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## Two Local Men Are Honored by Weather Bureau

### Black and Kincaid Finish 35 Years as Weather Observers

Two Crowell men were honored Monday for long-time volunteer service with the U. S. Weather Bureau. Lee Black and Merl Kincaid were the two local men honored for 35 years continuous service as co-operative weather observers for the Weather Bureau. Mr. Black and Mr. Kincaid have furnished the Weather Bureau with accurate and complete rainfall records for Crowell during that long period of time. They also make telephone calls of significant rainfall to the Weather Bureau in Wichita Falls.

The government rain gauge for many years was located at the Crowell State Bank, but has been located at Mr. Kincaid's home for a number of years. H. T. Paukert of Fort Worth, field aide with the U. S. Weather Bureau was in Crowell Monday and presented the men with lapel buttons as a token of appreciation of the Bureau for their faithful service. The two began keeping rainfall records here on February 1, 1932.

Mr. Paukert has been a frequent visitor to Crowell in years past. He was in charge of the tornado project in this area for several years. This was a study by the Weather Bureau made during the tornado season when barometric pressure and temperatures were kept over this entire section of the country.

## Larry Taylor Places in Soil Conservation Essay Contest

Larry Taylor has been notified by the Fort Worth Press, sponsor of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Essay Contest, that he has been named a winner in the Northwest Texas area comprised of fifty-two counties. The subject of this year's essay was "Preserve Our Natural Resources."

Each year several thousand students from over the state enter the contest. A state winner and ten winners in each of the five conservation areas are selected. On May 19 at Pampa, an awards dinner will be held to honor conservation winners of this area. At this time, Larry will be presented a medal as seventh place winner. Larry, a junior in Crowell High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Taylor.

During the past 16 years, Crowell has had from one to five area winners each year. In 1957, a Crowell student, the former Miss Elizabeth Davis, now Mrs. J. L. Francis of Chicago, Ill., was named state winner. Last year, Mrs. Vera Manard, local teacher, was named the Conservation Teacher of the State of Texas.

## Mrs. N. J. Roberts Presents Gift to Tech's West Texas Museum

Mrs. N. J. Roberts of Crowell had Mrs. Dale E. Grimes and Mrs. Paul C. Mills of Lubbock as her guests last Friday.

Mrs. Mills, who is an official curator of the West Texas Museum in Lubbock, appraised Mrs. Roberts' historical scrapbooks on Quanah Parker, Foard County, and music as valuable research and reference materials similar to those found in the South West Collection of papers, letters and clippings in the Museum archives.

Mrs. Roberts made a gift to the museum of a black broadcloth dress suit that was worn by the late Mr. Roberts at their wedding on April 23, 1906.

Mrs. Mills did extensive research recently for an exhibit she arranged of "One Hundred Years of Weddings" shown at the museum for several months. These costumes were gifts from many West Texas families, and Mrs. Mills stated, "We receive many beautiful gowns, dresses and accessories for women, but very few men's suits—and rarely any in the perfect condition of this suit."

Mrs. Roberts gave Mrs. Mills several fashion magazine clippings of "the turn of the century" which will be valuable for reference and research in the fields of textile and clothing often used by the Home Economics Department of Texas Tech.

## RAINS LAST WEEK TOTAL 3.81 INCHES

Three rains last week in Foard County brought a total of 3.81 inches of moisture and far exceeded the 2.2 inches which is about the average April rainfall for the county.

As was noted in last week's issue, 1.18 was recorded here on Sunday of last week, 2.35 inches fell Tuesday night and .27 inch

was recorded during the early-morning hours of Thursday. The cloudy skies of several days cleared up Thursday morning and high winds during the day kicked up a heavy dust storm in the aftermath of the heavy, general rains over this section of Texas.

The moisture was transformed Foard County from a dry drought-stricken region to a land of green growth, almost it seems overnight. The wheat, though short, is heading out, and it has now had sufficient moisture to mature the grain. A fine planting season for row crops is in prospect, as well as the greening up of grasses and wild rye in pastures.

Lester Hickman reported that good rains fell in the Truscott area. He said the gauge at his home recorded 4.1 inches.

Clouds covered this area Tuesday and light showers fell intermittently all day.

## Cotton Production, Weed and Insect Control Meeting to Be Held in Crowell

There will be a county-wide cotton production, weed and insect control meeting Thursday, April 27, beginning at 7 p. m. The meeting will be held in the district court room in the court house in Crowell, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent.

A team of cotton specialists from the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University will be present to discuss all phases of cotton production including varieties, fertilization, insect control, mechanization, weed and grass control.

Cost-cutting and the newest practices on efficient production will be presented, along with results of Texas Agricultural experiment station projects and experiences of numerous grower-demonstrators using various practices to cut costs of production.

This is a very important meeting and Burkett urges all cotton producers to attend.

## EXCESS WHEAT MUST BE DISPOSED OF BY MAY 1

Mrs. Jean Reeder, manager of the Foard County ASCS office, said last week that excess wheat must be disposed of by May 1, 1967. She asked landowners to notify her office as soon as disposition has been completed. She said the rate of charge for disposition is \$4.00 per farm, plus \$2.00 for each plot in excess of one.

Mrs. Reeder said that adjustment credit will be given only for areas of regular shape with not more than four sides. One side or one end of the disposition area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundary when crops are destroyed in a square, rectangular, or trapezoidal pattern. The restrictions may be disregarded when the crop in an entire field or subdivision is destroyed.



**Education Service Centers Will Be Established Soon**

Education Service Centers—a new development in Texas education—will move a step closer to establishment this month with a series of organizational meetings in 20 regions across the state.

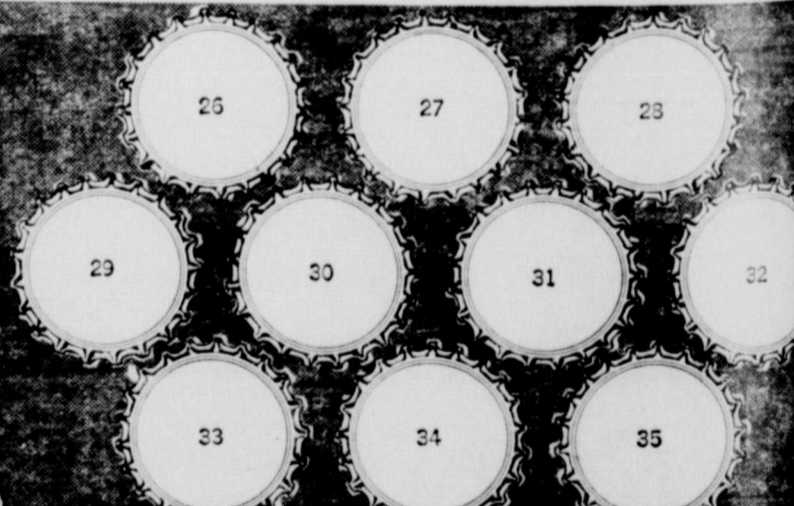
