to Enroll in New **Medicare** Program

Mrs. Carter Clopton, executive director, Governor's Committee on Aging, has released some information on Medicare which will be of interest to Foard County residents

Mrs. Clopton says that the present recipients of social security are automatically being sent letters with a card to file for Medicare. In case of loss of card, apply to local social security office. Persons on old age assistance will receive instructions from the Texas State Department of Pubic Welfare.

She stressed that at the present time everyone who is 65 and over is eligible to apply. Applications must be filed by March 31, 1966. Those persons who are not 65 now but will reach 65 before the 1968 enrollment period must apply 3 months previous to their 65th birthday or 3 months afterward. The next enrollment period will not be until 1968. Under present law, work requirements must be met to apply at that

Medicare-What It Means Medicare benefits will not be available until July of 1966.


Basic Coverage

Hospital Care: Full coverage afer the first \$40 for up to 60 lays in each period of illness* coverage for up to 30 additional days, for which patient pays \$10 a day. Psychiatric care is included for up to 60 days in each period of illness, with a lifetime limit of 190 days.

(* A period of illness, as defined by the bill, normally starts with the first day of hospitalization. A new spell of illness then cannot begin until a person has had no hospitalization nor extended care in any facility for 60 consecutive days.)

Nursing Home Care: Post-hospital care for 20 days in each period of illness at no cost to patient, plus 80 additional days. Home Nursing Care: Up to 100 visits by nurses or technicians in each period of illness at no cost to patient.
