Some Mail to Be Airlifted to Viet Nam

Postmaster Ted Reeder of Crowell this week announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725—the Dulski Military Mail Act—which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Reeder explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be marked clearly upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco concentration center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster Reeder also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

The deadline for Christmas

packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface means is now.

R. P. Webb of Vernon New Draft Board Chairman

R. P. Webb, veteran member and officer of the three-county Selective Service Board No. 131 in Vernon, last week was named board chairman, Selective Service Clerk LaVerne Wilkerson reports. Mr. Webb, who served as board co-chairman with the late Dick Gregory five years prior to his recent death, was elected by the five-member board covering Wilbarger, Foard and Hardeman Counties, at its regular monthly meeting at the Selective Service office in the Wilbarger Hotel building.

Mr. Webb, an estate manager and independent oil operator, is a Vernon resident of 35 years. He is also a member of the Wilbarger Hospital District Board. He resides at 3805 Buffalo in Vernon.

Comprising Board No. 131 are Mr. Webb, Jack Johnson, Alton B. Bell of Crowell, Claude Underwood of Chillicothe and Walter Barbee of Quanah.

Mr. Johnson filled the vacancy left by the death of Mr. Gregory.

S. B. D. C. Gets Notification of Funds for Year

The Aspermont Small Business Development Center has received notification of funding for another year. On October 31, the Aspermont SBDC had completed its first year of operation. During its first year of operation, the center interviewed 489 small businessmen and prospective businessmen, and other interested individuals. A total of 108 applications were processed of which 39 were approved by the SBA, totaling \$361,900.00, and 32 applications were declined by the SBDC, and 16 applications were declined by the SBA.

The Aspermont SBDC, as the representative of the local community, plays a vital role in the economic opportunity loan program. The Aspermont SBDC has the responsibility of screening applicants, recommending loans, and the counseling and training of applicants and those who receive loans. While the SBA office, Lubbock, makes the final decision on loans, its decision is largely based on the recommendation and justification submitted by the SBDC.

In the past year, the Aspermont SBDC has sought to carry out these responsibilities, by making known the program to the people it is intended to help in the communities.

The SBDC has interviewed 22 businessmen and prospective businessmen from Foard County. The

center has processed five loans, of which one is now pending in the SBA office, Lubbock, and four loans have received approval, totaling \$45,000.00.

A representative from the Aspermont SBDC spends two days per month (first and third Monday) in Crowell at the community center to interview and to discuss with any individual who is interested in expanding his present business, going into a new business, or talk of any problems concerning his business.

The Foard County representatives are Glen Goodwin, board member; and Jack Turner and Henry Black, screening committee members.

Prospects Sharp for Duck Hunters

The bountiful Texas wildlife harvest will attain maximum proportions Friday, November 18, when the duck season opens half an hour before sunrise.

It will be the second phase of the waterfowl shoot since wild geese became legal game Oct. 25. Reports to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department indicate the proportional duck numbers will be in keeping with the abundant wildlife population.

Field men for the Department noted a definite increase in most duck species pursuant to generally liberalized regulations.

The daily duck limit is four and the possession limit eight.

The tight restrictions on both mallards and pintails have been eased, particularly on the latter. Now the entire limits may be of the popular pintails, as well as of redheads given a relaxed status last fall.

Two mallards are allowed for a daily bag and four are permitted for the possession limit.

For the first day of the open season, a hunter will be allowed only one day's bag limit. One fully feathered wing must be retained on all harvested migratory game birds in the field or while in transit to the hunter's home

or to a public storage place. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The season ends January 7. Department field observers report the earlier shooting period has helped goose hunters. They also note that there is a normal goose population, particularly along the coast where countless thousands concentrate in the rice fields during the winter. The usual regulations prevail about hunting from a boat in open water, plugging guns to a three-shell limit and using no guns larger than a ten gauge.

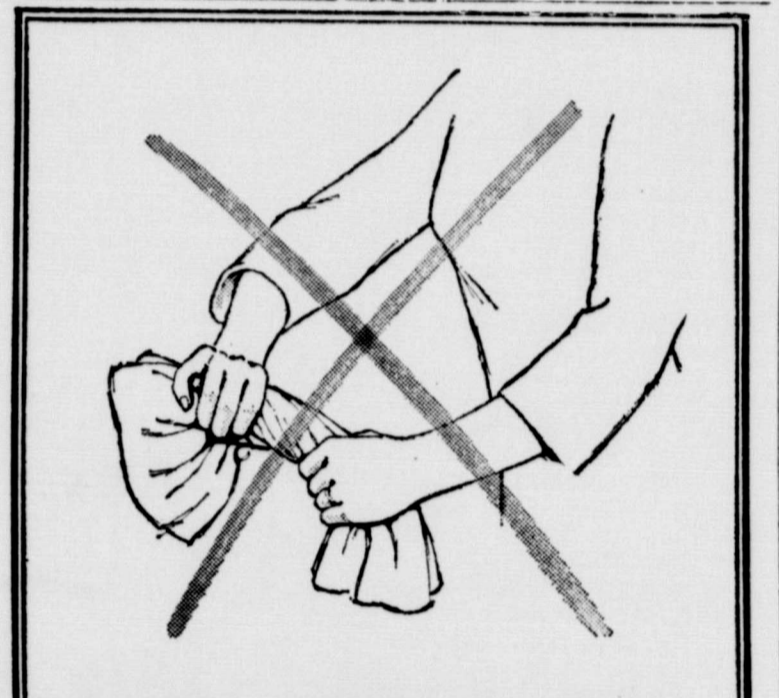
