## Drivers License School Will Be Held In Crowell Beginning September 11

The Foard County News and the Foard County Sheriff's Department are sponsoring a Drivers License School opening the 11th of September in the community center in Crowell with instructors from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

This newspaper and the sheriff's department requested the school from the Department of Public Safety after the phenomenal success of similar courses of instruction held throughout the state.

The school will be taught in a manner to assist those persons who can neither read nor write and is open to anyone in the area wishing to obtain a Texas drivers license or better their knowledge of the rules of the road. Many of the new laws passed by the legislature will be explained, and many of the people who will be required to be re-examined for renewal of their drivers license, this school will be invaluable.

Opening Sept. 11, classes will be Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights from 7:30 p. m. until 10:30 p. m., at no cost to the student.

## Crowell Public Schools Begin New Term Monday with Enrollment of 514

The Crowell Public Schools began the 1967-68 school year Monday morning with a total enrollment of 514—354 in the elementary school and 160 in the high school. Last year, the elementary

school had a first-day enrollment of 354 and high school had 166, according to Supt. Henry Black, who added that additional students will be enrolled during this week.

Former students who have enrolled include Paul Stapp, who attended Waco High School last year; and Linda Sparkman, who attended Vernon High School last year.

Supt. Black said there are 44 students in each of the freshmen and sophomore classes, and 36 in each of the junior and senior classes.

**Mrs. Marie Hofmann, Title I remedial reading teacher for grades 1-4 in the Crowell School, attended a reading workshop in the Childress Junior High School on August 21-22.** Mrs. Earline Schoenfeld, a first grade teacher in Cleburne, conducted the workshop.

Mrs. Schoenfeld explained the use of phonetic keys to reading for grades 1, 2 and 3, and the keys to independence in reading for grades 4, 5 and 6. She then demonstrated the actual classroom techniques of phonetic instruction at each grade level; also correlating it with spelling, writing, arithmetic, social studies, health, science, art and music.

The workshop was sponsored by the Economy Company, publishers of Phonetic Keys to Reading and Keys to Independence in Reading.

## W. B. Fitzgerald, Long-Time Baptist Preacher, Died

**Funeral Services Held in Crowell Tuesday Afternoon**

Rev. W. B. Fitzgerald, 70, long-time Baptist pastor of Foard County Churches, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Saturday.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church in Crowell at 2 p. m. Tuesday conducted by Dr. D. C. Squyres of Riverside, Calif.; Rev. Bud Edmonds, pastor of the Dean Baptist Church; Rev. John Berrier, pastor of the Byers First Baptist Church; and Rev. John Gillispie, local Baptist pastor.

Interment with Masonic graveside rites was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pall bearers were Mike Gamble, Otis Johnson, Mike Price, Billy Johnson, Billy Hammonds and Charles Howard Bursley.

Rev. Fitzgerald was ordained June 14, 1925, at Seagraves, and had served churches in Happy, Center, Olton, Crowell, Crosbyton, Austin and Thalia in Texas and Arlington, Calif. He served a combined total of 19 years at Thalia and Crowell.

Rev. and Mrs. Fitzgerald, since his retirement six years ago from the Thalia Baptist Church, had made their home in Dean. In addition to serving the Thalia Baptist Church, he was a long-time pastor of the First Baptist Church in Crowell in the late 30's and early 40's and was pastor of the local church when it was destroyed by the tornado in 1942.

Born at Stephenville November 5, 1896, Rev. Fitzgerald was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the Thalia Lodge No. 666, AF&AM.

Rev. Fitzgerald attended Wayland Baptist College, Plainview.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Bernice of Lafayette, La., Jack of Tulsa, Okla., and Robert Eugene of El Paso; a stepson, Jimmy Thaxton of Waco; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Barbara Fulton of Fayetteville, N. C.; five brothers, E. D. Fitzgerald and P. C. Fitzgerald, both of Midland; Ordie Fitzgerald of Modesto, Calif.; W. A. Fitzgerald of Neosho, Mo., and E. H. Fitzgerald of Fresno, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Carrie Jo Wilson of San Francisco, Calif., and Mrs. Hattie Bilbrey of Blanket, Texas; nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

## FOARD FARMERS MEET WITH STATE A. S. C. S.

Representatives of Foard County Farmers Union met with the state ASCS committee at A&M University on August 24 in an effort to obtain higher 1968 cotton and wheat projected yields for local producers. The group was armed with farm storage data.

Making the trip to College Station were Kenneth Halbert,

president; Warren Haynie, vice president; Newell Hofmann and Monroe Karcher.

