

Friona Students Find Their Own Way



They had a vision. They knew what they wanted, but did not know exactly how to get there. Friona High School students Kessly Salinas, Adriana Ortiz, and Angel Mills wanted to make a change but they needed some guidance and inspiration. They got both in the form of State Senator Kel Seliger. The FHS trio met Kel at his Town Hall meeting at the Depot back in October and were impressed by his willingness to show them the path they needed to travel to reach their goal. They left the meeting very enthused and immediately went to work to achieve their dream.

First, they visited with local residents who would be involved with the change. Second, they worked with City Manager Lee Davila to iron out the logistics of the project and to develop a presentation for the City Council. Phase three was the actual presentation of their vision in front of their own local elected officials. The result? Chieftain Way. On Monday evening, the Friona City Council voted to change the name of 7th Street, between Grand and Etta, to Chieftain Way.

The vision had become reality and three FHS students had learned a lesson about life. Education is an ongoing process and you are never too young or too old to learn. It's the Chieftain Way.





Council approves name change

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, December 10th at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

First on the agenda was a time allotted to receive public comments. Friona High School students Angel Mills, Adriana Ortiz, and Kessly Salinas addressed the Council with a proposal to change the name of 7th Street between Grand and Etta Avenue to Chieftain Way. They informed the Council that other schools in the area had changed a street name in or around their campus. They also reported that they had canvassed all the residents that would be affected by the name change and there was 100% support for the new name. The students thanked the Council listening to their request. No other public comment was made.

hearing of the session, the Friona City Council approved unanimously the changing of 7th Street between Grand and Etta Avenue to Chieftain Way.

Next, the Council received a presentation from the firm Parkhill, Smith & Cooper regarding an anticipated school bond project with the Friona ISD that would include working closely with the City of Friona and could possibly involve the partial closing of a city street. This presentation was a general overview and a more detailed report would be given at the January Council Meeting. The Council then operational heard an report from the Friona Police Department which included the Department's 1st Annual Christmas Gift Drive for the Elderly at Prairie Acres Nursing Home. The Accounts Payable and Financial Statement for November 2018 were approved and City Manager Lee Davila informed the Council about

applying for grant funding from the Texas DOT to initiate a "Safe Routes to School" campaign for 2019.

The Council also discussed the possibility of selling the former municipal landfill located one mile north of Friona on Highway 214. The 20-acre tract sits just west of the highway. Also discussed was the construction project involving the Emergency Medical Services Building. It was agreed that the bidding process for the project should be implemented. The meeting was then adjourned.

Commissioners receive 2018 Fire Report

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, December 10th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved and approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Auditor Larry Johnston. The Commissioners reviewed the Treasurer's Report presented by Altha Herington and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

Next, the Commissioners approved an extension of the Tax Abatement Agreement with Mariah del Este until December 2019, they approved CRI to conduct the Parmer County Outside Audit, and they tabled the purchase of a road grader for use in Precinct #4 until next year when the new Court is sworn in.

The Court then approved 14 individuals to serve on the 2019-2020 Texas Historical Commission for two-year terms. They include: Don & Gladys Spring, and Richard Carson from Bovina; Tommie Fulcher, Gay Goettsch, Bonnie Howard, Mary Lee Mitzelfelt, and Teresa Ancira

from Farwell; and Hollis Horton, Joe Bob Mann, Mary Johnston, Sharon White, and Mitch & Kathy Terry from Friona.

Next, approval was given to Bonds for the District Clerk, Tax Assessor, and County Treasurer employees. Continuing Education hours were also approved for the County Treasurer and Tax Assessor-Collector. Also, payment for unused vacation days was approved for 3 County employees.

The 2018 Parmer County Fire Report was presented to the Commissioners by the 5 fire departments that serve Parmer County. There were a total of 160 calls with the breakdown by department as follows: Bovina (22), Farwell (35), Friona (55), Lazbuddie (43), and Rhea (5). Parmer County allocates \$150,000 each year to the fire departments for the purchase of equipment. Approximately \$40,000 of that amount is distributed to the fire departments (excluding Rhea) on a per call basis.



