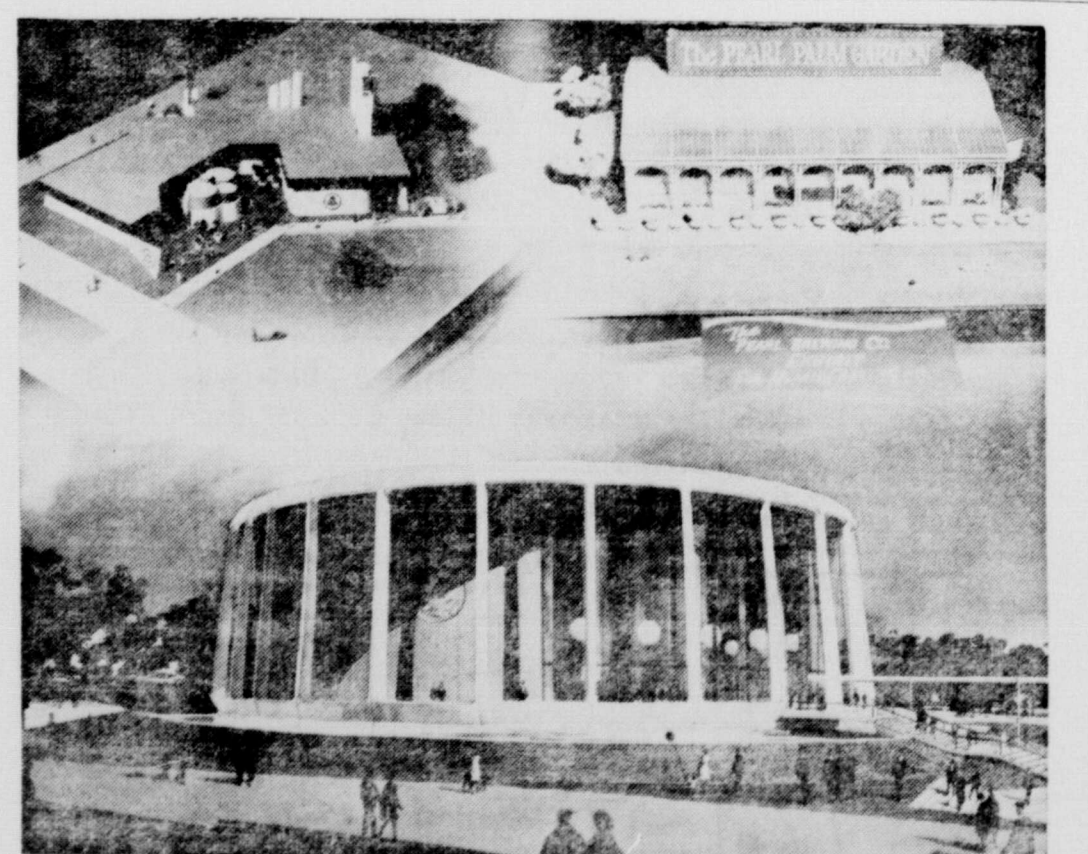

Mail Carriers to Distribute Survey Cards

Postmaster Ted Reeder reminds rural patrons of the Crowell post office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards.

Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Reeder explained. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are Fred Gray, Route 1, Mrs. Merle Holland, Route 2, and Henry Ross, Star Route.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, state agricultural statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Reeder concludes.

Use of Micronutrients Subject of Discussion Among Farmers

The use of micronutrients is a topic of much discussion among farmers and representatives of the fertilizer industry. There are six generally recognized plant nutrients in the micronutrient group, namely: iron, zinc, manganese, copper, boro and molybdenum. In addition to these, chlorine has been proved essential to plant growth, but deficiencies have not cropped up under field conditions.

Iron and zinc have been the two accounting for the most problems. According to Dr. Charles D. Welch, extension soil chemist at A&M, soil tests are available to determine whether or not a zinc deficiency exists. "So far, there are no suitable soil tests to determine if an iron deficiency exists," Welch said.

Iron deficiencies are most common on sorghum growing in alkaline soils. The deficiency readily makes itself known by causing a yellowing between the leaf veins. Sorghum is a better indicator crop than either soybeans or field peas or beans, two other crops that show iron deficiency symptoms.

Severe deficiencies will cause yield losses. The most common and effective method of applying iron where needed is by the use of foliar sprays.

Zinc may be applied broadcast or in bands. Applications of zinc sulfate should be 10 to 30 pounds per acre. Chelated zinc compounds also are effective.

