



\$60,000. June sales for the county were \$1,019.00.

Texas sales were \$77,198,802 for the first six months of the year, and 52 per cent of the sales goal has been achieved. This represents a 3 per cent increase over the same period of last year.

Nationally, Series E sales of \$364 million are again at a peacetime peak of any June in 21 years, and 10 per cent above a year ago. E sales for the first six months of 1966 were \$2,282 million, 7 per cent more than a year ago. H Bond sales were \$33 million during June which is a 6 per cent

increase over June sales last year, and 6 per cent over H sales a year ago, bringing the January-June sales up to \$229 million.

Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.


## Jesse Tate and Mother Moved to Brady **Monday Morning**


Jesse Tate and his mother, Mrs. J. B. Tate, moved to Brady from Crowell Monday to make their new home.


Mr. Tate was head of the local work unit of the Soil Conservation Service for the past five years and will have a similar position in Brady.
