

Texas Flag. The first item of business was a discussion of an amendment to the Lease Agreement with K&T Energy of Albuquerque, New Mexico. The lease involves the Permanent School Fund Land in Gaines County, Texas. Toby Martinez, a representative from K&T, proposed a 90-day extension before the start of the lease. In exchange for the extension, K&T Energy would agree to increase their payment from \$355 per acre to

The Court also approved the Minutes from the previous meeting and approved payments for the accounts payable and payroll disbursement for employees and elected officials.

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) today issued the following statement regarding driver license offices to clarify misconceptions reflected in several recent news articles:

The Texas Department of Public Safety is not implementing any plan for mass closures of driver license offices across Texas.

As part of the Sunset review process of DPS, the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission Staff Report from April included the following finding (p. 15):

"The department has not

implemented plans to close or consolidate driver license offices with low demand."

Regarding that specific finding, DPS developed a response that identified potential offices for closure and submitted it for consideration by the Sunset Advisory Commission. DPS will take no action on this significant staff recommendation without direction from State Leadership and the Leg-

The Sunset Commission, which meets next week, will determine which recommendations are forwarded to the full Legislature for their consideration in the upcoming session, which begins in January 2019.

The demand for Texas driver license services continues to significantly increase as the state's population continues to grow dramatically. The department is committed to continue working with the Legislature during the upcoming session to obtain the resources needed to meet this growing demand and provide the quality customer service that Texans expect and de-

Friday September 1, 2000 **Library Receives Computer Grant**

The Friona Public Library is the recipient of a \$7,754 grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation of Seattle, Washington. These grants, which are needs- based and given in areas where the poverty level is ten percent or higher, are to enhance access to computers, the internet and technical training in public libraries. Our grant will include two Gateway personal computers, network kit, 24 port switch, Hewlett Packard 2100 printer, wiring allowance plus nearly \$2,000 worth of pre-loaded software. Friona qualified for one English PC and one Spanish PC. This grant is in addition to the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Grant awarded to the panhandle Public Libraries Collaborative. The TIF grant will add three public access PCs from one to five," stated Library Director Darla Bracken. "We will have to be closed to the public some for installation and training, but we will let you know ahead of time in Around Town. We really appreciate the opportunity these grants provide for stateof-the-art library service in our community," Mrs. Bracken commented. Postscript: in their research, surveys by the National Center for Education and statistics showed that nearly 45 percent of households in America frequent their public library.

Saturday August 3, 1996 Teacher and student in dog attack

Two second grade classes had some tense moments last Monday afternoon as they played on the schools west playground. A neighborhood pit bull dog apperantly broke its rope leash and wandered onto the playground. Without warning, the dog attacked and bit 7 year-old Ralee Stockstill. Ralee was swinging when the

dog bit her on the back. Teacher Erin Barnett, who is pregnant, tackled the dog away from the child. Other school personal quickly moved all the children in to the school building as Barnett attempted to subdue the dog. One report said that the dog chased after Stockstill youngster as she ran to the school building but failed to attack her a second time Mrs. Barnett was bitten on the hip by the dog during the melee. Both teacher and student were taken to Parmer County Hospital, treated and released. The dogs owner showed up during the confrontation and put the dog into their station wagon and were asked to wait for the police, which they did. The dog was taken to veterinarian Dr. Gary for examination. It was decided to put the dog to sleep and send the body to Austin for examination for rabies. Both little miss Stockstill and teacher Barnett returned to school the following day.



Labor Day Wraps Up Highest Summer at the Pump Since 2014 Motorists had to put in nearly two hours of 'labor' to fill their tanks

Consumers have seen the most expensive summer at the pump since 2014 with an average of \$2.73 per gallon thus far, according to GasBuddy, the only smartphone app connecting drivers with their Perfect Pit Stop.

The average gas price over Labor Day weekend is expected to be \$2.84 per gallon, a 20 cent increase from Labor Day

"It's been consistently a more painful summer at the pump than what we've been accustomed to when compared to the last few summers," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "Without major hurricanes, we should continue to see prices gently decline in the weeks ahead as demand begins to slow into the autumn, wrapping up the priciest summer at the pump since 2014, but overall, with a moderately less sting than what we saw earlier on this decade. Next year may follow in this year's footsteps with higher Labor Day gas prices, so what we're upset about this year could bring nostalgic



memories next year. Enjoy it while it lasts."

While gas prices have remained high, motorists have worked hard to fill their tanks. Taking into account the average wages across the nation from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the average American needs to perform an hour and 48 minutes of labor to earn enough money to fill a tank of gasoline.

When gas prices were \$3.58 per gallon during the summer of 2014, motorists had to work 2 hours and 30 minutes to fill their tank, and in 2008 when gas prices were \$3.84 per gallon, motorists had to work 3 hours to fill their tanks.

On average, motorists have also shelled out more than \$1.11 billion per day on gasoline purchases this season, up from a decade low of \$912 million per day during the summer of 2016. This summer's total fuel bill, while the highest since 2015, will still be the third lowest since 2011.

