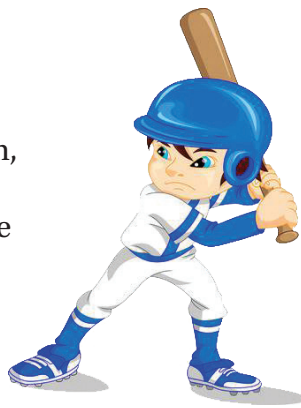

The City will open up the roll-off box this Saturday, July 7th from 8am - 12:00pm (noon). Please come by to dump those items that don't belong in your dumpster and do your part to help Keep Friona Clean!



The roll-off box is located at East 8th and South Jackson Ave. It is a free service provided to Friona residents. Examples of items not allowed in dumpsters includes: steel and metal, mattresses and furniture, refrigerators/AC units, paint cans (with or without liquids), electronics and appliances, drums/barrels,

brick, wood and concrete, railroad ties. Items not accepted in the roll-off box are tires, oil and tree limbs. To dispose of these items, please contact the City Office at 806-250-2761. Results are in, we need more rain!!!

We are halfway through the year and 2018 is now on record as the second driest January-June period of the last decade. Weather guru John Gurley reports that as of June 30th, Friona has officially received 3.42 inches of rain for the year. The only six month span with less rainfall to begin the year was in 2011 when only 1.76 inches was recorded. So far, 2011 was also the driest year of the decade. On the opposite end of the gauge, 2015 had a total of 15.70 inches by the end of June and last year we had recorded 9.11 inches at this same time.

For the year 2018 we have received measurable precipitation on 17 of the 181 days. No moisture was recorded in January and May had the most rain with 1.24 inches recorded. The largest rainfall amount was .66 inches on June 9th. On a more positive note, we have received good rains in July and August the past 5 years.

