



"Phone scammers are impersonating police a warrant is being issued unless you pay the in several West Texas counties and asking for money," says Sheriff Randy Geries. "We have received reports that scammers call citizens claiming to be various types of law enforcement officials and even our local agencies".

"When people answer the phone, scammers impersonate a sheriff's deputy or police offi-

cer and they claim there is a warrant out for the victim's arrest. The scammers then ask people to wire money to take care of the warrant," says Sheriff Geries.

If a call back number is left, the scammers even have a voicemail set up that sounds like it is the Sheriff's

Office. Sheriff Geries says to also not be fooled if the caller ID shows the call to be coming from a local area code or even a local number. Internet sites and applications allow scammers to obtain local numbers and even false ID's to trick callers.

Another large scam in our area is the fake IRS call. Scammers call and impersonate the IRS you owe back taxes and fees. They tell you that Farwell Police Department: 806-481-3600.

amount immediately, and they ask for a credit card or other payment arrangements. These are all scams. The IRS does not call citizens on these issues.


Sheriff Geries says that it is difficult to track these scammers and that these calls can even originate from other countries. "Our best de-




fense is to educate our citizens to not fall victim in these cases. Don't argue or continue to talk to these scammers, and simply hang up on them." In most cases if a true warrant is issued for your arrest, Sheriff Geries states that you will receive a personal visit from law enforcement.

We encourage citizens to report all crimes along with any possible scam calls. No law enforcement agency will ever ask you for money over the phone. Contact your local law enforcement at the following numbers.

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





Skin Cancer Prevention Tips From The Skin Cancer Foundation

New York, NY (May 1, 2018) — Skin cancer is a disease that affects people of every age, gender and ethnicity. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer by the age of 70; in fact, more people are diagnosed with skin cancer each year in the U.S. than all other cancers combined.

But there is good news: Because skin cancer is chiefly a lifestyle disease, it is also highly preventable. About 90 percent of nonmelanoma skin cancers and about 86 percent of melanomas are associated with exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. Knowing the risk factors and practicing sun protection year-round are key to reducing your risk.

"It's never too early or too late in life to start protecting your skin from sun damage," says Deborah S. Sarnoff, MD, president of The Skin Cancer Foundation. "Parents and caregivers should teach children about sun protection at an early age and help them instill lifelong habits. And even after a lifetime of sun exposure, older people can stop further damage to their skin by making sun protection a priority."

Here are The Skin Cancer Foundation's tips for reducing your skin cancer risk:

Seek the shade, especially between 10 AM and 4 PM when the sun is strongest. An extra rule of thumb is the "shadow rule." If your shadow is shorter than you are, the sun's harmful ultraviolet (UV) radiation is stronger; if your shadow is longer, UV radiation is less intense.

Do not burn. A person's risk for melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, doubles if he or she had had five or more sunburns at any point in life.

Avoid tanning and UV tanning booths. UV radiation from tanning machines is known to cause cancer in humans. Indoor UV tanners are 74 percent more likely to develop melanoma, one of the deadliest forms of skin cancer, than those who have never tanned indoors. Tanning bed users are also 1.5 times more likely to develop basal cell carcinoma and 2.5 times more likely to develop squamous cell carcinoma, two of the most common forms of skin cancer. The more time a person has spent tanning indoors, the higher the risk.

Cover up with clothing, including a broadbrimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses. Clothing can be your most effective form of sun protection, so make the most of it with densely woven and bright- or dark-colored fabrics, which offer the best defense. The more skin you cover, the better, so choose long sleeves and long pants whenever possible.

Use a broad-spectrum (UVA/UVB) sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad-spectrum (UVA/UVB) sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher.

Apply 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) of sunscreen to your entire body 30 minutes before going outside. Reapply every two hours or immediately after swimming or excessive sweating. One eight-ounce bottle of sunscreen should provide two full days of sun protection.

Keep newborns out of the sun. Sunscreens may be used on babies over the age of six months, but they should also be protected by shade and clothing. Children are very sensitive to ultraviolet radiation - just one severe sunburn in childhood doubles the chances of developing melanoma later in life.

Examine your skin, head to toe, every month. While self-exams shouldn't replace the important annual skin exam performed by a physician, they offer the best chance of detecting the early warning signs of skin cancer. If you notice any change in an existing mole or discover any new spot that doesn't heal after several weeks, see a physician immediately.

See your physician every year for a professional skin exam. You can also check DestinationHealthySkin.org to see if The Skin Cancer Foundation's mobile skin cancer screen and education program is coming to your area.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. To request a hearing, a person must actually reside in a permanent residence within 440 yards of the proposed plant. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number; (2) applicant's name and registration number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility; and (7) a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period. If the request is made by a group or association, one or more members who have standing to request a hearing must be identified by name and physical address. The interests which the group or association seeks to protect must be identified. You may submit your proposed adjustments to the application which would satisfy your concerns. See Contacts section.

