All 4-H Clubbers are reminded that the 4-H Record Books are due to the county extension office no later than Monday, July 31, if they plan to enter them in the 4-H Texas 4-H Awards program. Mr. Ilse and Mr. Burkett said that they would be glad to help any 4-H'er with his or her record book or in deciding which awards program to enter.

A 4-H Record Workshop will be held Tuesday, July 18, from 10 a. m. to 12 noon in the agent's office.

Following is a list of the awards programs which may be entered: movement, agricultural, automobile, beef, citizenship, clothing, community beautification, conservation of natural resources, dress making, electric, entomology, field crops, foods and nutrition, fire prevention, grain marketing, health, home economics, home economics scholarships, home improvement, home management, horticulture, leadership, National 4-H Club Conference, photography, poultry, range management, rodeo, Santa Fe, swine, tractor, wildlife conservation, and several other contests.

All 4-H'ers who were not 14 years old January 1, 1967, may enter the junior division of any of the above programs and their record books will be due at the same time as the senior records.

Bank Deposits Take Drop over One Year Ago

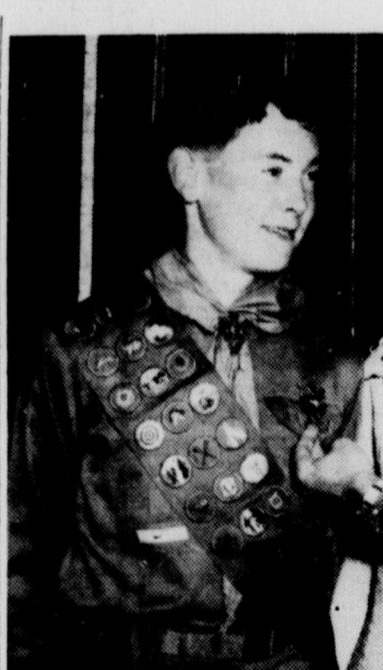
Deposits at the close of business on June 30 in the Crowell State Bank were \$2,943,702.75, according to a statement published in this week's issue.

This is a drop of \$196,351.37 from the same date one year ago when deposits were \$3,140,054.12.

However, the June '67 deposits are up by \$140,329.27 over two years ago at this time when they were \$2,803,373.48.

Three years ago, deposits totaled \$3,110,144.16 which is an increase of \$166,441.41 over the total this year.

Although the county made over a million bushels of wheat this year, the dry winter kept Foard County landowners from grazing cattle on their winter wheat, and this loss of income is reflected in the deposits.

Youth Saved from Death by Drowning at Crowell Pool

Young Boy Saved by Mouth-to-Mouth Resuscitation

A near tragedy occurred at the Crowell swimming pool last Saturday afternoon when a 9-year-old boy almost drowned.

The youngster was Stewart Lee Cauthan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewitt Cauthan of Jacksonville, Fla., who with his parents was visiting his grandmother, Mrs. Madge Johnson at the time of the accident.

According to reports, Stewart Lee slipped and fell into the deep end of the pool. He was discovered on the bottom and brought to the top by David Stapp. The pool lifeguard, Billy Hord, immediately began mouth-to-mouth respiration on the lifeless body, and he was revived by pool manager Gordon Erwin who continued with the respiration until the doctor and ambulance arrived. Mr. Erwin said Monday that breathing and heart action had stopped, but after a few minutes of the respiration, the boy's heart and breathing action started up again.

Quick action by David and Billy, and Mr. Erwin was credited with saving the youth's life.

Two Crowell Men Injured When Awning Collapses

Ray Ilse and Fred Glover, who were installing a sign on the front of the new West Texas Utilities Co. building on the west side of the square, were injured Wednesday afternoon, June 28, when the awning on which they were standing collapsed and fell to the sidewalk.

The two men were rushed to Wichita Falls where they received treatment. Ilse suffered a broken heel, on which surgery was performed, and Glover suffered a broken arm.

A third man, Johnny Thompson, who was also on the awning at the time it collapsed, fell to the sidewalk, but was not injured.

Mr. Glover was kept overnight in the Wichita Falls hospital and Mr. Ilse was returned to his home in Crowell Monday afternoon of this week.

Many Changes Made in Texas Driver License Law

Highway Patrolman Chester Fant of Quanah, information officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety, has called the attention of Foard County residents to the amendments to the Texas drivers license law enacted by the 60th Legislature. Since the provisions affect every driver in the state, Mr. Fant urges that the changes printed here be read and studied by all drivers.