While gas prices have remained high, there has been remarkably little movement in gas prices throughout the summer, with the a difference of just 13 cents between the national average's summer (June 1-Sept. 1) low and high. It represents the smallest difference between low and high since 2010, when the low and high were just 11 cents apart. The same period in 2017 saw a difference of 29 cents between the low and high while the difference was 27 cents in 2016. The most volatile summer, 2005, saw a difference of 91 cents per gallon- prices dropped as low as \$2.08 before surging to \$2.99 later in the summer due to Hurricane Katrina.

average. Some moisture was received, but more moisture was needed throughout the district. Rain amounts in some areas ranged from a trace to 2.5 inches. Soil moisture conditions were excellent for all crops in some areas but was short for most areas. Grasses and rangelands were finally starting to green up, and sorghum was all headed. Producers continued to irrigate crops. Corn in Deaf Smith County was doing well under irrigation, and most fields were close to dent stage. Silage harvest began. Wheat planting started as producers

Temperatures were near were trying to create grazing opportunities. Cotton under irrigation pivots was coming along. Dryland cotton started to look better with irrigated acres looking very good. Sugarcane aphids and headworms were being sprayed on grain sorghum. Wheat preplant activities continued with the expectation of early wheat planting for fall pasture starting soon. Dryland grain sorghum and cotton looked fantastic. Stocker cattle gains were very good due to milder temperatures.



Every now and then he would pull some of his land out of production so there was no crop planted that particular growing season. Even land needs a break every now and then. - 5. Sometimes preparing the land is as important as reaping the



DPS Increases Traffic Enforcement for Labor Day Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will be joining law enforcement efforts from across the state to increase traffic enforcement during the Labor Day holiday weekend. From Friday, Aug. 31, through Monday, Sept. 3, DPS Troopers will be looking for drivers who violate traffic laws, including impaired drivers, speeders and safety belt violators.

"DPS is committed to protecting travelers on our roadways, and Troopers will be working around-the-clock this Labor Day weekend to keep impaired and dangerous drivers off the road," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "We are urging all drivers to do their part to keep our roads safe by simply obeying Texas traffic laws and driving courteously."

DPS offers drivers the following tips for enhancing safety on our roads during the Labor Day holiday:

• Do not drink and drive. Make alternate travel plans if you are consuming alcohol.

- Slow down especially in bad weather, construction areas, heavy traffic and unfamiliar areas.
- Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices. Texas law prohibits using a portable wireless device to read, write or send an electronic message unless the vehicle is stopped.
- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle it's the law.
- Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law. Also, show the same courtesy to fellow drivers stopped along the
- Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.
- Don't drive fatigued allow plenty of time to reach your destination.
- If you see a road hazard or if you observe anything suspicious, report it to the nearest law enforcement agency.

- Before your trip begins, make sure your vehicle is properly maintained and always double check to make sure all cargo is secure.
- Monitor weather and road conditions wherever you are traveling. For road conditions/closings in Texas, visit

Lubbock District Game Wardens Preparing for Dove Season The 2018-19 Dove Hunting Season Officially Begins Saturday September 1st

game wardens are preparing for an increase in activity as local sportsmen will enjoy the official start to dove season. Texas citizens will enjoy an extended dove season for the third year in a row. Hunting season will run from September 1st-November 4th and then later from December 21st-January 14th in the North zone where the panhandle region is located.

Roughly 15 percent of the nation's 300 million mourning dove reside in Texas, along with about 15 million white-winged doves at the beginning of September. Each fall, over 300,000 Texas dove hunters take to the field in pursuit of these acrobatic, fast-flying game birds. "Texas is uniquely situated to catch a lot of migratory birds as they move through the central part of the continent. Couple that with the fact that we are such a big state with diverse habitats, and it makes sense that we have such large numbers of doves," said Owen Fitzsimmons, TPWD Dove Program

Aaron Sims explains that diswait for the hunting season to begin. "Game wardens are just as excited as hunters for September 1st to roll around. We've already begun marking locations that will be busiest in hunting activity, as well

Sims says that all available wardens will be out in force throughout the region ensuring hunters are abiding by the laws. "One of the many violations that we might encounter would be hunters not abiding by their daily bag limit." The daily bag limit for Outdoor Annual, available dove is 15, which means that at license retailers and ona hunter cannot exceed taking 15 dove in a single day. Sims also advises that hunters abide by the legal shooting hours and to double check those official times prior to hitting the fields. Migratory game birds can legally be hunted 30 minutes prior to sunrise until sunset.

There is no closed season or bag limit restrictions for Eurasian collared-doves or common pigeons (rock doves). However, it is recommended that hunters leave plumage on these birds for species identification to verify they are not part of a migratory game bird daily bag or possession limit.

All hunters are reminded that hunting licenses expire Public information officer each year on Aug. 31, so a new license for 2018-19 is needed trict game wardens eagerly prior to going dove hunting.

