Within these 60 ramps, construction status varies from completion to the planning stage. Forty ramps were under construction this summer, with 20 programmed for construction in the near fu-

Under the Water Safety Act of 1959, the Highway Department is charged with the responsibility of building boat ramps with surplus funds remaining after collecting boat registration fees. The department is the administering agency for the program.

Boat ramp locations are selected on the basis of the water area to be served and the number of boat registration fees in the area.

Described by the Texas Highway Commission as a "giant stride forward in the state's tourist attraction program," the boat ramps offer water lovers-Texans and tourists, too-year-round launching spots at no charge.

#### Letter Written in 1864 Tells of Civil **War Battles**

The following letter was written in 1864 by W. K. Bounds, an uncle of Clarence Bounds of Crowell, while in line of battle near Marietta, Ga. A few days after penning it, he fell in action at the head of his company. In line of battle near

Marietta, Ga., June 26th, 1864. Mr. J. R. Bounds,

Dear Father, I write you these few lines to let you know I am in the injoyment of good health at this time, hoping these few lines may in safety reach you and find you and all the family in good health. I have no news to write to you at this time, however, I could write a great deal about our fighting, retreating and hard ships we have to undergo since starting out in this campaign.

We left Dalton on the 5th of May (here a line is undecipherable), went back and forward to Resca three or four times, and finally went into line of battle at Resca on the 13th.

On the 14th the Yankees charg ed us with two or three lines of pulsed, killing and wounding a great many. We lost none in the charge. The fight continued two days. Several were wounded by exposing themselves above the works. Our reserve lost more men than we did. We had five wounded in one company, Uncle Haymon Bailey was the only one wounded in my old company. We left there on the night of the 15th and went to Coffeeville where we made another stand and throwed up good works, but had no fight except between the calvary and pickets. We left there that night, it being about the 18th and went to New Hope Church where we had a pretty heavy fight on the 25th. We were held in reserve, but rur up and down the lines two or three times, and finally went to the support of Grandbury's Brigade. He fought till after dark and then charged the Yankees, killing and capturing a great many It was a dark, rainy night, and the worst thicket you ever saw in your life. After that, we were put in the pits, where we lay under fire for a week. Few were hurt to add to the disagreeableness of the situation. It rained from the 17th of May until the 23rd of

Leaving New Hope, we fell back to Big Shanta on the railroad

here we were sent to picket. The Federal calvary was in front of us, and when they drove our cavalry a strong line of battle was pushed forward making us skeedaddle. Being deployed about ten paces apart, our line was very

We are now near Marietta at this time, and have been on the picket duty the last week. We undertook to drive in the lines the other evening in order to gain a position. They fell back unti their artillery was brought to bear upon us, when we were ordered to lie down, when the heaviest shelling I ever heard commenced but there was only one man in our company slightly hurt.

Pa, I saw Rob a few days ago He was in fine health. He has been at Montgomery ever since the army started up there until a few days ago.

Our army seems to be in fine health and spirits. I would not be surprised if we were not at Chattachoochie River before long. We've seen the hardest times since this campaign commenced but get very good ration, draw ing corn bread, bacon, coffee, sugar, tobacco and whiskey, which is a great deal better than we have been used to. I had my hat and clothes shot to pieces at Resca, but was not hurt, only scalped a little one time.

Tell Mother we are the dirtiest nastiest, filthiest set she ever saw and think we do well if we get to wash our face once a week, and our shirt in the branch once a month without soap.

So I will come to a close by remaining your son until death. W. K. Bounds.