The state committee advised the local delegation that the projected yields were determined by report forms of the past five years' yields which are collected by the United States Department of Agriculture Statistical Reporting Service.

An appointment was arranged for the local group to confer with the reporting service officials in Austin. In the second interview, the reporting service personnel stated that out of 80 statistical forms mailed to Foard County farmers, 30 were returned in the last survey.

Should a similar farm program be enacted, local farmers are urged to cooperate by filling out the forms accurately.

The local Farmers Union feels that area producers would be benefited in their income if a true reflection of the county's production could be substantiated.

## Dove Season to Open Friday

The 1967 mourning dove season will get underway in Foard County at 1 p. m. (DST) Friday, September 1.

The supply of birds is estimated to be about average, with best hunting prospects probably being grain fields that have been cut but not yet plowed up. Water, normally a factor in dove migration, is not a problem this fall since recent rains have provided an adequate supply.

Previously, hunters could begin shooting at noon, but federal authorities who set regulations on migratory game birds, decided on the 1 p. m. start this season.

Shooting ends at sunset with a daily bag limit of 12 birds.

## Jack Hightower Named to Interim Senate Committee

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith this week named Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to serve on the special Interim Oyster and Shellfish Committee. Created by House Concurrent Resolution 117, adopted during the recent legislative session, the committee will study the feasibility of participation by the State of Texas on a matching fund basis with appropriate federal agencies to establish a pilot plant for the depuration of oysters and other shellfish in Texas waters.

Hightower is presently chairman of the Senate's standing committee on Game and Fish. An attorney, Hightower began serving in the Senate in 1965, and was a member of the House of Representatives in 1953-54.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as in now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in such Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated for the purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation; and such purchase shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, on such terms of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, at such prices and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as in now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

## Forty-Five Traffic Deaths Forecast for Labor Day Holiday

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported this week that the DPS had ordered a number of radar sets to be placed in every patrol district over the state to aid in enforcing the highway speed laws.

Use of the sets will enable the department to secure a higher degree of compliance with the speed law. With the purchase of the new equipment, authorized by the Public Safety Commission, the Department will continue its long-standing policy of filing charges in every case where there is a clear, substantial violation of the speed law.

The radar units will be mounted in highway patrol cars and are designed so that only one patrolman is needed for operation. Accurate readings can be obtained on vehicles at distances of up to 1,500 feet. All highway patrolmen are trained in radar operation.

"Accident statistics indicate," Garrison said, "that speed too fast for conditions is the most prevalent violation contributing to accidents in Texas. It figured in 41 per cent of the fatal accidents reported during 1966, and 29 per cent of the non-fatal accidents."

Information obtained from studies conducted by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads indicate that a driver is 20 per cent more likely to be involved in an accident at 70 miles per hour than when driving 65 miles per hour. He is 50 per cent more likely to be involved in an accident at 75 miles per hour, and 90 per cent more likely to be involved at speeds of 80 miles per hour.

"The use of the radar sets should enable us to patrol the highways more effectively," Garrison stated. "It is our hope that all drivers will willingly comply with the maximum speed limits of the state, but there will be those who refuse to do so. Our efforts will be directed toward apprehending these offenders in order to provide protection for the motorist who does comply with the law."

Since early 1965 these young people have been going to an Internal Revenue Service school. ### Two Minutes With the Bible

The Gift of Righteousness

St. Paul, in his epistle to the Romans, refers to those who receive "the abundance of grace" and "the gift of righteousness" (Rom. 5:17) which God in love bestows upon all who trust in His Son for salvation.

The Bible declares that no man can ever stand uncondemned in the sight of God, the Judge of all, unless he receives righteousness as the gift of God's grace.

Quoting from two Psalms, the apostle says in Romans 3:10: "It is written, There is none righteous, no, not one."

This is why Paul pities those who continued to go about "to establish their own righteousness" (Romans 10:3). He knew that their struggle was utterly futile—that they needed to be saved (see verse 1).

Let us thank God that the Lord Jesus Christ took the condemnation and judgment of our sins upon Himself at Calvary so that righteousness might be bestowed upon us by grace through faith. Regarding Abraham's justification before God, the apostle says: "What saith the Scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted to him for righteousness" (Romans 4:3).

Abraham's justification, of course, was based on the fact that Christ was to die for sin, but Christ's death is now past; it is an historical fact. Thus righteousness is now proclaimed through Christ and offered to all as a gift.

"While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). "God hath made Him to be sin for us . . . that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor. 5:21).

But you must receive this righteousness as a gift, for "to him that worketh not, but believeth on Him that justified the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness" (Romans 4:5).

