Insect Infestations Light in Most **Cotton Fields**

Some Heavy Thrip, **Webworm Damage** Reported by Agent

Cotton meetings and cotton insect field checks held over the county indicate that as a whole insect infestations are very light in most cotton fields, according

There has been some heavy thrip and webworm damage in a few fields. Only one field showed heavy fleahopper and lygus bug infestations. A few bollworm eggs were found and one field showed a medium bollweevil infestation. Burkett says that farmers should be on the alert for fleahopper build-up due to weather conditions during the past week.

"To date this has been one of our lighter cotton insect infesta tion years," Mr. Burkett observed. Most cotton farmers are receiving the weekly cotton insect report from Emory P. Boring, area entomologist with the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

Mr. Burkett said that any cotton farmer who isn't receiving this report and would like to have it should contact him.
