The hearing has been scheduled for November 7, 1966, at 9:30 a. m. in the Sam Houston State Office Building, Austin, for cattle producers to appear and state their views in favor of or in opposition to acceptance of the petition. If sufficient opposition is not presented, testing may start after January 8 1967.

If you paid a household worker \$50 or more during July, August and September, a social security tax report is due before the end of October, social security district manager, Edwin Draughon, reminded area residents this week. housekeepers,

Maids, cooks, handymen, regular babysitters and other household employees are by law covered under social security. Persons who employ such a worker and pay him over \$50 in a three-month quarter must file a tax report and pay social security taxes for him.

The employer is responsible for paying to the Internal Revenue Service both the 4.2 per cent deducted from all earnings of the worker and the matching 4.2 per cent paid by the employer. Tax reports for the last quarter must be sent in before October 31. Mr. Draughon stressed the im-

portance to the worker of filing the returns. The reports give the worker credit under social security which he must have to receive social security retirement benefits in old age or disability payments if he is disabled and unable to work. Now with the new medicare program, filing is even more important.

Beginning in 1968, workers must have some coverage under social security to be eligible for hospital and medical insurance protection when they reach 65. The tax is due on all cash payment including carfares and other expenses made to any employee who makes over \$50 in a quarter. Mr. Draughon said that a simple envelope form 942 is available at social security or Internal Revenue Service offices for reporting the earnings and reminded residents that they could be penalized



#### CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTING SERVICE CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF CONTINUOUS REPORTS

Cary D. Palmer, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin, reads a proclamation from Governor John Connally, designating 1966 as Crop Reporting Centennial Year in Texas. Accurate and timely statistics of agriculture help Texas farmers and agri-businessmen make intelligent production and marketing decisions.

Over a century ago, farmers began to realize that they were at a disadvantage when bargaining because they knew little about crop and livestock supplies outside their area. They asked the government for help and a system of crop reporting was begun to fill this need. This year marks the 100th anniversary of continuous reporting of acreage, yield and production for the United States.

Cary Palmer says that the crop reporting system of collecting agricultural statistics relies heavily on some 40,000 farmers and agri-businessmen. Their voluntary reports month after month and year after year have an important role in providing Texas agricultural statistics and make the American farmer the best informed of any in the world.

One hundred years of voluntary reports is an achievement from which all America has benefitted.

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





#### **Horse Sale Adds** \$4,234 to West Texas **Rehabilitation Center**

Another \$4,234 has been added to the operational funds of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, thanks to the annual horse sale phase of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children. The amount is more than double what the 1965 horse sale rais-

A total of 53 horses and one goat went to the auction block last week at the Abilene Livestock Auction Co. Top selling horse of the sale was "Bill Hemphill." a quarter horse donated by W. F. Martin of Hamlin. Guy Caldwell of Abilene paid \$375 for the animal. "David's Scotter," a grandson of "Scooter S" and donated by David K. Danciger of Midlothian, was bought by Joe A. Mize, also of Midlothian, for \$235.

The three phases of the Round-Up-cattle, sheep and goat, and horse sales-have raised \$85,740 for the Center, and still another phase is planned.

On Nov. 19, a "country-store-type" sale will be held in Old Abilene Town. Featured will be quilts, farm implements, "and a little bit of everything," said Shelley Y. Smith, WTRC executive director.

The Round-Up provides about one-third of the operational funds for the non-profit Center, which provides free treatment to 1,618 patients. Most of the operating expenses come from United Funds and memorial contributions.




