



Stubble Mulch Field Day to Be Held at Clarence Davis Farm starting at 9:30 a.m., Thursday, August 3.

The Davis farm is located 6 miles north of Pease River on the east side of the road.

### Some Advantages of Stubble Mulching:


- 1. Reduces wind and water erosion.
- 2. Reduces runoff and so increases water intake by the soil.
- 3. Eliminates the need for chiseling to control wind erosion.
- Increases yields (at Bushland, Texas, stubble mulched land produced 2 bushels more wheat per acre than one-wayed land over a 14year period.)
- 5. Maintains or improves the physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil.
- 6. Reduces the rate of decline of soil organic matter.
- Crop residue left on the soil surface catches snow and protects young seedlings.
- 8. Reduces compaction caused by rain drops striking the soil surface. Crop residue left on the soil surface provides a cushion against the force of falling rain drops.



Notice the amount of wheat residue left on the soil surface by this stubble mulch plow.




This type of stubble mulch equipment uses only one large sweep to accomplish its purpose.



## The Living Gift


Blood-the living gift which only one human can give another-has helped save many lives in Foard County.

Because our citizens donate blood through the Red Cross program, our hospital has blood available for those who may need it.

Whole blood, however, has a useful life of only 21 days. After that it is no longer good for transfusion although it can be made into important derivatives.

Blood donations tend to slack off during the holiday period, yet need is inclined to increase because of a higher accident date both on the highway and in the home. Certain kinds of chronic ailments-bleeding ulcers, for example-the treatment of which demands blood transfusions also seem to take a jump during the summer vacation season.

With those things in mind, Foard County residents would do well to make a date to visit the Red Cross Blood Center, or mark the date on their calendars as the day when the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in town. It will be at the Community Center on August 4.
