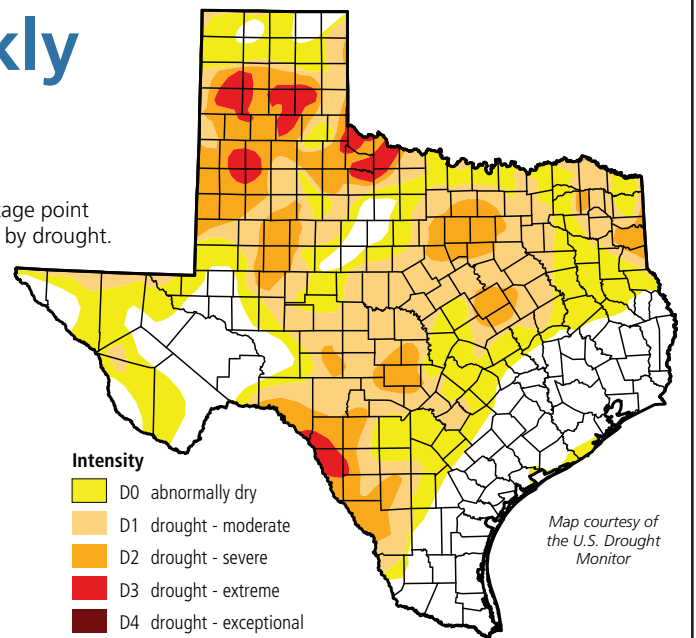

Arrington Selected to Serve on Farm Bill Conference Committee

WASHINGTON - Speaker of the House Paul Ryan appointed Congressman Jodey Arrington (TX-19) to serve on the bicameral, bipartisan conference committee established to resolve the differences between the House and Senate versions of the 2018 Farm Bill.

(AUSTIN) — Whether you're in need of book bags, blackboard chalk or bell-bottom pants, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on those and certain other items during the state's sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 10-12.

\$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$90.3 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

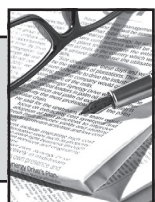

From the Friona Archives for the Month of December

Dec. 7 1928—E.E. Taylor returned Monday morning from Bandalia, Illinois, where he was called last week on account of a the serious illness of his mother, Mrs. Louise E. Taylor.

Dec. 12 1968—A former Friona resident, Pfc. Heriberto (Eddie) Blanco, has been killed in Vietnam, it was learned here Tuesday.

Dec. 12 1968—Marine Lieutenant Gary E. Snead, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rene Snead of 1302 West Sixth Friona, is serving with Marine Light Helicopter Squadron 367, a unit of the First marine Aircraft Wing in Vietnam.

Dec. 17 1978—The Friona area was hit by one of the coldest December cold spells in its history last week, when the temperature fell to an official low of nine degrees below zero on Saturday. The reading was the lowest recorded at Friona since January 5, 1971, when the mercury fell to ten below. It was the first time in the 17 years that records have been

kept by the City of Friona for the reading to fall below zero during December.

Dec. 17, 1978—Tuesday night burglars took the safe from Friona Wheat Growers' office just south of the city. Ron Smiley, the manger, said the safe contained only about \$40 cash, being filled mostly with papers, including warehouse receipts, insurance policies, stock certificates, and deposit slips.

Dec. 4 1983—Nine members of the Friona Chieftain Football team were named the all-district teams announced this week by district 2AAA coaches. Charlie Morgan was a unanimous choice on first team offense as a runningback. Other players making the offensive all-district list were Eloy Caballero, wide receiver, and Tim Kirk, lineman. Caballero was also named to the first team defense at a safety position, along with linebacker Reese Fleming. Mitch Reeve landed a spot as a line-

Don't Mess with God's Creation

Last week, Fox News' "The Five" discussed news from England headlined: "Genetically modified babies given go ahead by UK ethics body." "The Nuffield Council on Bioethics said that changing the DNA of a human embryo could be 'morally permissible' if it was in the future child's interests and did not add to the kind of inequalities that already divide society." They cite that gene modification could prevent children from getting diseases in the future. Nominations Open for the 2018 County Committee Elections

Parmer County FSA Update

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) encourages all farmers, ranchers, and FSA program participants to take part in the Parmer County Committee election nomination process.

