Friona City Council welcomes new city manager

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, January 8, 2018 in Council Chambers at 619 Main Street.

The first order of business was to welcome Leander "Lee" Davila as the new Friona City Manager. He began his tenure with Friona on Tuesday, January 2.

The council approved, without amendments, the minutes from the December 11, 2017 regular city council meeting, the December 12, 2017 emergency city council meeting and the December 20, 2017 special city council meeting.

Friona Chief of Police Isidro Jimenez reported on the Friona Police Department activities for the month of December. He stated, "It was an okay year."

Chief Jimenez reported that the police officers drove 2,607 miles and had 131 calls for fire/EMS/ police. Five arrests were made, with 13 citations, 28 warnings and 41 stops completed for December. The arrests included one for no

drivers' license, one for public intoxication, two for warrant service, and one for possession of marijuana.

Jimenez informed the council that efforts were being made to bring a presentation from TAASA (Texas Association Against Sexual Assault) to Friona. He also informed the council that the police department is still in need of a police officer.

Kenny Ford addressed the council concerning a variance for an existing building that is one foot outside his property line. The council approved the request after confirming that all the appropriate signatures had been acquired.



On the road with Dad

While everyone was recovering from Christmas and gearing up for New Year's Eve, I hit the road with my dad. Dad hauls mules to military installations around the country. (Let me clarify the word 'mules'. He does not haul the four-legged, two-eared, braying kind of mule. These mules are six-seater, all-terrain vehicles specifically designed for military use.)

Dad is retired and has been doing this for a several years and has visited many of the military bases in the U.S.

If I had waited until he got back from Florida, I would have had only a day or so with him. I guess you could say I was pushy and talked him into letting me go with him. I had never been to Florida or many of the other states he planned to cross on his way to the air base. Little did I know that I would get a full-blown lesson on truck driving and the rules of the road.

We hit the road the day after Christmas from Oklahoma City headed to Hurlburt Air Base in Florida.

Rule number one is to pack light and do not expect to stop at every tourist site along the way.

I packed a small bag with what basics I would need and found that I over packed. You only need one pair of jeans and two t-shirts for a three and a half day trip but I was ready for at least one more day.

My dad has been a truck driver most of his life. He has hauled everything from jet fuel to Pepsi Cola. For this job, he hauls 3-4 mules at a time. Not jet fuel but just as important.

After leaving Oklahoma City, the open road stretched out before us with nothing but time to catch up on family stuff and talk about the trip.

Louisiana was the first stop for the night and I can honestly say that I have never seen so much water or trees submerged in water. It was raining when we finally stopped so we slept in the truck-Dad in the driver's seat and me in the bunk behind him. (Dad sleeps sitting up most nights.)

It was still raining when we got up the next morning before the sun was up. I got to prove I could help by climbing up on the back of the trailer to secure the roof on one of the mules that had blown open. I had to do this twice before we got it totally secure with a strap. (I am not as young as I once was. Climbing is much more difficult at 56 than at 16.)

There were many more miles to be driven, so we hit the road and only stopped for fuel and a quick breakfast at a truck stop.

When Willie Nelson sang "On the Road Again", he was not kidding. We were on the road again as soon as the truck was fueled.

Dad had a bit of a surprise for me. He knew I had never been to New Orleans and instead of going a different route around New Orleans, he went straight through New Orleans. I did the tourist thing...me taking pictures with my phone as we crossed bridges I have seen on NCIS New Orleans, the Superdome, so many cemeteries, and all the other sights that can be seen from the Interstate.

We crossed bridges that were forever long. There was no way to turn around so you have to follow the bridge until dry land appears.

The Interstate offered spectacular views of the Gulf of Mexico and the ships that cross it. I had watched documentaries about building bridges across but I actually got to see the ships and barges that do that work. It was amazing what they have to do just to get ready to put the road across those pillars.

We made it to the air base that night but could not unload so we had to find a place to park for the night. The Gulf of Mexico was about half a mile from where we parked. Even though it was raining, it was beautiful.

Early Thursday morning, we went to the air base and unloaded the mules with the help of Ken. Ken was our guide into and out of the base. He asked us where we were from and, of course, I had to explain where Friona was located.

When I said 40 miles northeast of Cannon Air Force Base, he pinpointed the location and told me that they had guys from Cannon on their base at that time.

Ken led us off the base and it was time to hit the road again. We had to be back in Oklahoma City by Friday evening or Saturday morning at the latest.

Dad gave me the option to go back the way we had come or take a different route. I took the second option and got to see most of Mississippi from the coast to Tennessee. Dad took it pretty easy on the way home and we made a few stops along the way. In Alabama, I had to have a "Sweet Home Alabama" shirt and we were off again.

