"Young couples need to manage all of their resources and make changes in financial management in line with long range goals, rather than stressing short term goals and living from year to year," the specialist says. The research focused on how aged farm couples in the two areas were living six years after the Social Security Act had been amended to include them. Data were collected on expenses for family living and levels of net worth.

Eighty per cent of the retired farm couples included in the study had incomes from social security. Slightly over 10 per cent of the couples had so little income from social security or other sources that they applied for and received old age assistance to make up deficits in their income. For various reasons, planning for retirement had not been adequate. The study also disclosed that

67 per cent of the farm couples were receiving enough social security benefits or income from other sources that they did not receive any old age assistance benefits. Although their average money income after taxes decreased 19 per cent following retirement, it averaged \$3,141 - or well above the "modest but adequate" budget of \$2,500 set up by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for a retired couple, Mrs. Myers says.

Planning for retirement by couples receiving social security -but not old age assistance-allowed them to maintain their former level of living, according to Mrs. Myers.

If you're talking about distance, there are 1609 meters in a mile. But, if you're referring to electric meters, it varies from 30, in densely populated areas .. down to one or less per mile in some rural areas.

This marked difference in electric meters per mile is the reason the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) makes low interest loans to finance construction of electrical systems in rural America.

A rural electric program serving only one, or two, or perhaps three meters per mile was not considered profitable, and rural people had been denied the benefits only electricity could bring them.

So . . . rural people formed Electric Cooperatives, borrowed from the REA and built their own electrical systems.


These non-profit Electric Cooperatives are owned and operated by the consumers they serve. They are repaying their REA loans with interest . . . and they do pay their fair share of taxes.