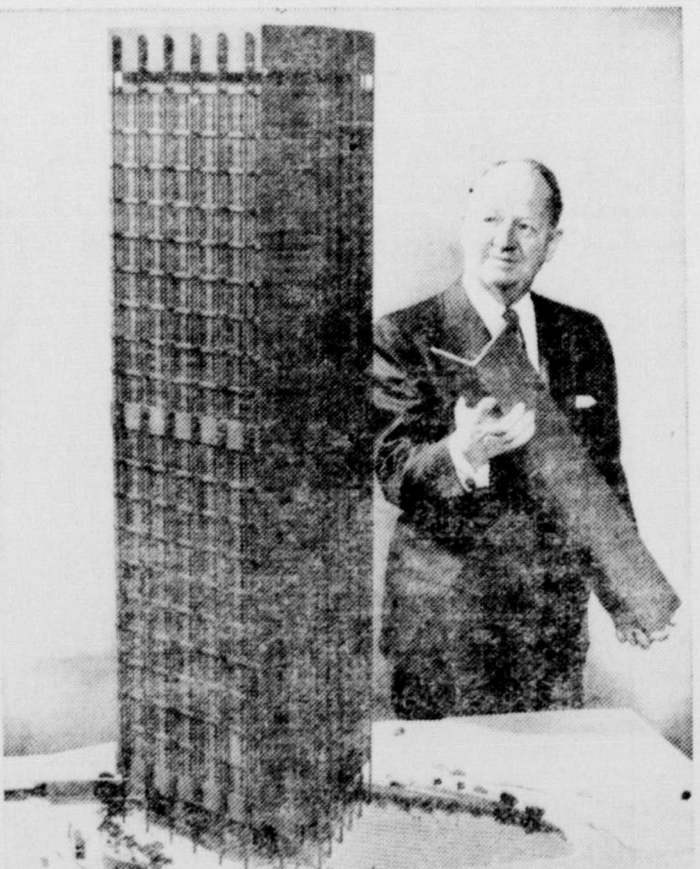

A 64-ACRE BUILDING ON A THREE-ACRE SITE is this model of the world's second largest high-rise office building, being studied by United States Steel's President, Leslie B. Worthington. To be the Corporation's Pittsburgh headquarters when completed in 1970, the 64-story, triangular-shaped structure will be the tallest skyscraper in the world outside New York and Chicago. Only New York's Pan-Am Building, among high-rise office structures, will contain a greater gross area than the new building, which provides almost an acre per floor.

Mr. Worthington is holding a sample of USS Con-Ten steel which will be used for the exposed columns and exterior walls of the building. The special steel which will be left bare and unpainted will weather to a deep russet, cinnamon-like color. Originally developed in the early 1930's for use in railroad freight cars, the steel is becoming a popular architectural material for exposed and unpainted applications.

The building, 841 feet high, will be a pioneer showpiece of new materials, new products, and new architectural and engineering concepts.

Social Security Checks Big Factor in Local Economy

Social security benefit payments received by residents of the five-county area serviced by the Vernon office in 1966 totaled \$5,406,528, an increase of \$440,472 over 1965, according to Edwin S. Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office.

Records show that 7,216 persons in the five-county area received monthly benefits last year of \$450,544. In 1965 a total of 6,586 persons were receiving payments of \$413,838 monthly.

"And there is no doubt that the money went into the local economy," Mr. Draughon said.

He explained that most of those receiving social security checks depend on them as their only source of income.

None of the five counties showed a decrease in 1966. All were up from 6.4 to 11.6 per cent.

Foard County showed an increase of 7 per cent in benefits and 4.5 per cent in the number of people receiving them. "Social security is not just for older people," Mr. Draughon pointed out in Foard County alone.

44 children are drawing \$1,944 benefits monthly, and two widowed mothers are receiving \$60 monthly.

Monthly benefits for persons over age 65 range from \$44 to \$141, Mr. Draughon said. Those who receive benefits before age 65 receive lower monthly benefits.

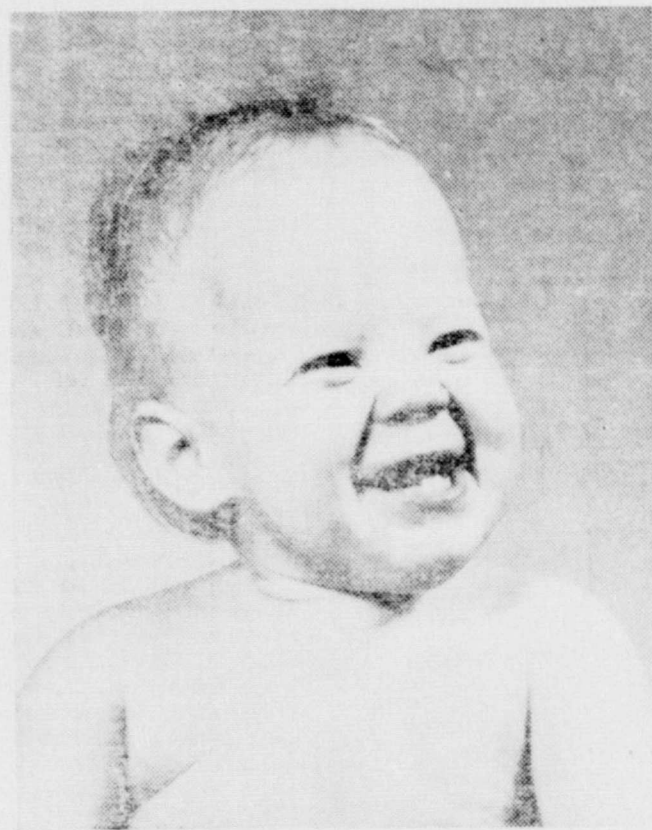
Monthly benefits to the family of the worker who dies leaving two or more children range from \$66 to \$368, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security.

Benefits to the mother and children continue until the youngest child reaches 18, or indefinitely, if the child has a disability that began before his 18th birthday which prevents him from being able to work. A child's benefits can be extended until he is 22 if he continues to be a full-time student.

Vocational Nurses School Approved by State Board

Provisional accreditation has been granted by the Board of Vocational Nurses Examiners to a four-county nursing program here in Crowell, Supt. Henry Black announced last week.

Mr. Black said that Marjorie Taber Ogle, executive secretary of the board, notified him by letter of the accreditation, which extends for one year beginning with the opening day of classes.

We had a good active market on 863 head last Friday. All classes held steady with previous week except feeder steers, which sold 50c to 75c higher. Cow and calf pairs were still under pressure and light weight stocker calves were draggy in spots. Fed cattle prices are looking brighter and with a little rain stockers will probably make gains.
