State Biologists Fish in City Lake

Biologists from the Slaton field office of the Parks and Wildlife Commission, were in Crowell last Tuesday and Wednesday and ran tests on the City Lake, seeking to July 24, John Nichols, 1964 determine why no channel catfish gill nets in the lake overnight Tuesday and seining the edges with a minnow seine

Game Warden Charles Talbert said that only one channel cat was caught in the nets, and although a number of small bass were caught by seining, no baby channel catfish was caught.

Talbert said that for the second year, bass fishing has been reported as good, and from the numerous spawns of young bass seen in shallow water and taken by seine, suggests that the bass population in the lake is adequate. However, catching only one

channel cat in the nets and seeing no spawns, caused the biologists and Mr. Talbert to place an order with the state fish hatchery for small channel cat to re-stock the lake with that species.

Temperature tests conducted by the biologists in the lake showed that the water temperature in the deepest part of the lakewhich, incidentally, was not over a man's head-was 86 degrees, while the water in the shallow parts along the edges was as high as 106 degrees.

Mr. Talbert said from the tests made, there was no indication of rough fish being in the lake.

The game warden stated that a great deal of bass fishing in the lake during the past two years points out the fact stressed by the Game and Wildlife Department that heavy fishing in a lake does not appreciably deplete the





Would Be Advanced Further by Sound Fiscal Measures

In the view of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce, the war on poverty drive would be advanced further by sound fiscal measures rather than by the Administration's program. It cites figures showing that, allowing for price adjustments, the proportion of families with cash incomes under \$3,000 was reduced from 32 per cent of all families in 1950 to 25 per cent in 1955, 21 per cent in 1960, and 20 per cent in 1962. It adds that this was accomplished primarily through the growth of the economy.




