Critical of Waste in Colleges, Universities

John W. Gilbaugh, former Dean of San Jose State and now professor of education at San Jose State has published a booklet which is critical of waste in colleges and universities. Among Professor Gilbaugh's contentions are: Professors are being forced into research and nonteaching services; instruction is being done by undergraduates and not by the "names" who are listed as professors of classes; there is excessive educational inbreeding; the regents and trustees are not taking sufficient control and are permitting faculties to select presidents. All of these things, and many others, Professor Gilbaugh contends, are leading colleges and universities to the day when graduates will have degrees but no education.
