party barges and pontoons, there is something for everyone that is ready to launch. Staying on top of trends in water recreation is important for marina management, Jodi Allen says. Keeping it running and providing instruction on how to operate these things is also key to keeping customers returning for good times. Allen does weekly dock walks to make sure Lakeway Marina is clean from trash and the ever-present lakeside spider webs. She painstakingly looks for any safety items that may need to be addressed. Longtime slip tenant Robert Etheridge of Lakeway says that he doesn't know of another marina that cares as much as do the staff of Lakeway Marina. "Most marinas expect their slip tenants to clean up around their boat but they go beyond that and make sure it is always nice and clean," Etheridge says.
