FOARD COUNTY 4-H GOLD STAR WINNERS NAMED

Foard Decision Upheld by State Supreme Court

A civil case, which was tried before District Judge Tom Davis in Foard County, has been appealed to the State Supreme Court, who on November 4 returned an opinion upholding Judge Davis' original decision in the case.

The case, styled, T. B. Burrow et. al. vs James W. McMahan, et. al., concerned the mineral rights of the south half section 478, block A, cert. 31/2839, H&TC Ry. Co. survey.

Judge Davis rendered a verdict favoring McMahan. The case was then appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo where Judge Davis' decision was upheld. Judge Davis has been notified that lawyers for the Burrow interests have made a motion for a re-hearing before the Supreme Court.

Judge Davis said that in the six years he has served as district judge, this is the third civil case from Foard County to be appealed to the state's highest court. In the first two decisions, the court said there were no reversible errors, and in the case mentioned above, they returned an opinion upholding the original verdict.

Rifle Club Members Enter "Postal" Tournament

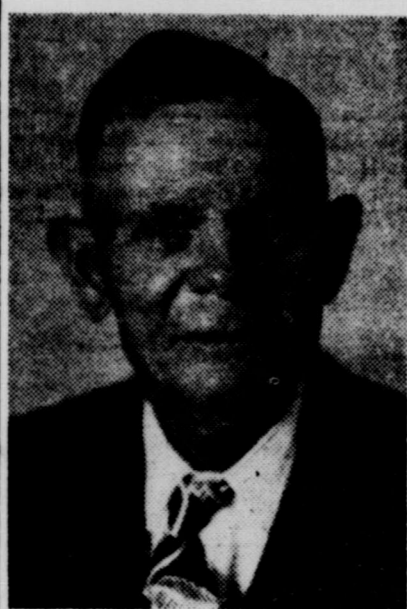

Sim Gamble, 88, retired farmer and member of a prominent Foard County family, died Wednesday morning of last week in the Crowell hospital following a long illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday from the Thalia Methodist Church conducted by Rev. C. C. Lamb of Teal, and Rev. C. C. Dorn, pastor. Interment was in the Thalia Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

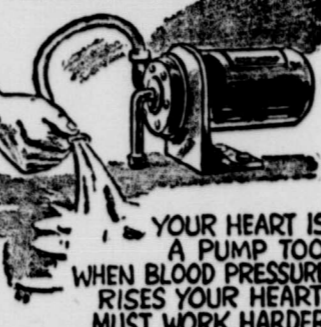

Early Christmas Mailings Urged by Postmaster

"Please pack parcels solidly," was the plea of Postmaster Ted Reeder Monday as he discussed the upcoming Christmas mailing season. The head of the Crowell Post Office also reminded his patrons that the use of free "local" and "out-of-town" separation bands will help move the mails faster. The bands are available at the post office or from most letter carriers.

December 5 is the suggested deadline for mailing out-of-town packages. "Don't worry about the parcels being delivered too early, just mark 'Don't Open Until Christmas' on the front," Mr. Reeder said.

A tightly stuffed package, with nothing rattling around inside, will have less chance of being damaged in transit," he noted.

"When packing a gift, remember that the package you send may be shipped on the bottom of a mail sack and there may be heavier packages on top. Among the relatively few packages that are damaged in transit, improper packaging is the greatest factor," the postmaster cautioned.

Just to be on the safe side, the postmaster suggests that all packages be insured.

He noted that poor packaging and addresses which are either incorrect or not legible are responsible for the non-delivery of about half a million parcels each year. If the return address is incorrect or illegible and the package cannot be returned, it will be saved for 90 days. If unclaimed, the parcel is usually lost to the sender or intended recipient.

Such parcels wind up in public auctions held at 15 major post offices across the nation.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should also have the address written on the exterior wrapping should come off.

Mr. Reeder emphasized that ZIP coding the addresses on parcels and letters helps insure against loss due to improper addressing. Since each area of the country has an individual ZIP code, there is little chance of a piece of mail destined for one city being directed to a city which may have a similar name. For example, there are at least 26 possible areas around the country which would have Springfield in the address. Use of the proper ZIP code would send the mail to the right post office.

These free boating facilities are being constructed from boat registration fees collected by the State Highway Department at the direction of the legislature. The 1959 Texas Legislature which passed the Water Safety Act designated the Highway Department as the administering agency to collect boat registration fees.

Demand for Farm Products is Up, But Prices Lower

An increased demand for farm products, increased farm production and stocks, increased production expenses, and lower prices for farmers make up today's general agricultural situation, reports John G. McHaney, Extension economist, Texas A&M University. Increasing personal income and an expanding population point to continued gains in consumer demand for farm products through the remainder of 1964. McHaney contributes income gains to increasing employment, rising wages, larger dividends, surge in corporate profits, and reduction in income tax rates.