Section 4. Who may not be licensed.

1. Raises age for licensing as an operator from 16 to 18 years, effective August 28.
2. Raises from 14 to 16 years the minimum age for licensing as an operator upon satisfactorily completing an approved course of driver education and training.
3. Before June 1, 1969, persons 16 years of age may qualify for an operator license upon presentation of a certificate from the local school superintendent that a driver education and training course is not taught at the school regularly attended by the applicant.
4. Upon completion of the classroom phase of an approved driver education course, persons 15 years of age may be issued an instruction permit which will authorize them to drive while accompanied by an adult licensed driver who is at least 21 years of age.
5. Raises from 14 to 15 years the minimum age at which a person may be licensed under the emergency and hardship provision of the statute.
6. Raises from 14 to 15 the minimum age at which persons may be licensed to operate a 5-brake horsepower motor scooter.
7. The minimum age for licensing as chauffeurs and commercial operators is raised from 16 to 18 years with a provision that persons who have satisfactorily completed an approved course of driver education training may be licensed as chauffeurs and commercial operators at the age of 17.
8. Persons who are addicted to the use of "other drugs that render a person incapable of driving" shall be denied a license.
9. No person who applies for or receives public assistance as a needy blind shall be licensed.
- Section 5. Special restrictions on drivers of school buses and public or common carrier motor vehicles.
 1. Reduces the minimum age from 21 to 19 years at which a person may be licensed as a chauffeur to operate an ambulance.
 2. After Jan. 1, 1968, applicants

for licenses to operate motorcycles must be issued special permits denoting such fact. Operator licenses held by riders of motorcycles on January 1, 1968, will be valid for such purpose until the license expires.

3. A special examination is required of the applicant for a motorcycle operator license to include "an off-street phase and an on-street mobile phase of a road test." The applicant for a motorcycle license must provide the motorcycle and a passenger vehicle and licensed driver to convey the license examiner during the road test.

Section 6. Application for license.

1. All original applications shall contain the additional information of place and date of birth with such information to be verified by presentation of a certified copy of applicant's birth certificate or other documentary evidence deemed satisfactory by the Department. Thumb prints are also required on all original applications.
2. The Department is also authorized to require any other necessary information to determine the applicant's identity, competency and eligibility for licensing.
- Section 10. Examination of applicants.
 1. Examinations shall be given in the type vehicle that the applicant will be licensed to operate.

Section 11. Licenses issued to operators, commercial operators and chauffeurs.

1. All licenses issued shall contain a color photograph of the licensee. The Department may issue a temporary license without such photograph under specified limited conditions.
2. All licenses issued to persons under the age of 21 years shall be clearly marked as a "provisional license."

Section 13. License to be carried and exhibited on demand.

1. Any person convicted on the charge of driving without a license will be subject to the following penalties:
 - a. First offense, a fine of not more than \$200.00.
 - b. A second offense within one year, a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200.
 - c. A third offense within one year after the second offense, a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than 72 hours nor more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
2. It shall be the duty of the judge of the court in which a driving without license conviction occurs to report such information to the Department together with a set of the fingerprints of the person convicted and it shall be the duty of the Department to keep a record on each such convicted person.
3. Any peace officer is specifically authorized to stop and detain any motor vehicle operator for the purpose of determining whether such person has a driver license.
- Section 14. The fee for a dupli-

cate license is raised from 25c to \$1.00 and any change of name or other pertinent information on a license will require issuance of a duplicate license.

Section 18. Expiration of licenses, examination on renewal.

1. All original licenses issued on and after January 1, 1968, shall expire as follows:
 - a. Operator license—on the next birthday of the licensee occurring four years after the date of application.
 - b. Commercial operator and chauffeur license—on the next birthday of the licensee occurring two years after the date of application.

Section 21. Records to be kept by the Department.

1. Before issuing any original or renewal of license, the Department shall examine the applicant's record for information concerning conviction of traffic violations and involvement in traffic accidents.
2. The Department shall not issue or renew a license when, in its opinion, the applicant's record indicates that issuance of a renewal of his license would be inimical to the public safety.
- Section 22. Authority of Department to suspend or revoke a license.
 1. A failure or refusal to submit a report of any accident in which he was involved as a driver provides a grounds for hearing and possible suspension of license.
 2. Two convictions on traffic law violations occurring within a twelve month period constitutes grounds for hearing and possible suspension of a provisional license.
- Section 24. Automatic suspension of license.
 1. The first suspension based on a DWI or similar-type conviction shall be for a period of 12 months.
 2. Any subsequent suspension on the basis of a DWI or similar-type conviction will be for a period of 18 months.
 3. The Department is required to establish and develop a program of rehabilitation for those drivers whose licenses have been suspended or revoked or are subject to suspension or revocation.
 4. A licensee may be required to attend an education and training program as a condition to the reinstatement of a suspended license or the issuance of a new license to a person whose prior privilege has been revoked.

