THIRTY YEARS AGO

Bricklaying started on the new grammar school building last Wednesday, but work was delayed until Tuesday due to cold weather. This work is being done by Earl Davenport. In addition to the bricklaying, the concrete piers for the floor supports are being poured. There will be 256 of these piers in the floor space of the building.

At the regular meeting of the City Council Wednesday night, A. T. Schooley was appointed City Marshal for the City of Crowell. Mr. Schooley will do this work in connection with his job as night watchman.

The erection of a granite marker and bronze plaque on State Highway 28, six miles east of Crowell, the closest point on the highway to the battle ground where Cynthia Ann Parker was recaptured from the Comanche Indians by Texas Rangers headed by Capt. Sul Ross Dec. 18, 1860, will be completed this week when the concrete enclosure is filled with gravel.

The J. N. Johnson Filling Station, two blocks south of the square, that had been closed for the past three months, was opened this week and will be operated by Floyd Ferguson. The station will be stocked with Phillips 66 Products. Mr. Ferguson also operates the T. F. Hill station in the southwest part of town, about four blocks west of the Johnson station.

Million Mothers Fight Birth Defects In Traditional March of Dimes Drive

Famed actresses Jane Wyatt, Angela Lansbury and Gigi Perreau share a secret—they have learned there can be a great deal more to life than the glamour and glitter of stage and screen stardom.



Behind the scenes these stars are among the more than one million American women who have become March of Dimes volunteers so that countless millions of infants, yet unborn, may have the chance to lead normal and useful lives.

For the fourth consecutive year, Miss Wyatt is national chairman of the March of Dimes Mothers' March on birth defects. Miss Lansbury is chairman in New York City, and Miss Perreau is chairman in Los Angeles, Calif.

As the world of stars helps the 1967 March of Dimes, so does the world of space. The Mothers' March chairman in Houston, Tex., is Mrs. L. Gordon Cooper Jr., wife of the famous astronaut, while the mother of astronaut Wally Schirra, Mrs. Walter Schirra Sr., heads the Mothers' March in San Diego, Calif.

These well-known women and the many other equally dedicated Mothers' March volunteers across the nation seek their neighbors' support and contributions for the 1967 March of Dimes because the need is so vital and immediate.

Each year more than 250,000 American babies are born with birth defects, many of which can disfigure, disable or kill. That's about 700 infants born each day with a physical or mental defect. Birth defects each year destroy an estimated 500,000 infants before they are born.

"On their Mothers' March from door to door, volunteers will have two main goals," Miss Wyatt explains.

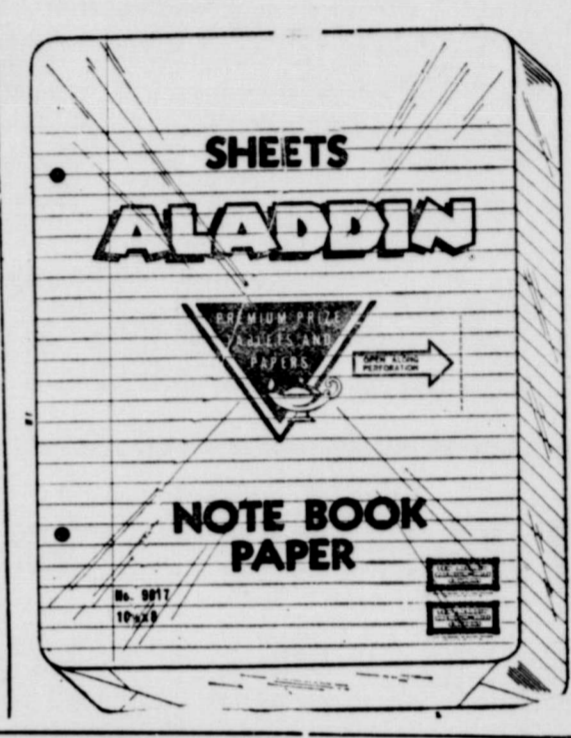

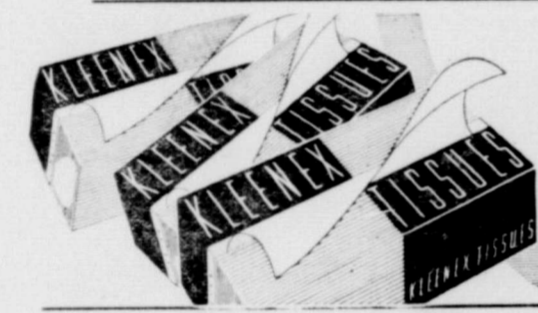

Rep. Heatly Has Longevity Record of Service in House

The Texas Legislature is made up of 31 Senators and 150 Representatives. Most of them come from heavily populated sections. Notwithstanding that fact, however, one representative from a West Texas county which has fewer than 5,000 inhabitants has a longevity record of service on key committees unequalled in the state's history. This was revealed with announcement of House committees by Speaker Ben Barnes to complete organization of the House of Representatives.

