





He said taking loaded guns out of motor vehicles and crawling through fences with loaded guns traditionally cause a surprising number of fatalities. Phillips said a check with the warden force, which "preaches safety" as a matter of routine,

focused on the fact that the average hunter should realize the deadly impact of a bullet or a shotgun charge.

"If the wardens had their way," he said, "hunters would concentrate on unloading their guns before getting into a car, and certainly before returning to camp. Because it's that unloaded weapon that creates so much heartache." Phillips said department statistics show that many upland game hunters do not understand the range of pellets fired from a shotgun. "Ironically, many keep shooting at a bird after it is well out of reach of a killing impact. And others risk a shot when someone else is in actual range of shot."

The law enforcement coordinator said mishandling of gun safeties is responsible for many accidents, in that it is easy to forget and to keep the safety off between shots.

Phillips cautioned all hunters that another common cause of mishaps is clogged gun barrels, when dirt or other foreign substance gets into the muzzle end of the gun, causing the barrel to splinter when the charge strikes the blocked area.

Dr. Campbell and Family Return Home from Brazil

Dr. and Mrs. Lowell Campbell have returned to their home in Corsicana after staying for several weeks in the interior of Brazil as an assignment with the AM-DOC program.

From the middle of July until they left, the family has been in Rio Verde, south of Brazil's new capital city of Brazilia, where the Corsicana physician relieved a doctor at the Hospital Evangeline de Rio Verde, a Presbyterian hospital.

The family arrived at the hos-pital on July 15 and Dr. Campbell assumed his replacement duties the next day. "July 16 began with surgery in the A. M. and clinic all P. M. We had three surgicals that morning; in clinic that afternoon we saw two very small children with tuberculosi For the first time since arr in Brazil, I saw a Brazilian moth er manifest emotion when told that her baby had tuberculosis Though she tried hard to choke them back, big tear droplets welled up in her eyes. She then managed to show a smile through the tears as Dr. Benjamin Spadoni, a very fine Brazilian physician explained gently to her that, with treatment, the baby would soon be better. She has been in the clinic every day since that time with her baby for treatment, and the results are miraculous to for both mother and baby.

"Another disease we see in abundance here is one caused by invasion of the body by a one celled microscopic animal called a protozoa, with the name trypanomiasis. The cause was discovered by a missionary named Chaga thus the common name for the disease is Chaga's disease. We never see this in the States. It effects primarily the gastro-intestinal tract and the heart. When the former is involved, there are surgical procedures which benefit the patient. When the latter is involved, there is very little to be done. During the 19 days we have been in Rio Verde, we have had 21 major procedures, and three of these have been for Chaga's disease, all doing well. Conversely, we recently lost a 31-year-old man with Chaga's disease of the heart.

"Chaga's is a disease of poverty and ignorance in the sense that it is transmitted by an insect called the Barbeiro which is harbored in poorly constructed homes in



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cracks and holes in the walls. The disease could be eradicated if the people could be taught to plaster their walls and spray with Mammexane to kill the insects. Of course, they are being educated gradually, but the process is slow. Like other people all over the world, some of these people refuse to profit from the experience of others," Dr. Campbell observed. In addition to the Campbell

Sports Dominate **Early Dove Hunt**

Dove hunters, including the nassed throngs on the white-winged dove shoot, have generally been good sportsmen, said J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"We had a minimum of violation," said Phillips. "They mainly involved getting over the limit and using unplugged guns. The daily limit of mourning doves is 12 and possession 24, and the whitewing limit is 10 and 20."

Guns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity. Phillips said some of the greedy unters were caught, like the two Dallas hunters intercepted by a raffic patrolman with "two or three limits too many," as well as with dressed doves, minus the feather wing that should be left on each carcass.
