



# **Prairie Flower** Reburied in Fort **Sill Ceremony**

Nocona-Here at the north part of the Upper Cross Timbers-the Comanche Indians' old hunting grounds-a reburial procession bearing the remains of Prairie Flower, young daughter of Cynthia Ann Parker and Chief Peta Nocona, paused Saturday after- Z noon on its way to the post cemetery at Fort Sill, Okla.

A funeral home limousine carrying the child's small white casket, with a red Indian blanket neatly folded length-wise across the top of the coffin, was escorted into Nocona's city limits on U. S. Highway 82, east, by highway patrolmen, Nocona officers, and the Chisholm Trail Riding Club.

A small group of citizens, some of them pioneers in this proud and historic town named for the Indian chief, gathered at the front steps of Nocona Boot Co., off the highway, to hear Nocona pay its respects and welcome relatives of Cynthia Ann Parker and descendants of Chief Nocona, processional attendants.

"Time is a great healer of sorrow, trial and tribulation," said Glenn Wilson, president of Montague County Historical Society. He recounted the tragic separation of Cynthia Ann and Prairie Flower from their husband and father and their subse-

quent early deaths. "This is a noble deed that you are engaged in," he told some 15 relatives of the famous couple. "May God bless you and guide your footsteps into the future, and may we, the citizens of Nocona, ever strive to bear honor ably the name, Nocona."

The center of attention seeme to be Mrs. Harry (Wanada) Page of Lawton, oldest living daughter of Quanah Parker (son of Cynthia Ann and Chief Nocona), and the great grandson of Quanah Parker The procession, which started

at Tyler earlier in the day, reach ed its destination a little after 4 p. m. Saturday at Fort Sill where Prairie Flower was rebur ied. A memorial service, open to the public, was held at the pos remetery at 2 p. m. Sunday.

Remains of Prairie Flower, orig inally buried in Asbury Cemetery southwest of Edom near Tyler were disinterred Friday for reburial next to the graves of her tery of the old Army post.

"Today our thoughts go back into the past to an event which transpired on the Texas frontier when a young girl was taken into captivity by Chief Nocona, chief of the Noconne band of Comanches," said Wilson.

"Prairie Flower whose memory **PURPLE TOP** we honor today and who is being returned to the land of her peopl was a victim of this period and condition. It is entirely fitting that we, the citizens of Nocona, honor the families of Chief Nocona and Cynthia Ann Parker fo we proudly bear the name of thi Comanche chief," Wilson said.

Cynthia Ann was buried in Foster Cemetery in Henderson County, Texas, but in 1910, Chief Quanah reburied his mother's remains at the Fort Sill Cemetery. When Quanah died in 1911, he was buried beside her.





NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH WEEK OCTOBER 10-16. In the current school year about 18 million children will be served nutritious noonday meals under the National School Lunch Program. It is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service, which provides about a fifth of the total cost in cash and food. This program makes it possible for children to enjoy a complete lunch for an average payment of only 27 cents. A tenth of the nearly 3 billion lunches consumed last year were served free or at reduced prices to youngsters who could not afford the full price. About 71,000 public and non-profit private schools are expected to take part in the program this year.

## White River Lake Is New Fish Spot

White River Lake, located 58 niles from Lubbock in a triangle between Floydada, Ralls and Dickens, is the latest fish facility for Texas, according to Leo D. Lewis, regional fishery supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The October 1 opening date found the lake, constructed in the early 60's and stocked in December, 1963, after a preliminary rough fish eradication program, full and teeming with three-yearold game fish.

Initial stocking included 45,000 channel catfish and 25,000 black bass from state fish hatcheries. Lewis said the new lake is expected to produce some fine strings of game fish for lower plains ang-



## White River Lake Is New Fish Spot

White River Lake, located 58 miles from Lubbock in a triangle between Floydada, Ralls and Dickens, is the latest fish facility for Texas, according to Leo D. Lewis, regional fishery supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The October 1 opening date found the lake, constructed in the early 60's and stocked in December, 1963, after a preliminary rough fish eradication program, full and teeming with three-yearold game fish.

Initial stocking included 45,000 channel catfish and 25,000 black bass from state fish hatcheries. Lewis said the new lake is expected to produce some fine strings of game fish for lower plains ang-



Parks and Wildlife Commission simply means that the people of a county, through their representatives in the Legislature, have turned over the responsibility of conducting scientific research or game and fish problems, setting of open seasons, bag limits, and methods of taking wildlife re sources to the Commission.

About 15 years ago, the first counties were given such a status. Now this number has grown to 184 of the 254 counties.