The legislator with this unusual record is W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah, now serving his seventh term as Representative of the 82nd district, composed of Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Motley and Wilbarger Counties.

He was elected for the first time in 1954. As a freshman legislator he was appointed to the Appropriations Committee. Assignments to key House committees normally go to veteran members, but Mr. Heatly made it his first term and has remained on the Appropriations Committee continuously since, except for one term.

In 1956 he was named a member of the budget board, which studies state finances between sessions, holds hearings and makes recommendations to the governor on financial matters. The lieutenant governor is chairman with membership divided equally between House and Senate.

In 1957 he was appointed chairman of the State Affairs Committee, probably the most important policy-making group in the House, and remained a member

of the Budget Board. Two years later he received the coveted assignment to the chairmanship of the Appropriations Committee and has held this position under three succeeding Speakers.

Mr. Heatly has just been named by Speaker Barnes to an unprecedented fourth term as head mittee. This record is unique in the history of the state. Only one other Representative served three terms in this position.

In 1959 the Legislature created a six-member Legislative Audit Committee with authority to check on expenditures of all state agencies to determine whether intent of the Legislature is being observed in day-to-day operations. The committee is composed of the Lieutenant Governor, Speaker, two Senators and two Representatives. Except for the 1961-63 biennium, Mr. Heatly has been a member of this committee since its creation.

The explanation of why this unusual record has been achieved by a member of the House from a sparsely settled section of the state is an interesting commentary on generally unrecognized facts of the political setup in Texas.

Goats Help Head Count of Aoudads

Three mischievous goats, playing hooky in rugged Palo Duro Canyon, took up with wild aoudad sheep and have contributed considerably toward herd head counts.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists had been hard pressed to spot the wary aoudads. But the goats, escaping from a ranch near Claude, have very definite markings and can be spotted from the air. Also their coat color does not blend into the canyon wall like that of the aoudad.

One goat is a black and white colored female with a very marked arrangement of the colors. Another, a male, has a black and brown brindled coloring. The third, a male, is reddish roan color.

Two of the goats were spotted with seven sheep during a 1965 spring census. During last summer's helicopter check, the same two goats were observed along with 13 aoudad.

Less than a month later, the same pair of goats was noted with five sheep about one-fourth mile west of the earlier sighting and in the same general area as the 1965 detection.

Oranges Take Plentiful Food Spotlight for January

Oranges spotlight the foods in big supply during January.

That's the report from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Winter pears, grapefruit, broilers, dry beans and green split peas also are reported especially plentiful by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The 1966-67 orange crop, excluding California Valencias, was estimated on November 1 at 162.3 million boxes, up nearly one-third from last year and about 85 per cent over the 1960-64 average.

Florida and Texas show the largest increase.

Winter pear production is also set at well above average, with D'Anjou making up 80 per cent of the supply.

Grapefruit stocks are up about 10 per cent over last season and 31 per cent above the recent 5-year average. Florida, California and Texas show across-the-board increases.

Broiler production is expected to continue well above average throughout the winter. Marketings based on head slaughtered under federal inspection during October and early November ran 11 per cent above the same 1965 period, according to USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Dry bean production is at a record high, or nearly one-third above last year. A large carryover and a larger 1966 crop has pushed prices on green split peas to the lowest level in over 6 months.

Two Accidents Reported in County During December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of December, according to Sgt. Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$330.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year 1966, shows a total of 38 crashes resulting in one person killed, 22 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$31,185.00.

"When the final reports are tabulated, we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1966 than in any prior year in the history of this state," the sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about 15 per cent more than the 3,028 traffic deaths in 1965. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents during 1967.

The veteran patrol supervisor cautions all motorists to beware of ice spots at bridges, underpasses and in shadows. Reduce speed before you reach these slippery areas.

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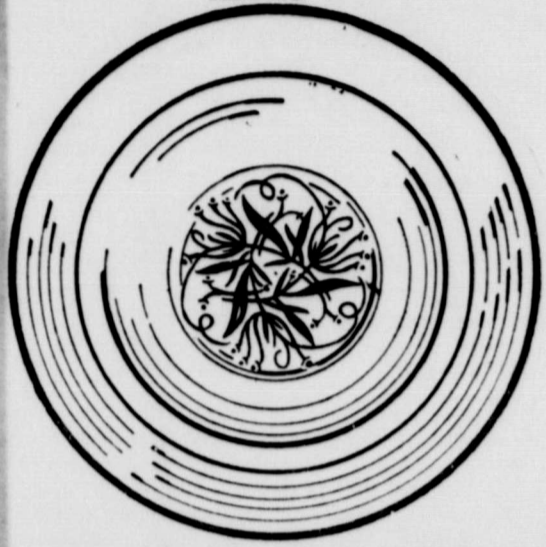
