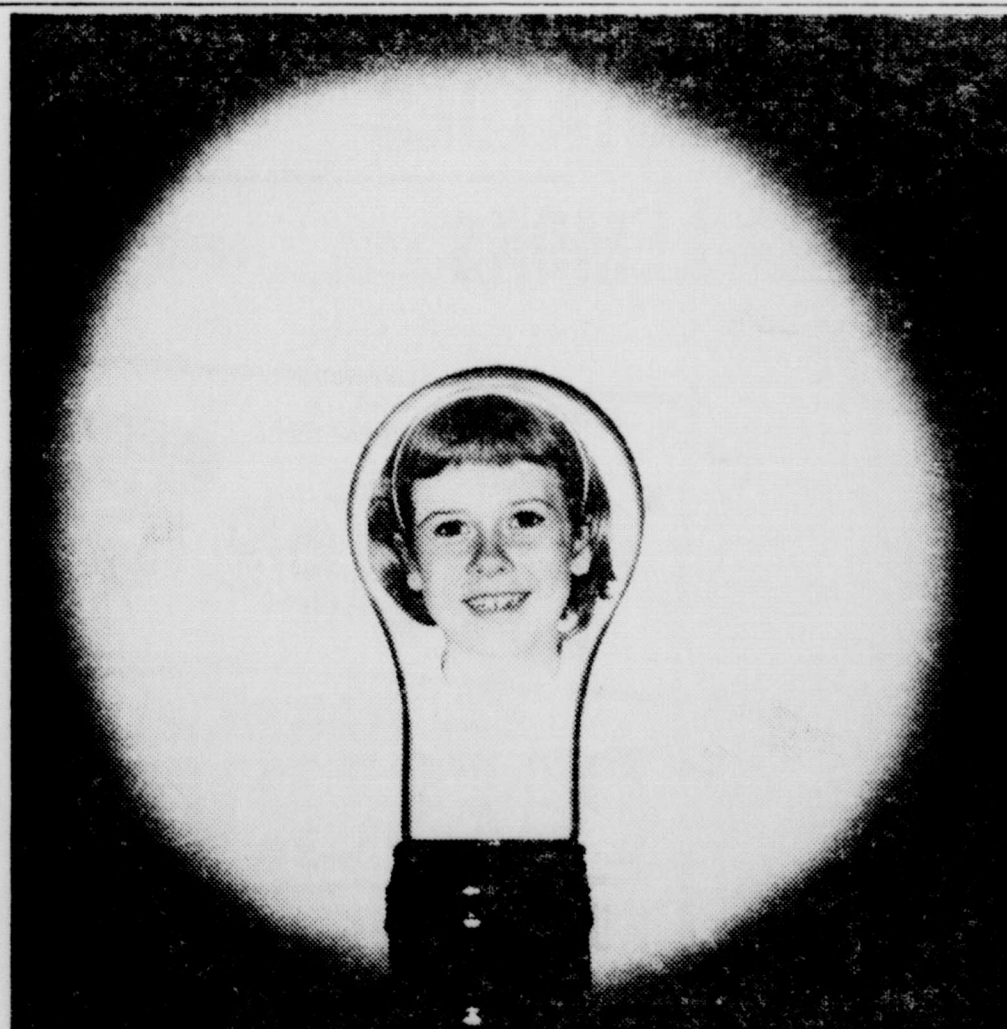

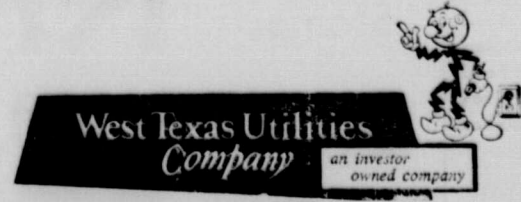

Survey Underway on Greenbelt Pipe Line to Crowell

Engineers for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority were in Quannah and Crowell last week to start a new survey of the pipeline from Quannah to Crowell, it was announced at a meeting of directors in Childress last week.

The new proposed line will go direct from Quannah to Crowell and will by-pass Lake Pauline from which the West Texas Utilities secures its water.

"The new line will be shorter and should save several thousands of dollars in construction costs," said Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of the Authority.

The directors voted to ask the Texas Water Development Board to purchase \$300,000 more in water storage in the lake which will be located on the Salt Fork of Red River north of Clarendon.

Survey on lines from Lelia Lake Creek to the damsite and from the damsite to Clarendon were started last week, also.

"We should be ready to advertise for the completion of the Greenbelt before many weeks," Dr. Townsend said.

Bids for equipment to control the pipeline electronically from Lelia Lake Creek to Quannah have been advertised for and were received by Sept. 2, it was announced. Cost has been estimated at \$85,000.

