It is the largest of all Christian Churches in that city of 40,000. He is a recording artist for Word Records and Christian Faith Recordings Inc. His first release, "Cameron Comes Calling" has gained wide acceptance across the county and is being featured on religious disc jockey programs on TV and radio.

He is much in demand as a speaker and was a featured speaker at the Kiamichi Clinic last May in Oklahoma-before 5,000 men-one of the largest gatherings of its kind.


