

Born in Saint Albans, West Virginia, on Dec. 26, 1882, the former Maude Reynolds married James Benjamin Rasberry in Portales, N. M., on Aug. 26, 1906 They settled in the Vivian community on land which they cleared of rocks and grubbed of mesquites. Their closest neighbor was two and one-half miles away.

Mr. Rasberry, a farmer and rancher, died in 1923, leaving her of Crowell Schools with six children to rear and the land to manage. She lived on the farm until she moved to Crowell in 1948. In 1956 she donated to the Texas Highway Department a plot of ground ten miles west of Crowell on Highway 70 on which a state roadside park was built.



of Agriculture. The 1966-67 orange crop, excluding California Valencias, was estimated on November 1 at 162.3 million boxes, up nearly one-third from last year and about 85 per

Florida and Texas show the largest increase. Winter pear production is also set at well above average, with
