Former Rayland Farmer Died in Vernon March 15

L. G. Whitten, 79-year-old retired farmer of the Rayland community, died at his home in Vernon on Wednesday of last week.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Thursday at the Paradise Church of Christ in Vernon with Tom Tarbet, minister, officiating. Burial was in Williamson Memorial Park under direction of Sullivan Funeral Home.

Mr. Whitten was born in Bell county December 8, 1887. He moved to Wilbarger County in 1907, then to Rayland in 1910, where he farmed until 1963. He was married to Mrs. Ruth Simed in 1910, at Tolton, Texas.

Surviving are his wife; four sons, Lloyd Whitten of Pampa, Texas, and Box Whitten of Lubbock, Texas; and Rex Whitten of Dallas, Texas; three daughters, Mrs. Arlie Cato of Fort Worth, Mrs. B. H. Butler of Dallas, and Mrs. Elizabeth Earthman of Vernon; two brothers, J. C. Whitten of Bessemer, Ala., and E. W. Whitten of Vernon; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Newman of Irving and Mrs. Joe Colson of Oklahoma City.

Mr. Whitten, preceded in death by his wife, Mrs. Ruth Simed, in 1958.

New License Plates Must Be on Vehicles by Apr. 1

At least two deadlines for owners of motor vehicles operating on public roads are fast approaching.

The first is for purchasing 1967 vehicle registration plates. According to Sheriff W. F. Bradford, new 1967 license plates must be on vehicles by Saturday, April 1. Operation of vehicles on April 1 or later not displaying the 1967 tags will be in violation of state law.

Another deadline nearing is that of obtaining a 1967 vehicle inspection sticker. The inspection period in Texas began last fall, and the deadline is April 15. Vehicles operating after that date will be in violation of the law if they do not display the new inspection sticker.

Local Members Attend Farmers Union Convention

Warren Haynie, W. F. Statser, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Matthews, Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Karcher and Kenneth Halbert represented Foard County at the 65th annual convention of the National Farmers Union in Oklahoma City from March 12 to 15.

Some of those who addressed the convention were Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, U. S. Senator Robert F. Kennedy of New York, George McGovern of South Dakota, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, Administrator of Farmers Home Administration Howard Bertsch of Washington, D. C. and the annual report by National Farmers Union President Tony T. Dechant.

The theme of the convention was "Who will control American agriculture, corporations or independent farmers?" With the price of farm products bringing only 74 per cent of parity, strong emphasis was advocated to raise the prices to 100 per cent of parity. It was stated that no other segment of the American economy operates on less.

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Easter Seal Society Campaign Closes on Easter Sunday

A last-minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was issued Thursday by Robert Kincaid, who is the Easter Seal representative in this county.

The Easter Seal Society is providing treatment and services for 16,031 physically handicapped children and adults in Texas, Mr. Kincaid said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productivity of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are going without services and see that they receive the services they need. As Easter Seal representative, Mr. Kincaid is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 23 treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services, he added.

Mr. Kincaid asked that anyone in need of services contact him at the Crowell State Bank. He added that the Easter Seal appeal will close Sunday, March 26, and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Foard County.

COUNTY RECEIVES SHOWERS SUNDAY

It can rain! It did rain! The largest amount of rain recorded here at one time since October 20, 1966, fell in Foard County Sunday. Although Merl Kincaid reported that official government gauge recorded only .33 of an inch in Crowell, over one-half inch was reported in parts of the county.

A light mist fell most all of Sunday. Early Sunday night, clouds built up in the west and northwest, and the main shower came amidst heavy thunder and lightning.

With prospects for a wheat crop fading fast, the small amount of moisture revived hopes of area farmers that the drought-stricken crop can recover enough to make some wheat this year.

After heavy rains last fall, the prospects for a wheat crop and plenty of grazing never looked better. However, the sudden cessation of the rain resulted in the young wheat never getting sufficient moisture to pack the earth around its roots to permit grazing.

Most Foard farmers missed that portion of their annual income usually received from grazing cattle, and with the continued drought, things were looking dim for even a token wheat crop.

However, with the shower Sunday, and hopes of more rain, Foard County farmers were more optimistic.

From the News . . .