TCEQ Action. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The executive director's decision on the application, and any response to comments, will be mailed to all persons on the mailing list. If no timely contested case hearing requests are received, or if all hearing requests are withdrawn, the executive director may issue final approval of the application. If all timely hearing requests are not withdrawn, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled commission meeting. The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material air quality concerns submitted during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding

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What Should Investors Know About Recent Volatility?

As you may have heard, the stock market has been on a wild ride lately. What's behind this volatility? And, as an investor, how concerned should you be?

Let's look at the first question first. What caused the steep drop in stock prices we experienced on a few separate days?

Essentially, two main factors seem to be responsible. First, some good economic news may actually have played a significant role. A 17-year low in unemployment and solid job growth have begun to push wages upward. These developments have led to fears of rising inflation, which, in turn, led to speculation that the Federal Reserve will tighten the money supply at a faster-thanexpected rate. Stocks reacted negatively to these expectations of higher interest rates.

The second cause of the market volatility simply appears to be a reaction to the long bull market. While rising stock prices lead many people to continue buying more and more shares, some people actually need to sell their stocks - and this pent-up selling demand, combined with short-term profittaking, helped contribute to the large selloffs of recent days. Now, as for the question of how concerned you should be about this volatility, consider these points:

• Sell-offs are nothing unusual. We've often experienced big sell-offs, but they've generally been followed by strong recoveries. Of course, past performance is not a guarantee of future results, but history has shown that patient, persistent investors are often rewarded.

• Fundamentals are strong. While shortterm market movements can be caused by a variety of factors, economic conditions and corporate earnings typically drive performance in the long term. Right now, the U.S. economy is near full employment, consumer and business sentiment has risen strongly, manufacturing and service activity is at multi-year highs, and GDP growth in 2018 appears to be on track for its best performance since 2015. Furthermore, corporate earnings are expected to rise this year. So, given this background, what's your next move? Here are some suggestions:

• Review your situation. You may want to work with a financial professional to determine if your portfolio is helping you make the progress you need to achieve your long-term goals.

• Reassess your risk tolerance. If you were unusually upset over your investments' loss of value during the market pullback, you may need to review your risk tolerance to determine if it's still appropriate for your investment mix. If you feel you are taking on too much risk, you may need to rebalance your portfolio.

Keep in mind, though, that by playing it safe and investing heavily in vehicles that offer greater protection of principal, but little in the way of return, you run the risk of not attaining the growth you need to reach your objectives.

· Look for opportunities. A market pullback such as the one we've experienced, which occurs during a period of economic expansion and rising corporate profits, can give long-term investors a chance to add new shares at attractive prices in an environment that may be conducive to a market rally.

A sharp market pullback, such as we've seen recently, will always be big news. But if you look beyond the headlines, you can sometimes see a different picture - and one that may be brighter than you had realized.

Texas Comptroller Announces Opening of Texas ABLE[®] Program

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today announced that the new Texas Achieving a Better Life Experience (Texas ABLE[®]) Program is open for enrollment.

Texas ABLE, based on federal and state legislation, gives Texans with disabilities and their families the opportunity to save money for disability-related expenses in a tax-advantaged account without losing their eligibility for certain public benefits such as Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Medicaid.

"For too long, Texans with disabilities have been unable to work toward financial independence without endangering their benefits," Hegar said. "Texas ABLE will help remove this barrier."

Texas ABLE will be administered by the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board through the Texas Comptroller's office. The program is open to eligible Texans who experience the onset of a disability before the age of 26 and are entitled to SSI or SSDI benefits, or have a condition on the Social Security Administration's list of Compassionate Allowances Conditions or a physician's diagnosis of a qualifying condition.

Any eligible adult who is at least 18 years old or an authorized legal representative (a parent, legal guardian or other fiduciary) for an eligible individual can open a Texas ABLE account and use it to save up to \$15,000 per year (or even more, if

exceptions in the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 apply). ABLE account funds up to \$100,000 are generally disregarded for purposes of determining eligibility to receive government assistance or benefits.

ABLE account funds, including any earnings, are not subject to federal income tax if used for qualified expenses related to the eligible individual's disability and for maintaining or improving his or her health, independence or quality of life. An eligible individual can have only one ABLE account.

Anyone, including the eligible individual, family, friends, business entities or trusts, may contribute to an ABLE account. A "gifting" feature in the online Texas ABLE system will make it easy to provide such contributions.

Texas ABLE offers three managed allocation investment options and one bank savings account option. Participants can choose the option that best meets their personal needs and savings goals.

"This is a great opportunity for those who qualify," Hegar said. "Texas ABLE will help Texans with disabilities become more independent and give them a path toward a more secure future."