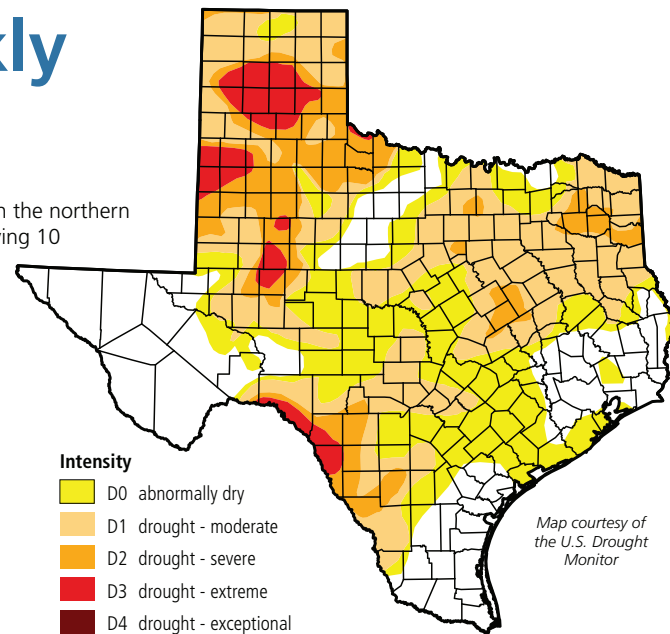

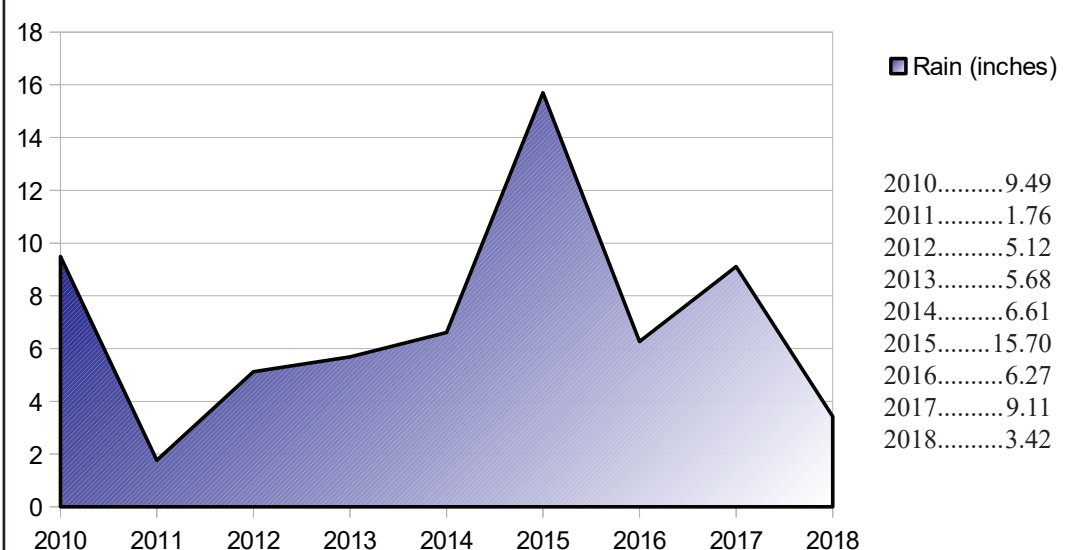

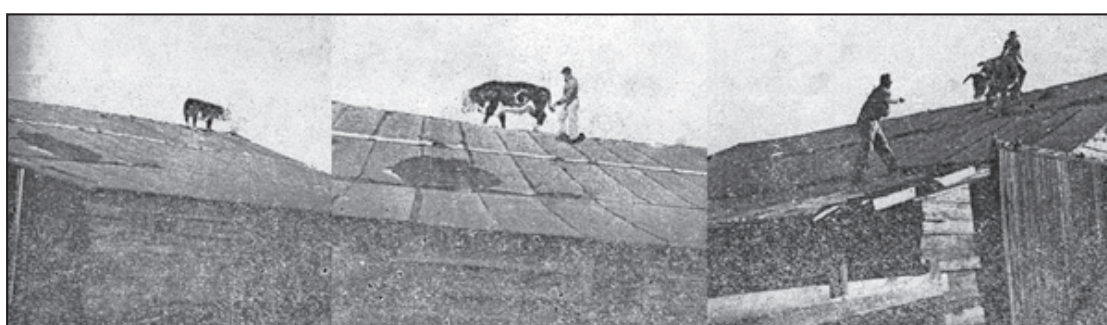
"Further and Definite Proof - A Little Bull Goes a Long Way in Texas"

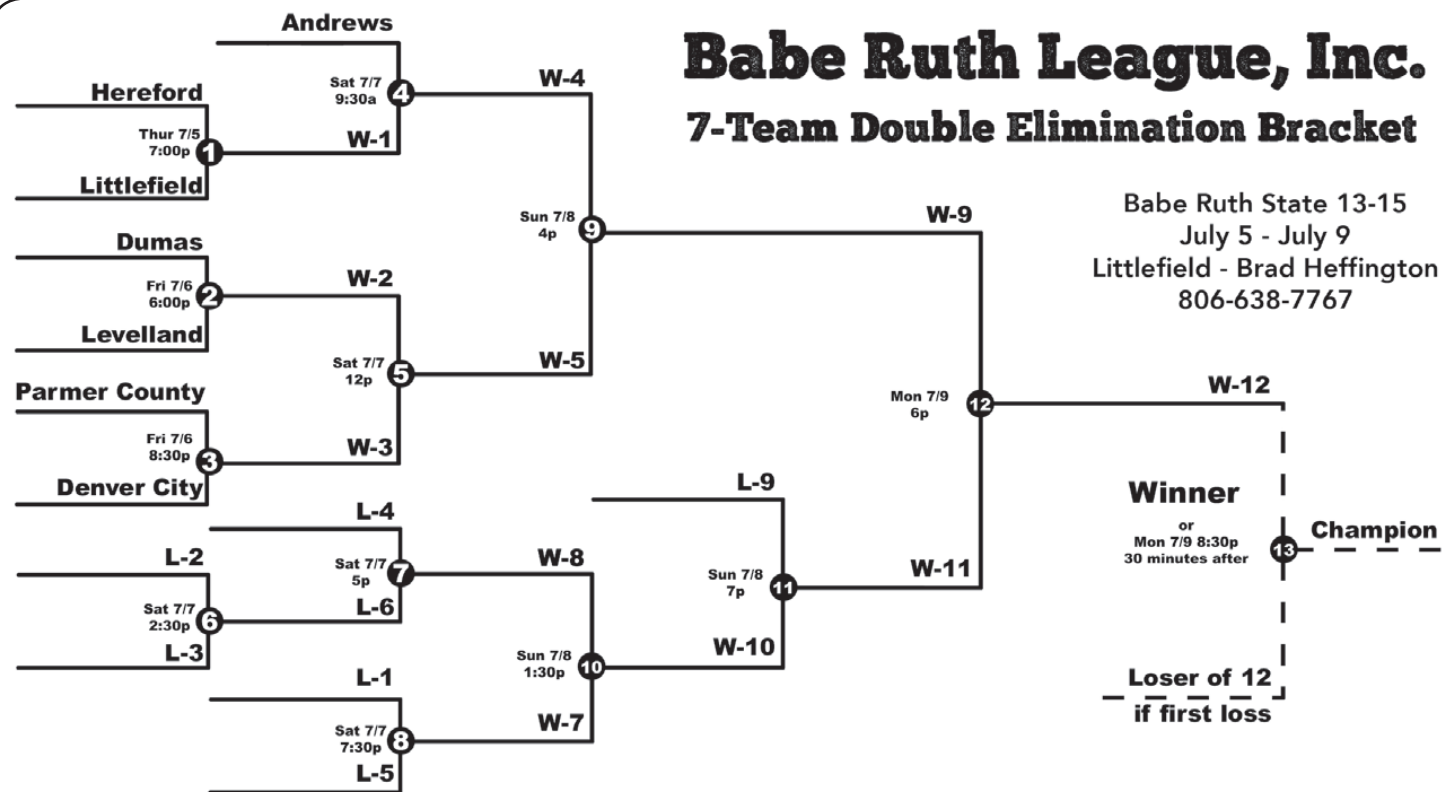
the "bull on the barn-barn"all are going away. By the time you read this, the process will probably be started.

