A large portion of \$93,000 in 'baby" bonds due World War veterans of Foard County arrived at Crowell on the 12:22 a. m. train Monday and delivery of the bonus money began immediately afterwards at the post office.

The 1936 wheat harvest in Foard County has drawn to a close with an approximate yield of 365,000 bushels being handled through the six elevators in the county. The total surpasses by more than 25,000 bushels the most liberal estimates made by the grain dealers before harvest

Fifty-nine persons in Foard County have been approved by the Works Progress Administration for employment, according to Bryan O'Connell, WPA representative. This certification does not promise work to those on the list, but provides a means of determining whether or not they desire employment, he said.

An intense heat wave took the mercury up as far as 107 degrees in the shade during the first part of the week.



Be a Defensive **Driver on Vacation** and Year Around

Be a defensive driver whether you are on a vacation trip or just performing routine daily driving tasks, suggests Mrs. Elsie Short, home management specialist at Texas A&M University.

Traffic fatality reports show that driver error contributes to four out of five fatal accidents. "This fact should make each of us aware of our responsibility as an operator of an automobile,' Mrs. Short adds.

Seat belts have saved lives and reduced injuries when accidents occur, but they don't in themselves prevent accidents, she emphasizes. "Watch out for the other driv-

er" means to be a defensive driver. You must assume responsibilities for errors that might be made by another motorist and take positive action to prevent them, says the specialist.

You can assume the responsibility of helping other drivers to become aware of the importance of being a defensive driver, too. Help others to recognize the need for raising the level of their driving skills high enough to survive in a complex transportation system, Mrs. Short says.