The \$2,000,000 gallon reservoir at Hedley was put into operation Monday of last week, it was announced at the meeting by Jimmy Khun, manager for the Greenbelt.

Water secured from Lelia Lake Creek has not been near the estimated amount but has been enough to handle the needs of both Quannah and Childress without any water being used from the lakes at Childress, it was also announced at the meeting.

Water from the gathering basin has been running over 1,500,000 gallons a day.

Henry Black Named Chairman Four-County Group

Crowell School Superintendent Henry Black was named permanent chairman, and Sam Phelps, Vernon's city manager, was named secretary Tuesday night of last week in Quannah of a proposed four-county federally financed Community Action Program.

The CAP is a part of President Johnson's anti-poverty program under the U. S. Economic Opportunity Act.

The four-county organization is being set up on advice of state and federal authorities to develop projects to aid the needy and underprivileged on a local level in each of the counties and to secure and administer federal funds under the program.

A multi-county unit is required in order to have single units for groups with fewer than 25,000 population.

Some 20 persons from Hardeman, Foard, Wilbarger and Cottle Counties discussed plans for incorporation of the unit, and approval of by-laws—the first step in qualifying for approval of the programs which may be developed in the area.

Another meeting—the third since consideration of the program began—was held in Vernon Tuesday night of this week to begin the process of hammering out by-laws for the group.

The organization is expected to hire full-time personnel both to develop and administer the programs which will be operated in the four counties.

Because of requirements that a Negro and Latin American be designated from each county on the board, three of the counties, all except Wilbarger, are expected to secure replacements for some of their temporary organizational members.

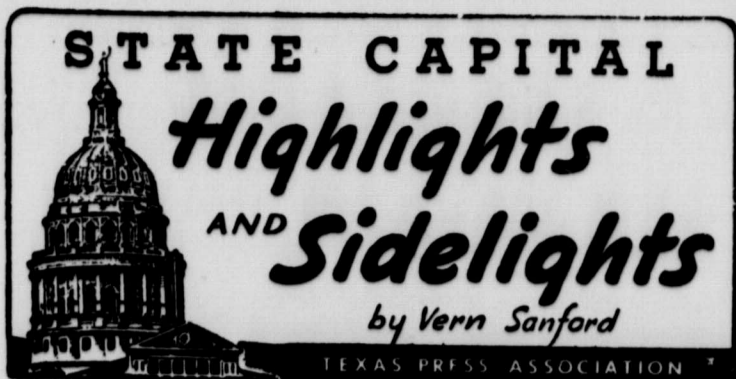

Austin, Tex.—Atty. Gen. Wagner Carr came up with some interesting argument in answer to the federal suit which attacks the Texas poll tax.

Suit filed by the U. S. Justice Department seeks to get the poll tax ruled invalid as a requirement for voting. Contention is that the poll tax discriminates against Negroes.

That isn't so, Carr argued Friday in a pre-trial hearing before U. S. District Judge Adrian Spears. Carr claimed that a survey this spring by the Southern Regional Council showed that 57.7 per cent of the Negroes in Texas eligible to vote paid poll taxes and registered to vote, but only 53.2 per cent of the Caucasians registered in that fashion.

Carr also contended that the \$1.50 state poll tax, levied in 1837 as a "head tax," was tied to the right to vote in 1902 not to keep Negroes from voting, but to assure collection of the head tax. He added that revenue from the present \$1.75 poll tax goes to the available school fund of the state, amounting to more than \$2,000,000 last year.

The federal suit citation—which centers on an all-white Austin precinct—was filed under the new federal voting rights act. Carr noted that the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights in 1961 found no discriminatory disenfranchisement.

Poll tax procedure is the only form of voter registration in Texas. So, a federal court invalidation of the poll tax would mean a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of enacting a new voter registration law.

Carr also asked the court to order U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach to clarify whether his suit is aimed at striking down requirements that only property owners may vote in bond elections.

MEXICAN COTTON BANNED—Texas border will be sealed to free movement of Mexican cotton beginning September 25, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

White said late cotton plantings in excess of 6,000 acres and "abandonment of mutual cultural practices against the destructive pink bollworm in Mexico" required the border control action. Pink bollworm has destroyed as much as \$4,000,000 of Rio Grande Val-

ley cotton in one season alone, the commissioner stated.

New Census Report Shows Increase in Industrial Statistics

Texas industries reported a 1963 value added by manufacture of \$7.05 billion, an increase of 40 per cent over the value added for 1958, a preliminary report of the 1963 Census of Manufactures just issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

"Value added by manufacture" approximates the value of products shipped minus the materials used to manufacture the products. Chemicals and allied products led the state's industries with a value added figure of \$1.7 billion, an increase of almost 57 per cent over the value added for 1958, last previous year of the census.