December 12, 2013

The Friona city council met in regular session at 6:30 p.m. Monday, December 9 with all members present plus city manager Patricia Phipps, city attorney Slater Elza, and deputy city secretary Rosa Mendez. Mayor Rick White presided. Doug Kelley and Fred Cook were re-appointed to the city planning and zoning commission. Police Chief Frank Mooney gave his departmental report and introduced Andrew Aguirre who will begin the Police Academy in Amarillo in January and graduate in August at which time he will become a full time Friona officer. Chief Mooney said they were having no luck hiring a proposed School Resource Officer (SRO). There have been no applicants for the position. It was reported that court fines are down by \$18,000 this year from 2012. With the recent resignation of Charlie Pope from the council, the options were to fill the seat by appointment or leave it vacant until the May 2014 election. An appointment to fill the seat would be effective only until the May election at which time the appointee would have to run for election to complete Pope's one-year remaining term. The council discussed the advantages and disadvantages of both options. The names of John Taylor, Brent Loflin, and Nancy Davis had been submitted for appointment to the vacancy. After much discussion, councilman Bruce Fleming made a motion to appoint Nancy Davis to fill the vacancy and councilwoman Martha Barker seconded. The appointment was approved. Mrs. Davis, president of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union, will fill the term until the May election and has the option to seek a one-year re-election at that time. Also up for re-election in May if they choose to run are Mayor Rick White and council members Martha Barker and Greg Lewellen. The council went into executive session at 7:06 p.m. to discuss matters pertaining to Prairie Acres and Cargill water issues. When regular session resumed no action was taken. The next city council meeting will be Monday, January 13 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The American Stock Exchange has approved for original listing the common shares of Friona Industries, Inc., headquarters in Friona, Texas. Trading in the new issue was to begin this week. Friona Industries is engaged in the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds, retail marketing of animal health supplies, custom feeding of customer-owned cattle, the purchase, fattening and sale of cattle owned by the company, and the operation of grain facilities. For the first quarter ended September 30, 1978, Friona Industries reported net income of \$1,154,000 of 92 cents pre share, on total revenues of \$23,554,000 compared with net income of \$330,000, or 27 cents per share, on total revenue of \$15,002,000 for the similar period in 1977. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1978, Friona reported net income of \$2,607,000 or \$2.08 per share, on revenues of \$67,013,000 compared with a year-earlier net income of \$339,000 or \$32 cents a share on revenues of \$57,592,000. To qualify for listing on the American stock Exchange a company must achieve a certain measure of growth and maturity in net worth and distribution of shares. Friona Industries exceeds the following minimum listing requirements: (1) net tangible assets of \$4 million (2) net income of \$400,000 for the last fiscal year (3) 400,000 publicly-held shares of which 150,000 must be in 100 to 500 share lots.

December 14, 1967

Three young men, including two from Friona, were inducted into the Army by Texas Local Board #18 at Hereford during December, it was announced this week. Those inducted were Joe Bob Johnson and Numan D. Loafman of Friona and Richard G. Slaughter of Hereford. State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 1,659 men for the armed forces in January, according to Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service director. This quota is the biggest monthly call since November 1966, when quota was 2,012 men. This compares with quotas of 924 for December, 1,159 for November, 1,421 for August. The Texas quota of 1,659 for inducted in January is the state's share national call for 34,000 men, all for the army. The Selective Service boards will forward 5,455 men in January for pre-induction examination, Colonel Schwartz said, and the have schedule 3,485 for this examination in December. 

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The Pursuit of Excellence: On and Off the Field

Friona native raises the bar for Stephen F. Austin State University

Director of athletics Ryan Ivey and acting university president Dr. Steve Westbrook announced the hiring of Colby Carthel as SFA's 20th head football coach on Tuesday, Dec. 4 inside the Baker Pattillo Student Center Movie Theater. Carthel, a proven winner and national champion with deep Texas ties, arrives in Nacogdoches after leading Texas A&M-Commerce to the pinnacle of NCAA Division II football.

