



SAM BASS LEGEND CONTINUES TO HAUNT CAVERN-Did Sam Bass really use Longhorn Cavern as a hideout? And does the ghost of the notorious Texas bad man still ride the trails across the surrounding countryside of Longhorn Cavern State Park? Visitors will have to determine this for themselves. Rusty six-shooters and flattened bullets found in the cave bear out part of the legend. Two human skeletons have also been discovered inside along the two-mile stretch of enormous tooms and passageways. The so-called "Sam Bass Footprint" indelibly marked within the cavern interior (see photo above) lends further credence to the theory that the outlaw has and may continue to haunt its portals . . . even though the giant print is seven feet long. Cavern guides are apparently taking no chances on running into the outlaw. Tours are conducted hourly; but only during the daytime from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.


### **Condition of Milburn Carroll Reported** As "Improving"