In second place was petroleum and coal products, which reported a 1963 value added of \$956 million, more than 61 per cent higher than in 1958. Food and allied products climbed 30 per cent in the five-year period to a 1963 total of \$923 million.

Fourth place went to transportation equipment, which reported a 1963 value added of \$610 million, less than one per cent higher than in 1958.

The Houston standard metropolitan statistical area, consisting of Brazoria, Fort Bend, Harris, Liberty and Montgomery counties, had a 1963 value added of \$1.9 billion, almost 27 per cent of the state's total.

The Dallas SMSA, consisting of Collin, Dallas, Denton and Ellis counties, was in second place with a value added for 1963 of \$1.2 billion, an increase of almost 38 per cent over its value added for 1958.

Doubts Cast on Story of Cynthia Ann Parker

The following article was taken from the Sunday edition of The Dallas Morning News.

Austin, Texas—Documents presented to the University of Texas now cast doubt on the long-accepted belief that Comanche raiders captured Cynthia Ann Parker in 1836.

The study of Cynthia Ann has long been familiar to history students.

While an infant, she was carried away by Indians after a massacre at Fort Parker in 1836. Her father, Silas Parker, had built the fort near Groesbeck three years earlier.

Indian fighters found Cynthia Ann living with Comanches and took her from them after a battle near Crowell Dec. 18, 1860.

Historians assumed that Comanches wiped out Fort Parker and carried their captive to West Texas.

But papers presented to the university by John R. Price of Houston include three accounts written in June 1836—only a month after the raid. And these accounts say the outpost was attacked by the Caddo Tribe.

R. Henderson Shuffler, director of the Texana program at the University, said he concluded after reading these accounts that Caddos carried away Cynthia Ann and then traded her to the Comanches.

Price, whose mother was a descendant of the Parkers, gave the university 142 items to add to its already extensive collection dealing with the family.

The contribution also included a letter which Benjamin Parker, a member of the Texas Legislature, wrote a brother in 1860. Like those who came to Austin this year, the 1860 legislators were embroiled in a controversy over redistricting.

Parker complained in the letter that the Legislature was making little progress because "too many great men here who expect to be congressmen or governors or some other big dog and they consume a great deal of time in discussing great constitutional questions."

Then he commented, "There is more constitutional lawyers in this Legislature than any that have ever heretofore met. Agreeable to their interpretation of the instrument, we cannot pass any law that is constitutional, but they do not agree among themselves and so I judge for myself."

Fall Screwworm Increase Feared

Texas farmers and ranchers may be in for the most severe upswing in screwworm infestations in two years during the upcoming months.

All ingredients for another fall buildup are present in the state, screwworm eradication leaders announced: a native fly population, favorable weather and an abundance of animals wounds.

Increases in screwworm cases during the fall are part of an age-old pattern established by the insect. General rains over much of the state, moderate temperatures and an increase in animal husbandry activities comprise favorable conditions for screwworms to develop and move cross-country.

Before the eradication program began, tens of thousands of cases were experienced during fall months, and even last year more than half of the infestations detected in Texas were reported in September, October and November.

This year's buildup could be the worst since 1963, eradication officials fear, because, unlike last year when no cases were found in late summer, screwworms are already present in Texas and could spread quickly into the interior of the state when weather conditions become right.

Zavala County, southwest of San Antonio, has experienced screwworm problems all summer. Eradicators last month initiated an intensified spray campaign in the county in an attempt to wipe out the native fly population there. The success of their efforts may determine if Texas has a fall buildup or not.

Eradication forces are prepared to treat with sterile flies all infestations reported to them. Larvae from suspected infestations should be sent to the eradication laboratory at Mission, or to the local county agent, for positive identification.

Stockmen are also urged to be extremely cautious in working their livestock and should apply smears or sprays to all wounds. It has been estimated each screwworm case costs approximately \$62 in labor and medicines and loss of animal weight and market value. Preventive treatment is obviously a much cheaper alternative. Livestock industry leaders point out.

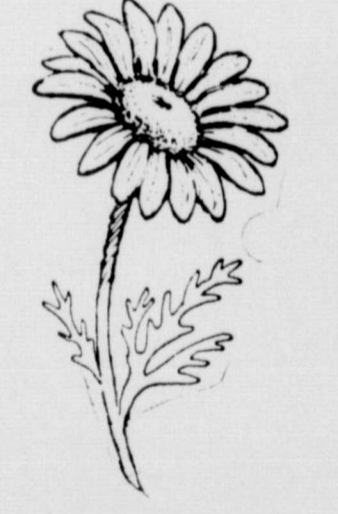
