The Paris District Supervisor for the Texas Liquor Control Board, Sherman McBeath, has been named Wichita Falls supervisor for the board and will assume his duties there late this month.

Mr. McBeath is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McBeath of Thalia, and he is a former Foard County Sheriff.

McBeath, who has been Paris district supervisor since March, 1953, will be returning "home." He is a former Liquor Control Board inspector in Wichita Falls. An ex-Marine, McBeath served during World War II and the Korean conflict. He has been with the Texas Liquor Control Board for ten years.

McBeath's service at Paris has drawn praise from numerous quarters. One particularly noteworthy matter was McBeath's work in the arrest and ultimate conviction of John Harrison (Tot) Davidson, Choctaw County constable who was convicted on 12 charges of non-tax-paid violations. Davidson was sentenced to six years and fined \$12,000.

The McBeaths will move to Wichita Falls on July 27.

Lions Elect International President



Jorge Bird of San Juan, Puerto Rico, was elected President of Lions International at the Association's Golden Anniversary Convention in Chicago, July 5-8. Serving as the 51st President during the Golden Anniversary Year, Mr. Bird heads the world's largest service club organization with 835,000 members in 21,400 clubs located in 137 countries and geographical areas.

Lions International is best known for its aid to the blind, sight conservation activities, youth programs and its many community service projects. "Better World Understanding Through Lionism," and development of a stronger friendship between North and South America are the goals of Bird's program for his 1967-68 Presidential Year.

Foard County farmers are being invited to attend a stubble mulch demonstration and field day on Thursday, August 3. The demonstration and field day is being sponsored by the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District. John McAllister, head of the local SCS office, made the announcement of the stubble mulch demonstration and urged Foard County farmers to attend.

The field day and demonstration will be held on the Clarence Davis farm, which is located six miles north of the Pease River bridge in Hardeman County. The farm adjoins the highway on the east side of the road.

C. E. Van Doren will speak at the stubble mulch field day. He is the assistant to the branch chief of the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland and has been involved in stubble mulch research for many years.

Mr. McAllister says that this is the first stubble mulch demonstration in this immediate area. He listed a number of the advantages of stubble mulching, some of which are: reduces wind and water erosion, increases yields, maintains or improves the physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil, reduces the rate of decline of soil organic matter, reduces compaction caused by rain drops striking the soil surface.

Every person, farmer and non-farmer alike, who is interested in soil conservation, is invited to attend.

The date is Thursday, August 3, with starting time for the demonstration being 9:30 a. m.

Rain Wednesday of Last Week Totaled 4.89 Inches

Official total of the rain which fell in Crowell last Wednesday was 4.89 inches by the government gauge.