As announced last month, USDA will authorize up to \$12 billion in programs, consistent with our World Trade Organization obligations.

These programs will assist agricultural producers to meet the costs of disrupted markets:

• USDA's Farm Service Agency

(FSA) will administer the

targeted by unjustified retaliation. USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) will distribute these commodities through nutrition assistance programs such as The **Emergency Food Assistance** Program (TEFAP) and child nutrition programs

Through the Foreign Agricultural Service's (FAS) Agricultural Trade Promotion Program (ATP), \$200 million will be made available to develop foreign markets for U.S. agricultural products. The program will help U.S. agricultural exporters identify and access new markets and help mitigate the adverse effects of other countries' restrictions

The Market Facilitation Program is established under the statutory authority of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) and administered by FSA. For each commodity covered, the payment rate will be dependent upon the severity of the trade disruption and the period of adjustment to new trade patterns, based on each producer's actual production.

Interested producers can apply after harvest is 100 percent complete and they can report their total 2018 production. Beginning Sep. 4 of this year, Market Facilitation Program applications will be available online at www.farmers.gov/mfp. Producers will also be able to submit their applications in person, by email, fax, or mail.



Two Worlds

There are multiple views of the university and its purpose.

Uncle Johnny remembers fraternity parties, the "gentleman's C" and leisurely student life as the beall and end-all. Aunt Susie reminisces of working 40 or 50 hours a week on top of a full course schedule to make ends meet. Mom or dad recollect free tuition,

or as near free as makes no difference. Dr. Smith encouraged students to take extra courses in mathematics, philosophy, history or religion because he thought these things were important in broadening student perspective. Professor Jones reflects passionately on prodding students to travel for the sheer joy and enlighten-

Those that look ahead envision different realities of a college degree. Betsy De-Vos, like her views or not, opined during her confirmation hearings, "for too long a college degree has been pushed as the only avenue for a better life." Honesty with students and families would suggest it is one way to a better life, but only one. She continued, "this is

an addiction... we need to embrace new pathways of learning." Many believe colleges should do a better job of helping graduates find work. According to a New America study, 70% of future college goers are concerned about starting salaries, and 91% say the primary reason to go to college is to "improve my employment opportunities."

Richard Vetter, adjunct scholar at the American Enterprise Institute, identifies seven challenges facing higher education. Among these are increasing costs, burgeoning federal financial aid and alternative means to "certify vocational competence." The idea that college is a place to gain different viewpoints and widen perspective is shifting to a monolithic understanding of the world. Decreasing economic growth to support colleges and increasing demand driven by the ingestion of "everybody-needs-a-degree Kool-Aid" also contribute to disenchantment. Additionally, the steadfast assurance that an education provides wisdom, insight, intellectual discipline and a number of other admirable characteristics is oftentimes hollow. Frequent amoral pursuits of fame, often evidenced in intercollegiate athletics or institutional cash flow through unholy business relationships, require attention. Neglected, these are a sickness in higher education —a disease. This forward-looking view is especially troubling to universities that appeal to a wide audience without a clear vision other than big-

ger is better.

ers want the value and application of a college degree to respond to a contemporary notion as certification without personal commit-

I share many of these views from both perspectives and long for the days when anyone who wanted to go to college could afford to — even if it took working foolishly hard to pay the tab to achieve a degree that had market value. I also had the experience of studying at different institutions, and each broadened my perspective of the world. Transferring from a two-year school on Long Island to Texas A&M University in College Station was a cultural experience in and of itself. This experience changed my life, at a cost I could afford without a single loan — all counted as joy for a kid coming from a working-class family with five siblings. This is not for a split second a lament; it is rather a refresher course in US history as a baby boomer, the realization of both a windshield and rearview-mirror reality.

The reconciliation of these points of view is only possible with clear-headedness. We must tell students that some individual courses of action are likely paths to discouragement. Hiding heads in sand creates disdain for the educational-financialpolitical framework that created the leviathan labyrinth leading nowhere for too many. According to a Macalester University study, parents and students seek clarity on issues of transition, academic engagement, college life, relationships and home and family. An Owlcation post confirms these and other concerns of students.

these two worldviews is essential from the wheelhouse of outsider and insider. Reflection, study and sincerity are particularly important for students who hail from small rural communities according to Inside Higher Education, and for those wanting to work out their faith, even in Christian institutions, according to the Christian Post.

These confounding worldviews of fond memories on the one hand and cynicism on the other are serious challenges for all. It is a bleak, but not hopeless picture, according to Catherine Bond Hill. Costs are crippling too many families, she says, and concerns regarding political correctness, academic freedom and other burning issues on campus seem frivolous or contrived for their onesidedness. Lastly, lifetime earnings do in fact increase, whether one studies literature or computer science. Both worlds are in play if able and committed students under the tutelage of dedicated faculty shoulder rigor, discipline, hard work and intellectual demands.