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, March 25, 1937, issue of The Foard County News:

A graphic story of the New London school disaster was told in a letter to T. L. Hughston of Crowell by Mrs. Fay Beidleman, former Crowell resident and an eye witness to the explosion that destroyed the school building and killed 455 students and teachers. Mrs. Beidleman is president of the New London PTA and had attended a PTA meeting. She was leaving the gymnasium where the meeting was held as the explosion occurred. Her daughter, Juana Fay, was in the building that was wrecked, but escaped serious injury.

The Scout Court of Honor for the Vernon district will be held at Thalia Friday night and the largest gathering of Scouts and Scout leaders in the district in several months is expected to attend.

There are only six more days in this month that Foard County car owners can buy license plates without a penalty.

The taking of the 1937 scholastic census for the Crowell Independent School District is practically completed, and must be completed by Wednesday, March 31, according to L. A. Andrews, census trustee.

Construction work is now underway on four new residences to be erected by the Texas Company in the Texaco oil field in the southwest part of Foard County. The houses will be 14x36 feet and will contain all modern conveniences: natural gas, electric lights, running water, etc.

Dick Todd, former Crowell High School athletic star, won the 100 yard dash and broad jump in the university class at the fifteenth annual Southwestern Exposition Track and Field Meet held in Fort Worth, Saturday, March 20.

A total of 23 persons are now enrolled in the night school which is being held in the reception room of the relief office in the Ringgold Building.

Tips Given on Control of Tree, Shrub Pests

Many pests of ornamental trees and shrubs will soon be active. Prevention is the best method for holding plant damage to a minimum. This is particularly true in controlling shade tree borers, says County Agent Joe Burkett.

To prevent newly-hatched borers from becoming established in a tree, it is necessary to apply an insecticide to the trunks and lower branches prior to egg hatch. The first application should be made in early spring soon after the leaves appear. An effective spray treatment is a mixture of DDT-malathion.

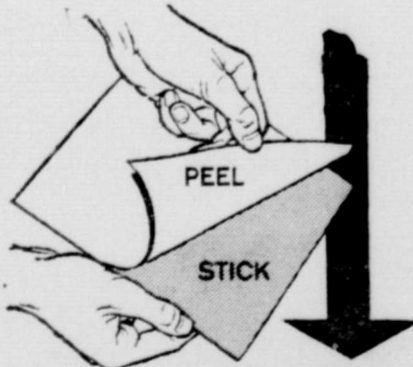

Redfish's Tour Sets Coast Travel Mark

A young redfish was caught, tagged and released in Texas waters March 16, 1966. Just 264 days later, it was on a fisherman's stringer in Florida.

Ray Childress, coastal fisheries biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, tagged the fish in San Antonio Bay last March. At that time, the fish was 16 inches long and weighed 1.7 pounds.

On December 19, 1966, Wallace Lindeman of Tampa, Florida, caught the fish at John's Pass, the northernmost inlet off St. Petersburg. He estimated weight at 3 to 4 pounds.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department got tag certification from the Florida Board of Conservation. Now biologists believe it to be a new record for long-distance tag returns from redfish. The record time for a fish to

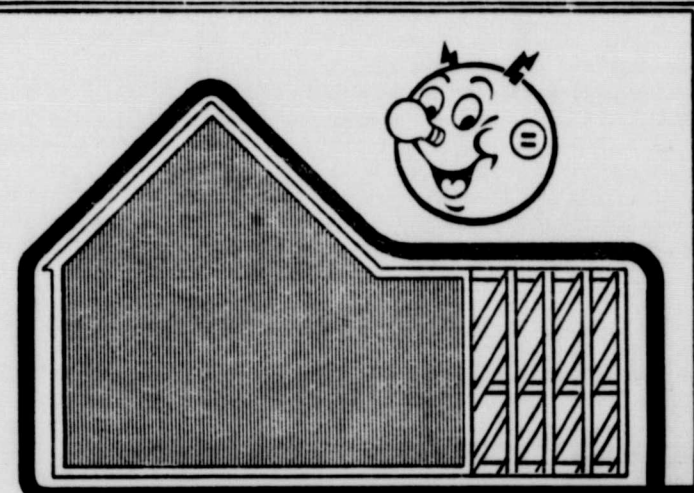

Must more sons die because of alcohol?

Alcohol killed my son. He was just 18, not old enough to buy beer or whiskey, but it was made available to him, and as a result, he is dead.

My son, Wayne Legg, was out with two other boys on the night of December 5, 1966. At about 10 o'clock that night the fog was so thick, I had to roll down the window of my car to see where I was going. On my way home, on that foggy night, little did I know that my only son was driving toward his death.