Thursday night was spent in a Pilot Truck Stop parking lot in Mississippi with hundreds of other trucks. You know, 3:30 a.m. comes pretty early in the morning. Dad wanted to make it out of Memphis before rush hour. We made it and found a truck stop that served one of the best breakfasts I have had in a very long time. The waitress was a joy because she had a sense of humor and kept us laughing throughout the meal. I walked away from that meal with full tummy and a smile on my face.

Dad said that while I dosed I missed seeing Elvis...I think he was kidding.

The clouds parted for a while after we got to Oklahoma but came back together as we got to Oklahoma City the cold front started coming back and boy did it bring frigid temperatures with it.

We had covered 11 states in 3 1/2 days and I had a great time on the road with dad. I can honestly say that time with dad is PRICELESS. Dad is 76-years-old and has had a VERY full life filled with good times and some pretty rough ones. If he called tomorrow and said he wanted me to ride with him



Showmanship rules:

Each show will have two age divisions—Junior 8-13 and Senior 14 and up. Showmanship classes will be held after completing judging in each species and will be open to all exhibitors of that spe-

The Stevens 5 Star Deal of the Week!



Showmanship selection will be based on the exhibitor's efforts within the classes as well as during showmanship competition class. The state-mandated "No Pass, No Play" rules will apply. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by UIL rules, then the exhibitor and his/her animals are not eligible to compete in this show.

One hundred and forty animals will be sold at the Saturday, January 20th sale. Only Grand and Reserve Grand will be presented. All other sale exhibitors will walk through the ring without their animals. Premium on animals will be by the head.

The sale order will be steers, goats, barrows, rabbits and lambs. Grand and Reserve Grand of each species will sell the same order. Two percent of the selling price will be retained by the Stock Show Board for repair and improvement to stock show facilities.

Individual species rules include:

Lambs-Classes will be fine wool, fine wool crossbreed, medium wool, Southdown, dorper and "decisions" (left to the classifier of the show). Lambs must weigh 80 lbs. to show. Ewe lambs may be shown. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Goats-Only wether or doe goats are eligible. The show is open to any breed or crossbreed. Horns must be tipped. Goats may be shown with hair or may be slick horn and must weigh between 60 lbs. and 115 lbs. A 3 lb. tolerance will be allowed. Exhibitors may use halters or collars in the show ring. Entry fee is \$15 per head. Ownership deadline was November 1, 2017.

Steers-Breeds will be Crossbred, American and British. Steers must weigh 900 lbs. to show any steer deemed wild or unruly will be barred from the show. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Barrows-Classes are York, Chester white, crossbreed, berk, duroc, hamp, Poland, spot and landrace. Barrows must weigh between 170 lbs. and 280 lbs. A 5 lb. tolerance will be allowed. Entry fee is \$15 per head. Ownership deadline was December 1, 2017.

There will be a prospect class for all barrows weighing less than the minimum required. All barrows of all breeds will compete together in the prospect class. Barrows exhibited in the prospect class will be eligible to qualify for the Premium Sale at the same percentage as all other classes. The breed championships or grand championships.

For barrows showmanship, there will two age divisions. Showmanship exhibitors will be selected by committee during the barrow show. The selected exhibitors will then be asked to show again upon completion of the barrow show. The barrow show judge will select winners in each age division.

Rabbits—This is a single fryer, carrying cage show. Age limit is 12 weeks old with no weight limit. The jackpot show will have a payout of 1st place-50 percent; 2nd place-30 percent; and 3rd place-20 percent. Exhibitors will be limited to four fryer rabbits. Entry fee is \$5 per head. First and second place rabbits will be in the sale. Third, fourth and fifth place will be in the jackpot. Ownership deadline was December 22, 2017.

Heifers--There will be a jackpot show for heifers and these animals are not eligible for the Premium Sale. They must be younger than 24 months of age on the day of the show. They will not be divided by breed but put into classes by date of birth. Classes will be determined after all heifers have been checked in. General show rules apply and entry fee is \$30 per head.



December sales tax revenue \$2.7 billion

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar recently announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.75 billion in December, 12.3 percent more than in December 2016.

"Double-digit growth in sales tax revenue was fueled by collections from oiland gas-related sectors as well-drilling and completion continued to rebound," Hegar said. "But growth in tax receipts was notable across all major economic sectors, including retail trade and restaurants."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in December 2017 was up 10.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuels and oil and natural gas production also rose in December 2017:

--motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$414.3 million, up 16.1 percent from December 2016 (vehicle purchases to replace cars damaged by Hurricane Harvey continued to boost those tax collections);

--motor fuel taxes — \$303.7 million, up 4.9 percent from December 2016; and --oil and natural gas production taxes — \$396.4 million, up 73.4 percent from December 2016.


Seliger recognized by TAC



~Psalm 59~ **Problems and Praise**

Nations on the brink of war, opioid addiction destroying lives, politicians scheming and maneuvering for clout and influence, uncertainties in the year ahead and much more problems consume the news that is so often flashing before us. In light of the uncertainties and difficulties at hand should you run to the hills and hide, stand your ground, or look for a better course of action?