Output of farm products continues to increase and will likely total above last year's level, says McHaney, and stocks of most crops were larger at the beginning of the present marketing year. Crop indication as of July 1 were brighter than those a year earlier, and the uptrend in yields is expected to continue.

Production of livestock and livestock products in January-June, 1964, period was four or five per cent above last year and is expected to total a little above 1963 during July-December of this year.

Production expenses have been rising steadily in recent years, the economist points out. During the first half of 1964, the index of prices paid by farmers for production items was slightly higher than a year earlier and will remain high during the rest of this year.

Prices received by farmers in the first half of 1964 averaged two per cent below last year. For the year as a whole, they are expected to average about three per cent below 1963.

Although realized net farm income has remained relatively steady for the past decade, averaging about \$12 billion annually, the numbers of farmers and ranchers has declined steadily from 4.8 million in 1954 to 3.5 million at the present. Thus the average income per farm is rising this year to about \$3,500 compared with about \$2,500 in 1954.

Farmers who have been able to stay in agriculture may continue to have a higher income on the average, says McHaney. However, he points out that their income is higher since many had to drop out of agriculture because they were unable to compete in a very competitive business.

1964 Agriculture Census to Bring Statistics Up to Date

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Foard County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this county:

There were 369 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 438 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 1,182.9 acres in 1959, compared with 976.1 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the county's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$3,838,500. The value of all crops sold was \$1,709,042. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$2,129,458.

The 1964 Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

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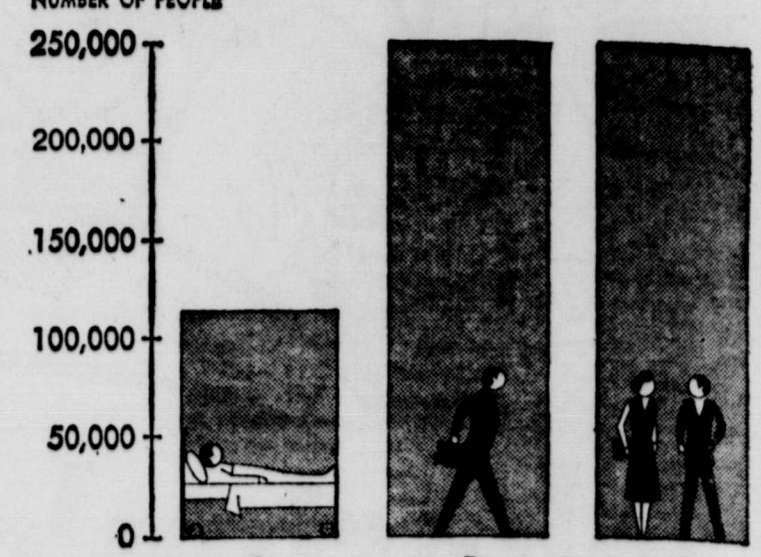
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TB: the Problem that Won't Go Away

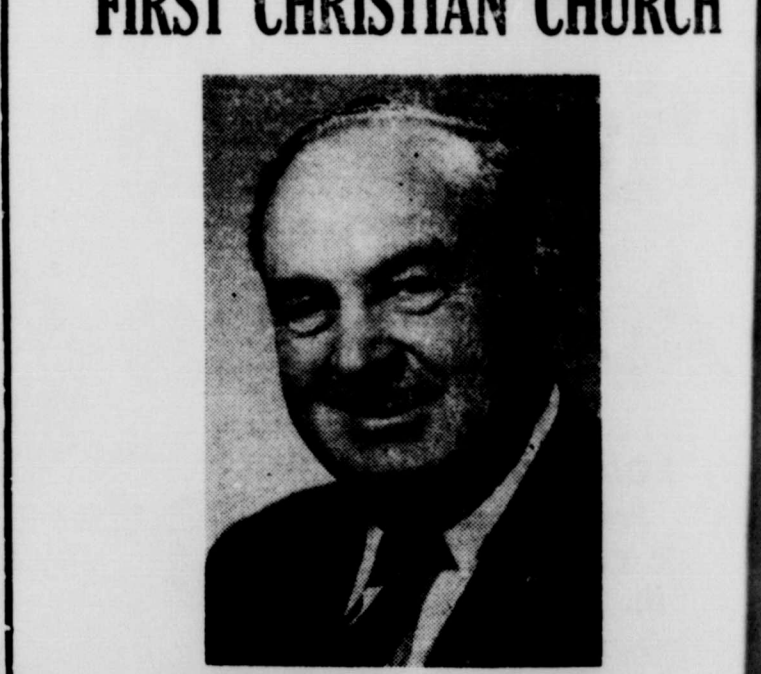