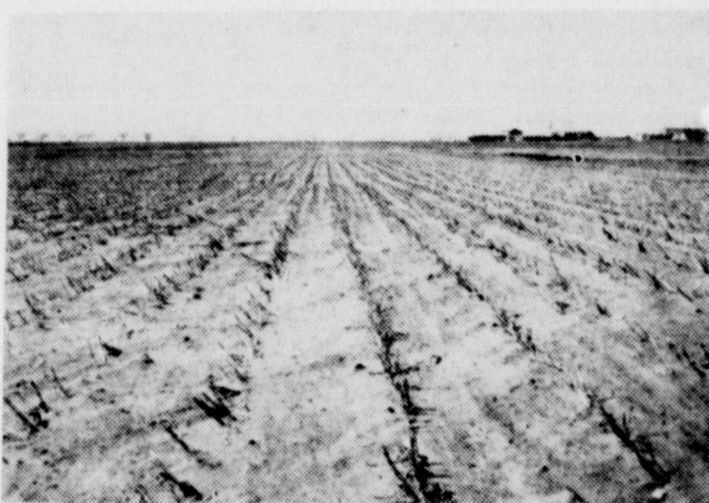

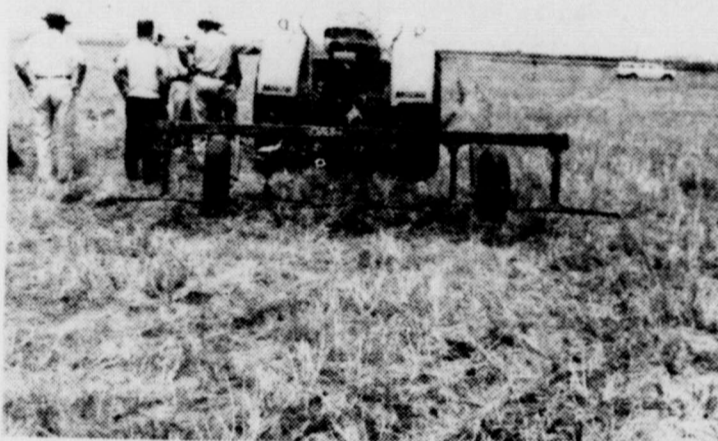
Some Advantages of Stubble Mulching:

1. Reduces wind and water erosion.
2. Reduces runoff and so increases water intake by the soil.
3. Eliminates the need for chiseling to control wind erosion.
4. Increases yields (at Bushland, Texas, stubble mulched land produced 2 bushels more wheat per acre than one-wayed land over a 14-year period.)
5. Maintains or improves the physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil.
6. Reduces the rate of decline of soil organic matter.
7. Crop residue left on the soil surface catches snow and protects young seedlings.
8. Reduces compaction caused by rain drops striking the soil surface. Crop residue left on the soil surface provides a cushion against the force of falling rain drops.

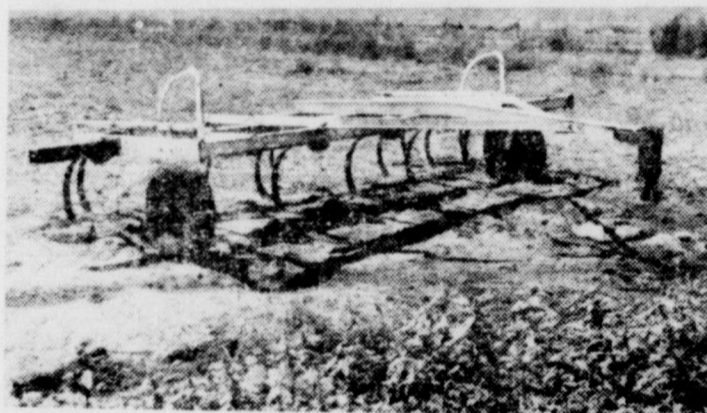

Land left unprotected is susceptible to both wind and water erosion. Many tons of valuable top soil are lost each year by wind and water erosion.



Pictured above is a rear view of a stubble mulch plow. This plow mulches the wheat stubble with the large sweeps in evidence in this photo. This piece of equipment will leave about 90 per cent of the crop residue on the soil surface.



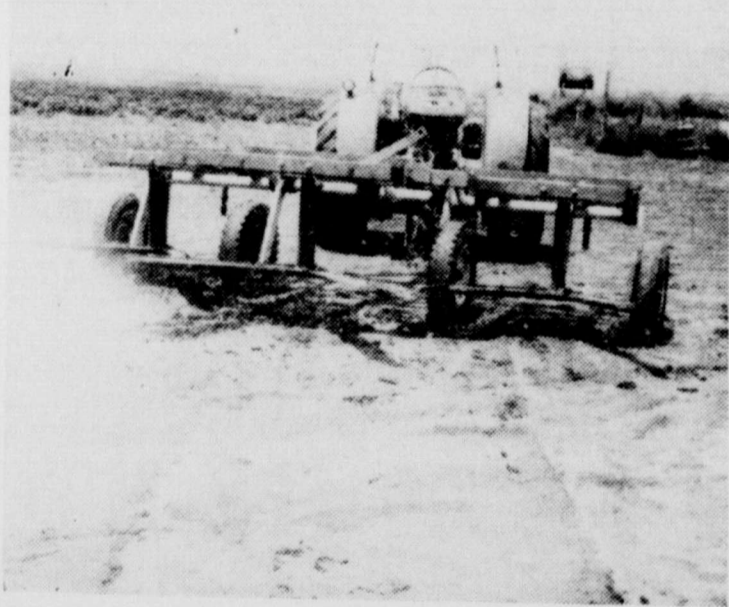
This photo shows a chisel plow equipped with 14-inch sweeps. This is probably the most common implement used in Foard County for stubble mulch farming.