Psalm 59 comes out of a tumultuous time in David's life, during the period after he had risen to national fame by slaving Goliath, but before he had been crowned King after King Saul's death. During this period he was a faithful servant to King Saul, but Saul's jealously turned his heart against David and led him in trying to kill David in various ways. One such attempt was assassination while David slept in his bed, which David escaped from thanks to his wife (1 Sam 19:11).

Psalm 59 captures David's response to this situation as he coped with it. Most of the Psalm is a prayer for God's deliverance, which culminates in the final two verses where David commits to "sing of your strength; I will sing aloud of your steadfast love in the morning." The singing was driven by God being a sure refuge and fortress in troubled times for David, so he drove his soul in praise and trust in the Lord. When fears abound, or trials encroach, run to the Lord, who is a sure refuge and fortress, and as you trust in Him, praise Him for the problems He is greater than, and will deliver you from or lead you through.

Jay Edwin Beene



The fun continued throughout her short life.

"We were just riding around one day and she was like, 'Look it's a Sweet Bran truck," Friend Faith Conner said. "She said, 'They're following me'."

This was one of many fond memories friends and family have of Macey. It's one Macey's mom said continued after she died in December of 2016 of an asthma attack.

"I was just blown away," Jones said. "All I wanted was a t-shirt and they have just done so much. Then, a little bit after Thanksgiving, they sent a check, a donation, for the band of \$10,000. The company is just amazing. The people are amazing."

The donation came after the band's third place medalist finish at the State Marching Band competition. Friends of Macey say the hard work was in honor of her.

"It's Macey," Karley Jones said. "She made that impact."

Macey's mom said she has received Facebook messages from folks as far away as Iowa and Colorado who have spotted the new and improved trucks.

She says she's grateful Macey's life has impacted something she loved so much, her band.

"It's amazing," Jones said. "I never thought a little girl from Earth, Texas would make such a big impact on people."



Treider comes full circle from Lazbuddie to Vegas to home

Larry Wayne Treider was born in Albuquerque on July 3, 1940 and at the age of six months moved to Lazbuddie where he grew up singing and playing music with his family around the piano.

"Everyone in the family learned to play the piano, it was the only entertainment we had," said Treider.

At the age of 8 he took an axe and cut up a few pieces of wood to make it look like a guitar, painted his name on it, used wire for strings, a piece of twine was the strap and he was soon playing part of his favorite rock & roll country star.

He listened to Johnny Cash and Elvis and soon formed a band and began performing.

"As soon as I learned to play decently and was old enough to

travel, I quit school and was on the road with a band."

The closest recording studio was Norman Petty Studios in Clovis, New Mexico. He made his first recordings in 1956 of two Elvis covers when he was only 15.

At 17, he had a new Amarillo based band, "Larry Trider & The Nomads". They hit the road and traveled the teen dance circuit.

The spelling from Trieder to Trider was a simple decision radio station owner Gil Lamb to make it easier to pronounce. Some were pronouncing his name a Treeder so to reduce the confusion he dropped the first e. Larry recorded with a variety of studios but always seem to go

back to Norman Petty Studios. Trieder remembered that in



celebrated Larry Trider Day in Muleshoe by playing his music all day. The band made a long direct trip after a show in Lansing, Michigan to make the event. The next day they were back on tour.

His debut single was released January 1974 Muleshoe KMUL in April 1974 and he was billed

full album was released later in 1974.

He made frequent appearances at the "Red Raider" nightclub where he formed the Red Riders band and released a single "The Farmer Needs Us All". He went to Washington, DC to sing for farmers who were marching in the protest at the White House. He sang on the White House steps with Senator Bob Dole standing at this side. He later sang in the Senate building for the farmers.

In the early 80's he and the band hit the road and performed at "The Caravan" country venue circuit.

Fast forward to December

as the "Country Soul Man". A 2017, Larry Trieder has a new album of all the old demo tapes from Norman Petty Studios and a few from his recording days in New York.

> Shawn Nagy, of Nor-Va-Jak music, contacted Trieder and wanted to put all of the old demo tapes together for a new CD as a way of saving the history of Norman Petty Studios. He wanted to capture the sound of the time. He also was able to compile all these demo tapes and preserve them on one CD "Larry Trider"

Trieder has recently moved back to Lazbuddie after spending the last 27 years in Las Vegas where he performed until 2002.


Trieder was diagnosed with congestive heart failure along with double pneumonia, which left him in a coma for 16 days. He moved back to his Texas roots and Lazbuddie in 2016.

"I moved back for my peace of mind and to be closer to my family," stated Trieder.

He has led a very colorful life filled with music and now considers our area as 'home'. Though he may no longer travel the world singing, he now creates creative and beautiful walking sticks as a hobby.
