

#### Students Briefed on Social Security

Francis J. Stevens, a field representative from Wichita Falls, nformed CHS students last week about many of the benefits of social security. Mr. Stevens told the students that social security is tax free and that one doesn't have to be an American to apply for it, but no one behind the Iron Curtain can receive social security because there is no mail service in those countries. The policy was enacted by Congress as a law in 1935; its provisions were essentially these: (1) persons 62 years old and older who are insured under social security may draw benefits, (2) wives of deceased benefactors, if 62, may draw 82 per cent of what their husband would have drawn if the children are under 18 or disabled, (3) the compulsory program now takes 3 and 5/8 per cent of one's salary, (4) forty calendar quarters (four months in one quarter) are required before anyone can be insured.

He also gave facts about the benefits of social security in Foard County: in 1964, a total of \$294,-000 was paid to 400 people, and this was the largest payroll in an

eleven county district. Mr. Stevens left blanks in order that students who do not have a social security number might make application.

#### **Bookiet Available** on Control of **Cotton Insects**

"The Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects," L-218, has been revised to include the results of continuing research conducted throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Entomology Research Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, reports County Agent Joe Burkett.

He added that copies are now available from his office and urges all Foard County cotton producers to pick up a copy at their convenience.

The development of resistance to insecticides, deposit of harmful residues in the soil or on neighboring crops and destruction of beneficial insect parasites and predators dictate the judicious use of insecticides, explains the county agent. If possible, he says, their use should be restricted to actual need based on inspections.

The guide, in addition to listing the recommended control measures, points out many other important factors involved in the overall problems of controlling cotton insects and the safe use of insecticides.

All insecticides are poisonous and the county agent emphasizes the need for using them in strict accordance with the manufacturer's labeled instructions.

#### \$21,527.56 Is Outlaw Tab for Month

Severe penalties against major game law violators again marked the monthly arrest report for the Parks and Wildlife Department, according to J. B. Phillips, coordinator for law enforcement.

Total fines and costs for the month were \$21,527.56, including several in the \$200-plus bracket. Last month's combined total was \$26,532,83.

Justice as administered by the wildlife also again stressed the number of hunting licenses revoked, noted Phillips. Forty-five offenders lost their hunting privileges at least temporarily, making a two-month total of 98 such added levies.

Night hunting accounted for 135 cases. This was slightly more than the preceding month, said Phillips. He observed that the nocturnal activity probably reflected "continued craving for venison after the regular hunting season closed December 31."

The law enforcement chief said there were some other signs of aborted efforts to follow the sport of hunting out of season. Eleven persons were filed on for hunting ducks out of season and five were charged with illegal

The addity of the month's infractions involved possession of an acudad sheep without valid permit. A closely supervised open season on the rare sheep was held in the Palo Duro Canyon country, with hunting permits issued by the Parks and Wildlife Department to landowners who in turn issued such permits to hunt-