Skip the DPS lines this summer by going online

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding residents that many customers can skip the trip to a driver license (DL) office altogether, which is especially convenient during the busy summer months. Most residents who are eligible to skip the trip are not taking advantage of the option to quickly renew their Texas DL or identification (ID) card online (or by phone). Address changes can also be taken care of online (or by mail) in many instances. Find out if you are eligible to renew online by visiting Texas.gov.

"Summer is one of the busiest times at Texas driver license offices, but taking advantage of technology options can save you time," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "If you qualify for online renewal, you can skip the trip to an office altogether. However, if you must go to an office in person, we encourage residents to visit a high-capacity Mega Center or to 'get in line' remotely before heading to the DL office, if those options are available."

High-capacity DL Mega Centers are primarily available in major metropolitan areas. In addition, many offices across the state also leverage a queuing system that offers customers the convenient option of reserving a spot in line through the DPS website, by mobile phone or a landline before going to the office. For a list of the high-capacity Mega Centers, as well as the offices that offer the "Get in Line, Online" feature, visit the DPS website.

Another underutilized option available to customers who are required to make an office visit is renewing their DL or ID card early, which allows customers to choose a convenient time that best fits their schedule, and potentially avoid the busiest times at DL offices. Did you know you can renew up to two years in advance of the expiration date on your current card if you go into an office, or up to one year in advance if you are renewing online? The new expiration date will remain the same - even if you renew early. Visit the DPS website to make sure you have the proper paperwork (including documents needed for residency requirements) before making a trip to the office.



Satisfied Students

Student satisfaction and customer satisfaction are not equal. Students are not customers except when they spend a night in their dorm room or buy a meal in the cafeteria, a book at the bookstore or a shirt with the school logo. The remainder of the time, students are aspirants. They work diligently to become something they are not. They pay universities to help transform them from whatever they are into something they aspire to be, such as a teacher, nurse, engineer, historian or rancher. If they knew how to think and act as these professionals do, they would not need to pay the university anything. Students do not buy a product, but a transformational opportunity. Universities irreparably harm themselves when they sell opportunity as a product. Opportunity is difficult to measure, and even more difficult to communicate to an aspirant.

College to Life, a recent study by Strata/ Gallup, catalogs why students choose various educational pathways and their satisfaction with those choices. A cacophony of concerns regarding the high cost of university attendance and the value of a college degree fills newspapers and airwaves regularly. A few basic observations from the study are worthwhile.

Six in ten students choose to attend college for the prospect of a better job. University faculty yearn for students who study for the joy of learning, but only two in ten indicated that as the reason for attending. Of course, the joy of study and the potential of employment can be mutually reinforcing-even indistinguishable. Excellent faculty are essential for academic excellence: Energized faculty integrate the joy of learning and the application of what is learned: of that in the work world. Strata/ Gallup have separated for reporting polling results that which must be integrated.

Demographic classifications change the findings little. Men and women, first generation students, income level, racial and ethnic groupings hold the same educational goals within a few percentage points. Jobs are the central consideration.

Over 30% of those who failed to complete a degree said their interests were on general learning, rather than vocational choices. Yet students who did not complete their degree said if they could take a "do over," they would choose another area of study. Career choices are central, but location and affordability are the number two and three concerns respectively.

In response to these findings, universities that want to improve institutional attractiveness to potential students have two major priorities.

First, attend to the transition from college to work. Internships, practicums and other work and study combinations have great value to the preponderance of students. Remember, nearly 60% of the 87,000 participants in the Strata/Gallup poll said jobs were first priority.

universities will focus on how sound technical expertise, powerful critical thinking skills, knowledge of history and the importance of good citizenship in a free society lead to a productive work life. In addition, the ability to accept responsibility and work with others as a team can take center stage and simultaneously help a student gain employment in their chosen field of study.

Second, after the prioritization of the study experience related to employment opportunities, the most important consideration is location. In the first priority, universities have control over how learning experiences lead to success in the workplace; however, universities typically have little choice in their location. In response, many rural institutions create branch campuses in more densely populated urban areas to foster access through proximity. For universities located in very rural areas or areas with declining population, sometimes the stretch will be A Bridge **Too Far.**

Distance education programs provide opportunity to learners by virtually eliminating geography as a concern. This can also help create sustainability. Another approach is recognizing that rural locations possess defining characteristics. Here the issue becomes how to make a unique setting a "destination" university, appealing to people far and wide. The study experience at a rural institution can be an "international study opportunity" for many urban and suburban students. The way of life, the culture and the decision-making apparatus at work in the lives of people all can be an unintended but powerfully important learning experience—a hidden curriculum if properly developed and implemented.

The calculus of these two forces implies that thoughtful leadership, faculty and staff guide the transition from study to work and create attractiveness through distinctive location. 