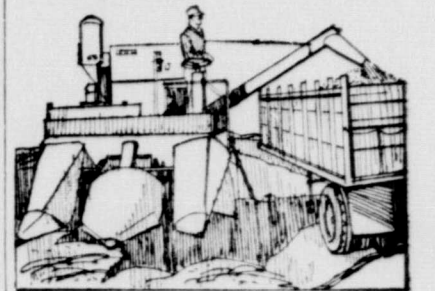

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, not to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

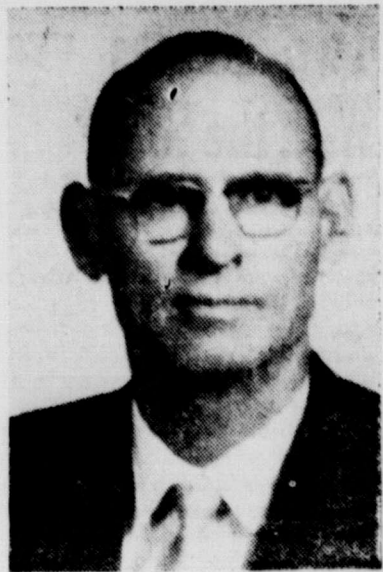

### New Trick Given for Cooling Hot Engine

You are driving up a long grade on a hot day maybe pulling a

trailer, maybe behind a slow truck, and the red light flashes when the radiator boils. At this point you have two choices, says County Agent Joe Burkett.

1. Stop beside the road. With no more forward motion, the radiator boils harder. You may get scalded if you are not careful. The sun blisters you as you stand by the car, and you have a problem getting water. The stop may take 20 minutes or so.

2. Try the easy way. At the first red flash, open all windows wide, turn the heater on HIGH and turn the blower on HIGH as well. For about one minute ev-

eryone will be uncomfortable, but the temperature will fall back to safe driving condition immediately. The short discomfort is far better than nearly the same heat for the long roadside stop. Besides, maybe the traffic and road conditions will prevent you from pulling over anyway.

Use this technique with caution and make a radiator and coolant check as soon as practical, for it is possible that a broken hose may cause overheating without flashing the light as it should, Burkett added.

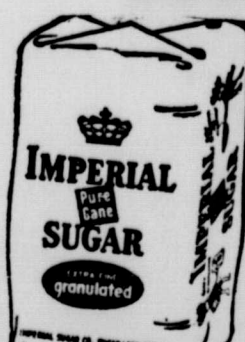

**Mrs. Sam Russell Honored at Dinner on 94th Birthday**

(Editor's note: The following article was written by Dick West, editorial editor of the Dallas Morning News and appeared in the Sunday edition of that paper.)

He won't get a Pulitzer, but no piece of prose on the riots packs the punch of one written recently for the San Diego Union by Archie Moore, the retired Negro boxing champion.

"The devil is at work in America," wrote Archie.

"Snipers and looters, white or black, deserve no mercy.

"I was born in a ghetto, but I refused to stay there. I am a Negro, and proud to be one. I am also an American, and I'm proud of that.

"Today's young people think they have a hard lot. They should have been around in the '30s when I was coming up in St. Louis. We had no way to go, but a lot of us made it.

"I became light heavyweight champion of the world. A kid down the block, Clark Terry, became one of the most famous jazz musicians in the world. There were doctors, lawyers and chiefs who came out of that ghetto."

Now, here's the best part:

"We made it because we had a goal, and we were willing to work for it. Don't talk to me of your 'guaranteed national income.' Any fool knows that this is insanity.

"Do we bring those who worked to get ahead down to the level of those who never gave a damn?"

"The world owes nobody—black or white—a living. God helps the man who helps himself."

There is more to it, but we picked out for quotation that part about the Great Depression for a particular purpose.

The depression (1930-41) was horrible, but those who experienced it came out with lasting compensations.

They learned, first, that even a penny was precious. I well remember my father walking eight blocks to save 2 cents on an armload of turnip greens—one grocer wanted 11, the other 9. I thought of him, rest his soul, when I read recently that a stenographer in New York City was getting \$8,000 a year for teaching ballet in the Job Corps as a sideline.

Second, those who experienced the depression learned the value of a job—any kind of a job. You grabbed whatever came along, because you had to. There was no such thing as the present-day luxury of waiting for the most desirable.

The third compensation—well, let Archie Moore say it again: "We made it because we had a goal, and we were willing to work for it."

You learned that getting ahead demanded courage, work, sacrifice and guts. It was a way of life.

