





The Crowell School Board is offering a bond issue of \$225,000.00 that is to serve two purposes:

1. Approximately . \$60,000.00.. to . purchase . needed school aids-to satisfy accreditation standards of Department of Education, State of Texas.

A. This entails in the main: new lighting, new desks, more adequate rest room facilities for grade school, more and better equipment for science departmentstorage facilities for teachers, help in library department and many other needed improvements that come under recommendations of State Department of Education to remove us from "warning" list of schools not meeting their standards. This would, in the main, meet our basic needs.

2. To build a new gymnasium, and band hall, with space for choral room.

In reality these two propositions overlap in that the above expenditures of \$60,000.00 does not include improvements to the existing band hall or needed expenditures for improvement of the old gym. To spend the necessary money to bring the old band hall and needed repairs to rest room facilities and some other improvements to the old gym would entail such a large expenditure that the board deemed it best to build a new gym.

The writer feels that the above program is well balanced, and is in line with other schools of our size, and with the savings to be made in our transportation department and others under consideration, the Crowell Independent School District will be placed on a current basis and be able to operate in the future in such manner. This proposed issue, carrying a 31¢ tax rate increase will retire the bonds in 15 years, saving around \$25,000.00 in interest over a 20-year issue. The bond market at this time is very strong and indications are that they can be sold at around a 3.50 rate.
