The net electron charge of soil particles is negative. As nitrogen carrying positive electron charge is applied, it will be held in place by the soil particles by chemical and physical forces. Conversely, when negatively charged nitrogen is placed in the soil, this attraction does not exist and the nitrogen is free to move with the soil moisture.

The ammoniacal form is readily converted to the nitrate form by soil organisms. The rate of change is influenced by temperature, moisture, pH, aeration and chemical and physical factors. The ammonium form of nitrogen is relatively resistant to leaching, since it does not move freely with soil moisture. This form must be absorbed by plant roots that are in contact with the nitrogen. Plant response often is slower from the ammonium form than from nitrate nitrogen.

Urea and ammoniacal forms work well where the immediate demand is not urgent and response is desired over a longer period. Nitrate nitrogen gives immediate response and gradually tapers off as plants deplete the supply. Fit the nitrogen source to individual moisture conditions in soil type and crop needs.