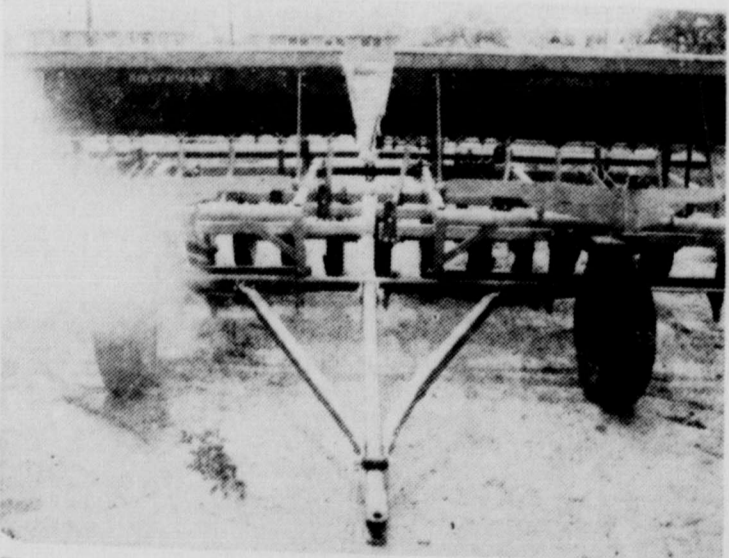
Notice the amount of wheat residue left on the soil surface by this stubble mulch plow.



This type of stubble mulch equipment uses only one large sweep to accomplish its purpose.



This plow uses three sweeps. Both side sweeps are five feet wide and the middle sweep is 16 feet wide.

Cotton Insects
Increasing in Area

Boll weevil and bollworm populations have increased in many area fields, according to Emory P. Boring, area entomologist with the Extension Service, in his weekly Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Report.

Mr. Boring said fleahoppers also continue to remain heavy in counties where cotton is in the first three weeks fruiting. Mr. Boring's summation of the cotton insect situation in the 32-county Rolling Plains area appears something like this:

Fleahoppers — Heavy infestations observed in fields in Hardeman, Wilbarger and Mitchell Counties. Somewhat lighter infestations found in Foard, Nolan, Scurry, Wichita and Young Counties.

Boll Weevils — Heavy infestations ranging from 131 to 262 weevils per acre found in Jones, Stonewall, Young, Wilbarger and Mitchell Counties. Lighter infestations in Mitchell, Wichita, Childress and Knox Counties.

Bollworms — Heavy damage observed in Wilbarger, Jones, Mitchell and Scurry Counties. Light medium damage from bollworms found in other area fields.

Cabbage loopers — Found feeding on cotton plant leaves in Wilbarger and Wichita counties. Yellow striped armyworms — Found feeding on leaves in Wilbarger and Wichita Counties. Garden webworms — Reported causing damage in Childress County. Darling beetles — Have caused damage in Young County fields. Grasshoppers — Continue to damage cotton in Hardeman and Hall Counties.