His senses dulled by beer and whiskey, he was driving too fast on Naaman School Road north of Garland. By the time he saw the curve it was too late.

"Wayne, watch out, you'll kill all of us," one of the boys shouted. The other two were thrown clear. Wayne was killed instantly, when the car hit a dirt embankment.

My son is dead. It's too late to help him now. But what about other boys and girls? We can do something for them. If they drink, their reflexes are slowed. They take chances that they wouldn't ordinarily take. They kill themselves, and sometimes innocent bystanders as well.

When alcohol is available to them the danger increases. The more alcohol that is available to them, the more of them that are killed, hurt, or crippled for life. The number of deaths of these young people, like my son, increases and decreases with the availability of alcohol.

Regardless of whatever else may be said about it, this is true: If my son had not been drinking, he would not have been killed. If alcohol had not been made available to him, he would not have been killed.

The least we can do is NOT MAKE ALCOHOL MORE AVAILABLE.

Liquor interests and businesses that would stand to make a profit from legal sale of liquor by the drink, are trying to get a saloon bill passed in Texas.

Please, for the sake of our children, oppose the saloon bill. Write your State Representative and State Senator. Ask them to please, oppose the saloon bill.

Some Teachers Are Due SS Benefits

Some school teachers will receive extra money during the summer months, according to Edwin S. Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office.

Teachers who work nine months of the year may receive retirement, wife's or widow's benefits during the vacation months if they are otherwise eligible for social security benefits.

Teachers-beneficiaries under 72 usually earn too much to receive their social security checks all year long. However, under the amended retirement test, beneficiaries are paid for months in which they do not earn more than \$125 in wages, or work in a business of their own. "This is true regardless of the total earnings in the year," Mr. Draughon explained.

An important thing to keep in mind is that social security benefits are not paid automatically. An application must be filed with the social security office.

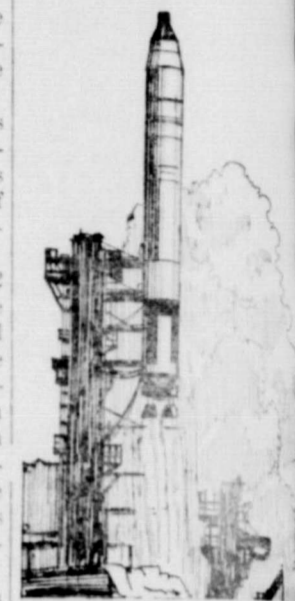

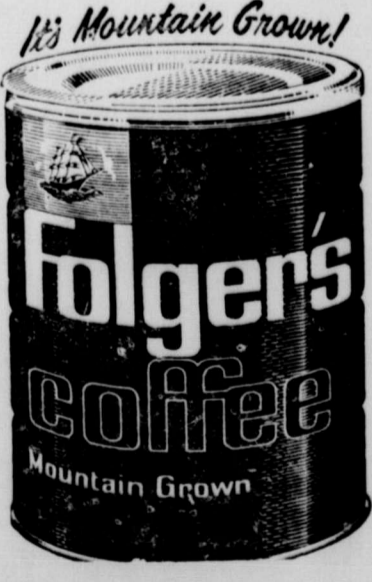
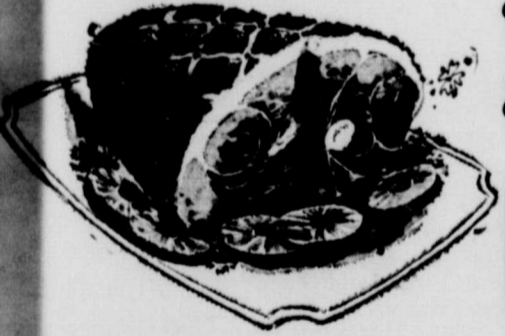

Most Veteran Benefits Are Tax-Free, Says V. A. Manager

Most veteran benefits are tax-free and need not be reported on income tax returns, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Waco, has reminded former servicemen and women.

However, interest earned on GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with the VA is not classed as a benefit but as earned income and must be reported on tax returns. Proceeds of GI policies and the dividends are non-taxable and need not be reported.

Other VA benefits not taxable include education and training allowances, subsistence allowances for disabled veterans in vocational rehabilitation training, compensation and pension payments, grants for "wheelchair" homes, automobiles and all benefits to families of deceased veterans.
