

For his part, the grower should not harvest cotton containing more than 10 per cent seed cotton moisture or 8 per cent line moisture. Cotton containing excessive moisture or green leaf should be delivered immediately to the gin and the ginner notified of its con-

The ginner should check the moisture content of each trailer oad and group those which require about the same amount of drying and cleaning. This will allow him to select gin machinery and drying temperatures so that he can properly process cotton at different moisture levels, the National Cotton Council points

Lint moisture content should be kept between 612-8 per cent at the gin stand and only enough cleaning machinery used to obtain maximum bale value, not just the highest grade. Total bale value is the product of price times weight. Price is based on grade, staple, fineness, and area reputation or strength and length uniformity. Height includes moisture

Texas is one of 27 states that has "guest laws" concerning auto

These laws limit a driver's liability toward guest passengers in his car. In effect, the guests can claim damages only if their host has been guilty of extra-ordinary carelessness, says Mrs. Wanda Meyer, home management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Ser-

The guest passenger, in order to claim damages, must prove willful or wanton misconduct or intoxication. Some courts have rejected injury claims from passesgers who rode with drivers they knew had been drinking. Fare-paying passengers are not

covered by the guest laws, but often the courts have to draw the distinction between a commercial rider and a guest.

Most states that have enacted guest laws did so to discourage riendly" lawsuits cooked up by money from insurance companies. The companies, naturally, strongfor Top Bale Value support the laws. 



# THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Sept. 24, 1936, issue of The Foard County News:

Rains falling in Foard County since Tuesday of last week have reached a total of 8.82 inches to put a definite end to a severalmonths' drought and brightens the prospects for bumper crops next summer. The rain fell slowly and steadily for over a week.

An election on a bond issue by the Crowell Independent School District held Saturday carried by a majority of 154 votes to 22. The bond issue is to be for \$12,000 and the money will be used in the construction and equipping of a new grammar school build-

Plans are underway to obtain the approval of an immediate project to start laying the foundation of the new grammar school building to be constructed in Crowell. Work was begun last week by approximately 35 government laborers in razing the old grammar school building.

United States Army Engineers are planning a public hearing in Vernon next month in connection with surveys and examinations authorized by the Flood Control Act passed by Congress last June regarding flood control measures on Pease River.

WPA laborers will resume work on building bridges and culverts on the highway from Crowell to the Knox County line as soon as weather conditions permit, with a crew of about 35 employed on the project.

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
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