'Text Neck' Means Trouble For Those Addicted to Mobile Devices

Well before the invention of cell phones, medical experts agreed that poor posture is the leading cause of back and neck pain. But the explosion of 24-7 cell phone use has seriously compounded this problem - and even given rise to a new medical condition: "Text Neck".

"Text neck" is the nickname for all the back, neck and spinal issues affecting those who spend too much time on their cell phones and mobile devices. It is due to the constant hunching over people do to peer into their mobile screens, which malforms the spine. Physicians are reporting children as young as eight years old are affected.

Collectively, Americans check their smartphones over 8 billion times per day. And young adults age 18 to 24 send or receive an average of 109.5 text messages on a typical day.

"Just look at any crowd of young people, chances are most are exhibiting very poor posture from tilting their head down to read their device. This forces their neck & back muscles to work at awkward angles - just to keep the body upright, and pain and strain is often the result," says Robert Gearhart, an operating room nurse and co-inventor of Body Aline (www.bodyaline.com), an exercise machine designed to strengthen the back and realign the spine.

"Cell phones aren't going anywhere, so it looks like text neck will become a health problem of epidemic proportion in the years ahead," Gearhart said. "If the trend continues, it looks like in 20 years the number of people who will have spine issues due to this will be astronomical."

He says the best way to check your mobile device

is to stand up straight and look at your device at eye level instead of reading it next to your torso, which usually results in your chin going down towards your chest. Or lie on your stomach when spending long periods of time on your phone. This provides a safe and natural passive isometric exercise to restore the natural curve to the neck.

Of course, it is not just mobile devices that can give a person back problems - there are many causes and some, such as arthritis, have no easy answers. However, Gearhart says frequently the cause of back pain can be something that can be adjusted with proper lifestyle choices, such as:

- Take breaks from desk jobs. When working at a computer, take a short break every 15 or 20 minutes, then move around and change your body and head positions.

- Adjust your workspace. Set your computer monitor at eye level. Raise your smartphone to eye level rather than lowering your head. Get a tablet holder to elevate your device close to eye level. If possible, get a standing desk or an ergonomic chair. Don't slouch at your desk.

Use voice-to-text as often as possible. This cuts down on the amount of time you are looking down at your phone.

- Hold Your Phone At Eye Level. Do not look down and allow your chin to move towards your chest when you are on your mobile device. This causes the back of the neck to support the head instead of the shoulders.

"Taking some preventative measures," Gearhart says, "is much easier than trying to treat a spine that is already out of alignment."

Xcel Energy agrees to keep Texas rates flat

Tax cuts, lower debt costs avoid need for base rate increase; fuel costs to remain low

AMARILLO, Texas (July 2, 2018) - The effect of the federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act and lower debt costs will keep Xcel Energy base energy rates unchanged this year, good news for customers who already are enjoying lower costs related to falling prices for fuel used in area power plants.

"When we filed for new rates in 2017, we anticipated the need for

\$55 million in additional revenue to recover the costs of new power grid investments," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy - Texas. "The significant reduction in federal corporate tax expense, coupled with lower costs on our long-term debt, will enable us to absorb the cost of new infrastructure without raising base electric rates."

In the August 2017 filing with the

Public Utility Commission of Texas, Xcel Energy sought base rate increases that could have increased a typical residential bill by \$15 a month. Xcel Energy worked with key customer groups to bring down the proposed increase, and in a settlement filed Friday with regulators, now proposes no increase to base rates. A transmission cost recovery factor, a separate line item added to

Texas bills in March 2017 to recover costs of new high-voltage transmission lines, will remain on customer bills under the terms of the settlement.