FSA's county committees are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA and allow grassroots input and local administration of federal farm programs.

Committees are comprised of locally elected agricultural producers responsible for the fair and equitable administration of FSA farm programs in their counties. Committee members are ac-

countable to the Secretary of Agriculture. If elected, members become part of a local decision making and farm program delivery process.

A county committee is composed of three to 11 elected members from local administrative areas (LAA). Each member serves a three-year term. One-third of the seats on these committees are open for election each year. County committees may have an appointed advisor to further represent the local interests of underserved farmers and ranchers. Underserved producers are beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers and land owners and/or operators who

have limited resources. Other minority groups including Native American and Alaska Natives; persons under the poverty level, and persons that have disabilities are also considered underserved.

This year Parmer County, LAA-3 will be holding the election. This is the Bovina / Farwell area of the county. All nomination forms for the 2018 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA service center by Aug. 1, 2018. State has experienced 24 consecutive months of employment growth

AUSTIN - The Texas economy added 27,200 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in June, which marked 24 consecutive months of employment growth. Over the year, Texas added 359,500 jobs for an annual employment growth rate of 2.9 percent. Private-sector employers added 26,400 positions over the month. Texas' seasonally ad-

justed unemployment rate was 4.0 percent in June, down slightly from May 2018.

"Recognition of Texas as the premier place to do business in the country is reinforced by employers adding another 27,200 jobs in June and an impressive 359,500 jobs over the year," said TWC Chairman Andres Alcantar. "Broad-based growth

Dairy industry challenges, from the heat to the marketplace

Texas' red-hot summer is underway. Most of our dairy regions once again are suffering the beginnings of a terrible drought. No matter where you are, the conditions could definitely be better.

Central Texas corn was harvested early and with lower starch levels than expected. Hay is already scarce and in big demand across most of the state. But as we have seen before, dry weather is usually good milking weather.

Production remains strong this year and will be able to almost fill the new Select Milk Producers plant in Littlefield when it comes on line in less than a year. Some farmers are considering building a new facility, but can the market handle the milk? It is hard to tell a farmer not to build a new facility or that no one wants their milk. If the state's production falls to only a 3 percent growth, a new 4 million gallon per day plant will be needed every few years. Add in the fact that most growth will inevitably be in a lower profit margin export product, and profit margins continue to tighten.

We're starting to again hear discussion about curbing production. This coming at the same time we see Canada's dairy system deal with the reduction of their tariffs that help to secure their market for decades. This has kept their market filled primarily with their dairy products with few imported products. Reducing this tariff will inevitably eat away at their market as the overproduced northeast and upper Midwest areas of the United States are poised to compete with Canada's dairy products. These tariffs have protected our northern neighbors from our dairy production for many, many years.

How do you make more money in the dairy industry? Milk more cows. That has long been the system most dairy farmers have grown to operate under. However, excess milk that has to be marketed at little to no profit takes money from everyone. These decisions are very difficult to make and even harder to implement.

The dairy industry has changed so drastically in such a short time in Texas that it is easy

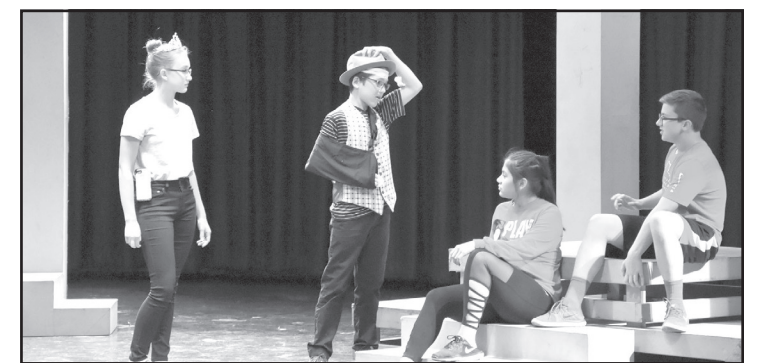