Section 30A. Revoking licenses of needy blind.

1. The Department of Public Welfare is required to supply the DPS with the names of those persons who apply for or receive assistance to the needy blind.
2. The Department of Public Safety shall revoke the license of every person whose name appears on such list supplied by the Welfare Department.

Section 34. Driving while license suspended or revoked.

1. All persons who are convicted on the charge of driving while license suspended or revoked shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 and shall be imprisoned not less than 72 hours nor more than six months.

Section 44A. Forging or counterfeiting driver licenses and other instruments.

1. Any person who shall print, engrave, copy, photograph, make, issue, sell or circulate, or who shall possess or have in his possession with intent to use any counterfeit driver license, driver license form, stamp, permit, official signature, certificate, or any other instrument which is not officially produced by an officially designated agency shall be guilty of a felony and upon conviction shall be punished by confinement in the state penitentiary for a

Long Time Minister "Would Rather Die in Pulpit"

Children of Rev. J. H. Hamblen Gather for Reunion

(Editor's note: The following article was taken from a recent issue of the Abilene Reporter-News. The subject of the article, Rev. J. H. Hamblen, is a former Methodist pastor here.)

Snyder—The congregation overflowed the seats to sit on the floor in rapt attention. Even the tiny ones were quiet and awe-filled as the emotion-filled voice of the preacher filled the air.

"We'll never be like this again," Rev. J. H. Hamblen of Abilene told his descendants gathered in the homes of the John Hamblens in Snyder to honor their father who, a decade ago—upon hearing his retirement as a minister in the Methodist Church—started a movement to take the creeping modernity out of the church and founded the Evangelical Methodist Church.

The movement has spread nationwide in the years since, and at 89, Rev. Hamblen is the General Superintendent Emeritus of the Evangelical Methodist Church. But he isn't a preacher emeritus as he proved by the two sermons he delivered to a captive audience during the two-day reunion that brought some of his descendants together for the first time and some for the last time.

"The doctor told me to give up preaching, that it was too emotional and I could die in the pulpit; but rest assured there is nowhere I would rather die," floated through the house the accompaniment of sniffs and the wiping of many eyes as he urged them to be Christians always.

And, after he had prayed, a voice lifted in "Till We Meet . . ." joined by other voices and sobbing, stopped by a voice insisting this was no funeral song and this was no funeral.

Services Required by Medicare Added to Local Hospital

County Judge Leslie Thomas has announced that the following new services required by Medicare, have been added to the local hospital:

1. A consulting record librarian, Mrs. Rose Gee of Wichita Falls, comes to the hospital the second Thursday of each month to work with the office force as a consultant furnishing information and advice as to the proper manner of filing and preserving hospital records, and furnishes "job description" for the department.

2. A laboratory consultant, Dr. Eleanor Irwine, also of Wichita Falls, comes once each month and works with and offers advice and assistance to the local lab technicians, checks the work done in the lab the previous month, provides "frozen section" service to the local hospital on the days she is here without any additional charge to the patient which means that on elective surgery, this service can be performed here in the local laboratory on the days when Dr. Irwine is here.

3. A food and dietetic consultant, Mrs. Carmen Welch, spends eight hours each month working with the workers in the food department of the local hospital, furnishing advice, job descriptions, conducting an in-service training program, writing menus, etc.

The three above are paid services.

4. In addition, a pharmacy consultant, Fred Youree, meets with the hospital administrators and doctor once each three months as a consultant. Mr. Youree makes no charge for his services to the hospital.

A new piano was also purchased and the center aisle and pulpit area were carpeted. Refrigerated air and central heat were also added to the auditorium.
A suite of offices was completed in 1962. This made available a pastor's study and church office. A new financial record system was also installed at that time. New office equipment at the Seminole church included ample storage cabinets and a new electric mimeograph machine.
A visual aids library was completed. The equipment includes a 16mm sound projector, a filmstrip and slide projector, projector screen and approximately 45 sets of filmstrips.