Hired as the 19th head coach in A&M-Commerce history on January 22, 2013, Carthel spent the previous six seasons guiding the Lions, where he captured the 2017 NCAA Division II Football National Championship in his fifth year at the helm. Owning an eye-popping .766 winning percentage as a head coach, Carthel posted an 59-18 overall record at A&M-Commerce with an impressive 36-8 (.818) conference record. In addition to three Lone Star Conference championships, Carthel led the Lions to six consecutive postseason appearances and four-straight NCAA playoff appearances.

Owning four coach of the year awards, Carthel's 35 total wins over the last three seasons is nearly unprecedented in college football. Of the 27 scholarship programs in Texas, only Carthelled A&M-Commerce and three other programs - Baylor, TCU and Sam Houston State - have had three-straight 10-win seasons in the last 10 years.

Under Carthel's tutelage as a head coach, his players have captured four national player of the year awards, two regional player of the year awards and nine conference player of the year awards. While at A&M-Commerce, Carthel witnessed his studentathletes garner 53 All-American honors, including 19 All-American First Team selections, not to mention 20 all-region accolades and 141 all-conference plaudits.

Mentoring young men not only on the field, but in the classroom as well, Carthel has had his players collect numerous all-academic honors. Coaching one academic player of the year, Carthel's Lion student-athletes earned two College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District[®] Team spots and 11 academic all-conference selections. A native of Friona, Texas, and a four-year letter winner at both Friona High School and Angelo State, Carthel's footprint has been in the Lone Star State for quite some time. Recruiting heavily within the state, all but one of Carthel's 285 high school signees across six signing classes as a head coach have hailed from Texas. With a major concentration in east Texas, Carthel has made it a point to recruit locally. In his initial signing class at A&M-Commerce in 2013, Carthel signed 24 of his 37 incoming freshmen (65 percent) from within 150 miles of campus, which included a good portion of east Texas. In the fall of 2018, Carthel completed yet another ultrasuccessful season at A&M-Commerce. His Lions reached their third-straight NCAA Division II Regional Semifinal in the last three years after going 10-3 overall and notching a 7-1 league mark. Being named Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year for the first time in his career, Carthel guided A&M-Commerce to a 33-17 upset road win over secondseeded Minnesota Duluth in the regional quarterfinals.

kicker Kristov Martinez being named academic player of the year and a total of seven Lions garnering first-team honors. Additionally, linebacker Garrett Blubaugh and Martinez were CoSIDA Google Cloud Academic All-District^{*} selections.

Carthel led A&M-Commerce to the most successful season in the school's athletics history in 2017 with the national championship capping a spectacular run. The Lions defeated West Florida 37-27 in the national championship game in Kansas City, ending the year with a nation-best 10-game winning streak and the first NCAA title in school history.

A&M-Commerce completed the season with a 14-1 overall record and a 7-1 mark in conference. The Lions won three-straight road games in the playoffs as Super Region Four's fifth seed. The three teams they defeated on the road came into the games with a combined record of 34-1, marking the toughest road to a national semifinal in Division II history. A&M-Commerce finished third in the nation in cumulative attendance and fifth in the nation in average attendance, as 8,580 fans per game turned out to support the national champions.

The Lions became the first team ever to claim the "Triple Crown" with the national championship, Harlon Hill Trophy, and NCAA Elite 90 Award in the same season. Ouarterback Luis Perez became

the first A&M-Commerce player to win the Harlon Hill Trophy, given to the top player in Division II football. He completed 421-of-596 passes for 4,999 yards and 46 touchdowns on the season and set Division II playoff records in all passing categories. Linebacker Blubaugh won the Elite 90 Award, given to the student-athlete at the championship site with the highest cumulative grade point average. In 2017, three A&M-Commerce players - Perez, offensive lineman Jared Machorro, and cornerback YusefSterling-Lowe - accumulated All-American seven honors from the American Football Coaches Association, Division II Conference Commissioners Association, and Associated Press. The Lions became the first team to ever have three AFCA Division II All-Americans in the same season. A total of 29 players were recognized with honors from the Lone Star Conference at the end of the regular season, including Perez winning the J.W. Rollins Award as the top offensive player in the league and Machorro earning offensive lineman of the year. The 2016 season saw the Lions achieve new heights with their third consecutive Lone Star Conference championship and first Division II playoff win in 25 years. A&M-Commerce hosted its first postseason game since 1991 and defeated Colorado Mesa 34-23 in the opening round of the playoffs. Going 11-2 overall with

an 8-1 league record, the Lions matched the program record with 29 All-Lone Star Conference honors, including defensive back of the year Uriah Harris as running back Richard Cooper and wide receiver Lance Evans repeated as first-team performers.