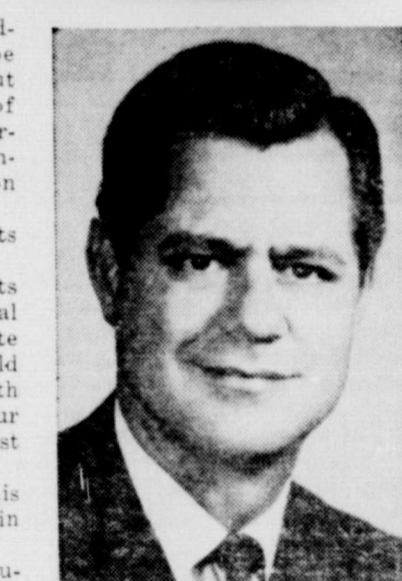

Austin, Tex.—Newspaper readers throughout Texas soon will be seeing long columns of type about important issues as Secretary of State John Hill begins to advertise the six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 11.

Fourteen additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot. Eight of the 20 amendments are of interest mainly to special groups (e.g. legislators or state employees.) Eight others would provide local governments with new powers or duties. Only four of the group directly affect most Texans.

Amendments to be voted on this year will appear on the ballot in this order:

• No. 1, House Joint Resolution 3, to permit counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing income in specified amounts among separate funds for earmarked purposes as is now required.

• No. 2, HJR 37, allowing cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.

• No. 3, HJR 17, reviving the veterans land program and authorizing a total of 3400,000,000 in bonds to finance continued purchase of farm and ranch land by veterans, including those who have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.

• No. 4, HJR 6, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

• No. 5, HJR 12, authorizing a \$75,000,000 state revenue bond issue for the development of state parks and recreational areas. Bonds are expected to be financed by a small admission fee.

• No. 6, HJR 27, permitting state officers and employees to hold non-elective positions under the state or U. S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state might benefit.

That's all for '67. Top interest in these amendments doubtless will center on the park bond proposal and the veterans land amendment. Hospital mental health and mental retardation groups will emphasize the importance of Amendment No. 2 to the new community center approach of treating mental patients close to home.

ed by parks, recreational and outdoor groups—to put over the bond issue.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 to state bonds previously authorized and through which 35,300 veterans have purchased farm and ranch properties at low interest rates spread over a 40-year period.

This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The program was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956. Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at election in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Proponents emphasize that, while thousands of veterans have benefited from the program, it has cost the state no money and actually has turned a profit of \$2,500,000 a year while providing an expanded land market.

Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plenty of time to participate. Some also contend that "cheap money" invites purchases of land not needed, and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment No. 2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within existing districts would be authorized to do so unless statutes creating the districts expressly prohibit.

An attorney general's opinion held that the constitution does not allow political subdivisions within the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital service. Under the ruling, cities and counties located in such districts were restricted from participating in establishment of community health centers. Therefore, only hospital districts could establish such centers, a key part of the mental health program.

Amendments Nos. 3, 4 and 5 are self explanatory and apparently non-controversial. Amendment No. 6 is aimed primarily at permitting educators, who are paid from state funds, to serve on federal advisory boards.

Social Security Reports Due by July 31

Did you pay a household worker a total of \$50 or more during April, May and June? If so, a social security tax report is due by July 31, according to Edwin S. Draughton, manager of social security in Vernon.

All housekeepers, cooks, maids, babysitters, and other household employees are covered under the social security program, Mr. Draughton stated. Anyone paying such a person \$50 or more in cash in a calendar quarter must file a tax report with Internal Revenue Service. An envelope Form 942 is available at any social security or Internal Revenue Service office for reporting the earnings.

Each employer is responsible for paying both the 4.4 per cent deducted from all earnings of the employee up to \$6,600 and the matching 4.4 per cent paid by the employer. All tax reports for the quarter ending June 30 must be submitted by July 31.

It is of great importance to the employee that these returns be filed. The quarterly reports give the worker credit under social security which he needs to receive retirement benefits or disability payments. Since medicare is now in effect, these reports are even more important because beginning next year, workers must have some coverage under social security to be eligible for hospital and medical insurance protection.

In addition to domestic employees, Mr. Draughton also reminded other employers that their regular quarterly reports are due by July 31 and that there is a penalty for late filing.