Since the August base rate filing, the costs for natural gas used to fuel close to 40 percent of the region's electricity supply have fallen considerably. Fuel costs make up about a third of a typical residential

bill, and a May 1 reduction in the fuel cost factor lowered residential bills by close to 6 percent. Hudson said fuel costs should hold steady through the remainder of the year.

The fuel cost reductions have already been approved, but the Public Utility Commission of Texas will still need to consider the base rate settlement filed last week and issue a final order.

Gasoline Price Forecast

Texas, TX, July 2- Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 0.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.65/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that is unchanged versus last week to \$2.84/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 61.4 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 10.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 10.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 62.5

cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Going into the July 4 holiday, I can't remember the last time oil markets were so active. Oil has surged over 10% just in time for summer's busiest travel holiday, costing motorists over \$1 billion more than last year," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "All the ingredients exist for the national average to inch closer to \$3 per gallon, just in time for the second half of the summer. Undoubtedly, the second half of the summer will be pricier than the first, thanks to OPEC's production increase falling short of expect-

tations, sanctions to be placed back on Iran by November and falling U.S. oil inventories. And to rub some salt in the wound, hurricane season is still upon us, adding more guess work to where gas prices might spend the second half of the summer. Make no mistake, it won't be pretty, not nearly as "pretty" as the first half of the summer. Be ready for volatility and likely higher prices at the pump in July and August. "

Free Mobile and Web Based App Assists Military Veterans and Advocates with Potential VA Benefits Claims

The National Veterans Legal Services Program (NVLSP) recently launched the first of its kind app for use by military veterans and their advocates, available for download through the NVLSP website, Apple App Store, or Google Play Store.

Named the NVLSP VA Benefit Identifier, the application helps veterans, with or without the assistance of a veteran's service officer, determine specific VA benefits to which they are likely entitled.

Veteran Rob Concklin found the app helpful and commented on Facebook. "I just wanted to write and say thanks for the benefits app. I went thru it, made a claim for five service connected conditions, three were granted immediately. I probably wouldn't have even made the claim if it weren't for your app." A fourth condition was granted later for Concklin and while one condition was denied, Concklin was pleased he filed a claim.

The app directs users to a logic based questionnaire that assists in verifying whether a veteran should file a claim for service-connected disability benefits or nonservice-connected disability pension. The survey addresses all possible disabilities covered by VA regulations.

Created in both English and Spanish, the app functions as a comprehensive logic tree, generating additional questions from previously supplied answers. To protect privacy, no data or personally identifiable information is retained. Once the questionnaire is completed, results can be emailed or printed and used as a reference when filing claims for VA benefits.

"We're hoping to maximize the benefit of this app for vet-

erans by offering it as a free service, without any cost for downloading and utilizing," said Bart Stichman, co-founder and executive director of NVLSP. "We want to provide a supplementary means for veterans to decide what their best options are in filing a claim for disability benefits."

NVLSP's VA Benefit Identifier app does not assist with claims for a higher rating for disabilities the VA has already connected to military service; claims previously filed with the VA; or claims for disabilities resulting from VA health care, VA vocational rehabilitation or participation in a VA Compensated Work Therapy program.

In completing the Identifier questionnaire, veterans should have documents available about their military service (DD Form 214), information about medical conditions and any prior VA decisions or related communications.

Upon completing the survey, veterans are advised to schedule an appointment with a veteran's advocate chosen from a list of Veterans Service Organizations furnished in the app. Veteran's advocates are regularly available to assist with applications for VA disability benefits, free of charge.

A key highlight of the NVLSP VA Benefit Identifier is its ability to appropriately recommend when veterans should file for specific conditions, prompting them to submit an "intent to file" form with the VA, while further providing timelines and instruction on how to proceed with a formal claim.

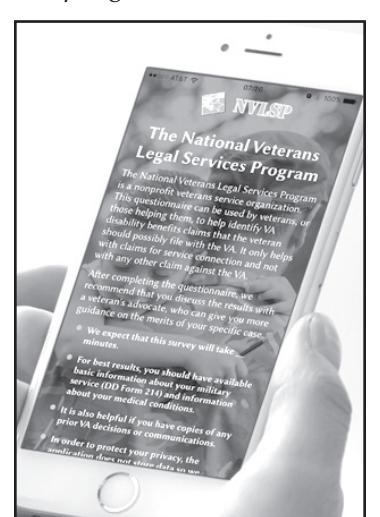
NVLSP's app features an easy to navigate interface allowing veterans to interact with a support point person, and can be downloaded from

the NVLSP website to any web-enabled smart device. NVLSP recently fixed some bugs in the app in May that had frustrated a handful of users, and the problems identified were corrected.

Download the NVLSP VA Benefit Identifier app on NVLSP's website, from the Apple App Store, or from the Google Play Store.