In his third season as head coach in 2015, Carthel led A&M-Commerce to its second-straight Lone Star Conference regular season title. The Lions went 8-4 on the year and earned the seventh seed in the Division II playoffs, advancing to the NCAA postseason for the first time since 1995. With an undefeated Lone Star Conference regular season, A&M-Commerce garnered a school-record 27 all-conference honors. The Lions also collected three All-American awards, while Cooper was named the Lone Star Conference Offensive Back of the Year.

Following Carthel's second year at the helm of A&M-Commerce football in 2014, the Lions saw 26 student-athletes named All-Lone Star Conference as six players earned NFL preseason roster spots. The 2014 unit went 9-3 overall and 6-1 in league play to earn the program's 21st Lone Star Conference title and first since 1990. The team earned its second-straight postseason appearance with a trip to the C.H.A.M.P.S. Heart of Texas Bowl, which resulted in a 72-21 rout of East Central University. The bowl appearance was the first time since 1990-91 A&M-Commerce made consecutive postseason trips. Vernon Johnson took home the Lone Star Conference Wide Receiver of the Year Award, while defensive end Toni Pulu earned defensive player of the year honors. Five Lions, Johnson, Ricky Collins, Pulu and Saul Martinez claimed All-American status from various publications, while five players made postseason allstar bowl appearances with Joe Bergeron and Johnson appearing in the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl and Collins, Charles Tuaau and Ashton Dorsey playing in the College Gridiron Showcase. A&M-Commerce opened the season by scoring 98 points and an NCAA record 986 total yards of offense. The pace saw the Lions end the season with the NCAA's No. 1 offense in terms of total yards per game (535.4) and scoring per game (54.1), while finishing tops in the nation in tackles for loss per game (10.8). Carthel led A&M-Commerce to a 7-5 record in his first season in Commerce in 2013, a far cry from the combined 5-26 record the program had in the three

seasons prior to his arrival. That turnaround, one that included wins over nationally-ranked Delta State and Tarleton State, earned the Lions a postseason berth in the Live United Texarkana Bowl - the program's first postseason berth since 1995.

Although Carthel was previously a defensive coordinator, A&M-Commerce made huge strides on the offensive side of the ball in his first season, averaging 35 points per game, a 22.4 points per game increase and the most by a Lion team since 1990. The Lions garnered 15 All-Lone Star Conference selections in 2013, including three first-team recognitions. Defensive lineman Tuaau was named the league's top defender and earned All-America status, while Johnson was heralded as the league's top wide receiver after hauling in over 1,300 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Carthel arrived in Commerce with strong ties to the Lone Star Conference, spending the previous seven seasons as the defensive coordinator at West Texas A&M (2006-12) and playing a key role in establishing the Buffs as one of the top teams in the region. During his seven years at West Texas A&M, each year, including a trip to the NCAA semifinals.

Prior to his time at West Texas A&M, Carthel spent six seasons at fellow Southland Conference member Abilene Christian (2000-05). While in Abilene, Carthel served as the Wildcats' defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator.

All told, Carthel has made 12 consecutive trips to the postseason as a Division II coach, both as an assistant and head coach.

Carthel was a standout player at Angelo State, where he started at middle linebacker and helped lead the Rams to the Lone Star Conference South Championship by recording 59 tackles, four sacks and a fumble recovery as a senior in 1999. Also a four-year letter winner on the Angelo State track and field team, Carthel competed in the discus throw. He received his bachelor's degree in biology from Angelo State in 2000 and later his master's degree from West Texas A&M in 2000.

Colby is married to former West Texas A&M All-American volleyball player and A&M-Commerce associate head volleyball coach Sarah Carthel. The two have a pair of sons, Major and Bear.

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Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 5.3 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.09/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 2.7 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.41/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 12.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 33.5 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 28.0 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 3.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"Average gas prices have continued to move lower in most states in the last week as retail prices continue to catch up to the low price of oil. 27 states boast a low price of \$2 per gallon or less, and Missouri's statewide average will likely fall under \$2 per gallon this week, representing the first state to cross the

psychological barrier," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While the going has been good at most gas pumps, OPEC countries did agree to curb oil production, but the cut was smaller than we had expected, and for a shorter duration than anticipated, resulting in a small upward move in oil, one that may not immediately curb the declines. We appear poised to see the national average drop perhaps at least one more week- and we could close this week with the nation's average in the \$2.30sthe lowest in over a year."

U.S. Beef Gains New Market Access in Morocco

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer and U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced today that the government of Morocco has agreed to allow imports of U.S. beef and beef products into Morocco. 2018 is the first year that U.S. beef and poultry exporters have access to Morocco's market under the terms of the U.S.-Morocco Free Trade Agreement (FTA). Morocco opened its market to U.S. poultry in August, 2018.

"President Trump continues to prioritize the opening of new markets for U.S. agricultural products. New access to the Moroccan market for beef and beef products is an important step in ensuring that American farmers and ranchers can continue to expand their exports of U.S. agricultural

products," said Ambassador Lighthizer. "I welcome Morocco's agreement to allow imports of U.S. beef and look forward to growing our shipments to Morocco."

"Finding new markets for American agricultural products has been a priority for the Trump Administration from day one, and the opening of the Moroccan market is good news for our producers," said Secretary Perdue. "American beef is the best in the world, and once Moroccans get a taste of it, they'll surely want more."

In 2017, the United States was the world's third largest beef exporter, with global sales of beef and beef products valued at \$7.3 billion. As of November 2018, U.S. exports of agricultural products to Morocco exceeded \$512

million. Initial estimates indicate that Morocco would be an \$80 million market for U.S. beef and beef products. Morocco had prohibited imports of U.S. beef.

Under the leadership of USTR Chief Agricultural Negotiator, Ambassador Gregg Doud and the direction of U.S. Department of Agriculture's Ken Isley, U.S. and Moroccan officials met to negotiate a health certificate and the terms for the import of U.S. high quality and standard quality beef into Morocco. Representatives also discussed improvements to the administration of Morocco's wheat tariff-rate quota and other agriculture and SPS issues, and will continue this work through the agriculture and SPS subcommittees under the FTA.



Gingerbread

Gingerbread can be found everywhere this time of year from lattes to candles to lotions. Although now associated with the Christmas holiday season, gingerbread has a long history.

The actual spice, ginger root, was first cultivated in Ancient China. It was introduced to Europe along the Spice Road. Ginger was originally used to disguise the flavor of preserved meat. It was considered for its medicinal properties. Henry VIII used ginger to help build resistance against the plague. Some still use ginger to help prevent sea sickness and nausea.

The first known recipe for making gingerbread was in Greece around 2400 BC. It was introduced to Western Europe by 11th century crusaders returning from the Mediterranean. Gingerbread became a favorite treat at festivals and fairs in medieval Europe. During medieval times, ginger referred to any kind of preserved ginger. The term became associated with ginger flavored cakes around the 15th century.

During medieval times ladies gave a piece of ginger to their favorite knight as a token of good luck. Often the maidens would eat a gingerbread "husband" in hopes of catching the real thing. In 1598 Shakespeare even mentioned gingerbread in a play.

In Germany, gingerbread or Lebkuchen, was served at street festivals in the shape of hearts. The Germans also invented the gingerbread house around the 16th century. It is unknown if the gingerbread house was created before or after the story about Hansel and Gretel. The first gingerbread man was introduced by Queen Elizabeth I, who had the cookies baked and decorated in the likeness of visiting dignitaries.

The colonists brought gingerbread to the Americas, and we have been baking either the bread or cookies for some 200 years. George Washington's mother was famous for her gingerbread recipe. In fact, the first American cookbook, America Cookery by Amelia Simmons, had several gingerbread recipes.

Many countries have their own version of gingerbread cookies: Ginger snaps, Polish pierniczki, Czech pernik, Russian pryaniki, Croatian licitars, Scandinavian pepparkakor, and Dutch speculaas.




Nathaniel Covarrubias, PA-C