John Connally left a tenant farm, hitch-hiked to Austin and worked his way through the University of Texas selling chewing gum and chopping weeds along narrow hot-topped highways.

Allan Shivers sold shoes.

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade thumbed rides from his home town of Rockwall to Austin to study law and enrolled in the university with 50 cents in his pocket.

Columnist Paul Crume washed dishes, and when he got down to his last quarter, "Dr. Walter Webb, who took an interest in me, would come up with some idea that carried me through."

In 1934, it was estimated that 5,000 students on the campus never ate breakfast, although you could get cereal and coffee for a dime.

Archie Moore says the devil is at work in America today.

The real devil, aside from the Red devil, is a decay in the American spirit.

Too many of us expect something for nothing. We demand this and that, when actually we have no right to demand anything

**Highway Patrol to Receive More Radar Sets**

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced this week that its statistical services has estimated that 45 persons will lose their lives in traffic mishaps during the Labor Day holiday week end.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, pointed out that this is the last holiday of the summer and thousands of motorists will be crisscrossing the state in their travels.

"This increased travel increases the chances of an individual being involved in an accident," Garrison said. "We urge every motorist to exercise caution and to stay alert.

"There is always the possibility that the estimate of 45 deaths for this period can be proved to be too high, but only if all drivers put forth every effort toward avoiding traffic accidents."

"The Department of Public Safety will continue in its all-out effort to curb traffic accidents and to stop reckless and illegal driving on the highways," Garrison said. Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the highway patrol enforcement action.

**Concentrated Attack**

A concentrated attack on costly and thoughtless federal fiscal policies was delivered on the floor of the U. S. House of Representatives by Congressman Wendell Wyatt of Oregon. He pointed out that, since 1960, the U. S. population has grown 10 per cent; total federal spending has increased 83 per cent; nondefense spending has increased 97 per cent; the number of federal employees has increased 25 per cent; the cost for federal payrolls has increased 75 per cent and the federal government has rolled up a deficit of \$50 billion. Congressman Wyatt stated that if the government does not return to a financially responsible outlook immediately we could easily have a \$300 billion annual budget at the taxpayers' expense.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

## Two New Directors for Foard County E. O. A. C. Elected Thursday Night

At a public meeting of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation held at the community center in Crowell last Thursday night, two new directors for Foard County were elected: Mrs. May Belle Wallace and Monroe Karpner. These two will replace Mrs. Jessie Morris and Cecil Carpenter, who had completed one-year terms on the board.

Other directors from this county include Ernest Tucker, Jimmy Quintero, Robert Kincaid, Mike Bird and Leslie Thomas.

Mrs. Don Wilkins, who is secretary of the EOAC office located in Crowell and which serves the four-county area of Foard, Cottle, Hardeman and Wilbarger, presided at the meeting. Mrs. Wilkins told the group of some of the projects which have been started during the past year.

She listed two head start programs, one at Harold and one at

Northside. Appropriations were \$4,045 for Harold and \$3,714 for Northside.

The four-county office is located in Crowell, and the three full-time employees are Don Ross Malone, executive director; Mrs. Wilkins, secretary; and Mrs. Bill Neal of Quanah, field coordinator. The administrative operating grant for this office for the past year was \$30,063.

Mrs. Wilkins stated that the Lockett School's head start program is scheduled to begin on September 10 with Mrs. Ed Lehman Jr. as teacher.

In her report of the year's activities, Mrs. Wilkins stressed the Neighborhood Centers which have been established in all of the four counties with the exception of Foard. The center at Quanah is doing an excellent work, Mrs. Wilkins said, and is considered to be one of the outstanding neighborhood centers in the state. The Ver-

non center has a number of programs started, and many more planned; and the Paducah program, according to Mrs. Wilkins, is off to a good start of serving the people of that area. She added that an adult education class to teach English to Spanish speaking people is planned for Chillicothe.

An application for planned parenthood facilities in the four counties is being worked on by Mrs. Neal.

Mrs. Wilkins told the group about proposed vocational training schools which are hoped can be established under the Manpower Development Act. The four suggested schools are auto mechanics, auto body repairmen, household and small appliance re-

pairmen, and clerk-typist. The people enrolled would train in classes for 40 hours a week, and could work elsewhere for 20 hours a week. If the person enrolled is head of a household, he or she would receive \$32.00 a week plus \$5.00 for each dependent while in the school which will last about 6 months. The trainees must be over 18 years of age. Remedial education is also planned to be offered in conjunction with the courses.

Another topic discussed by Mrs. Wilkins was Operation Mainstream a community betterment program, which includes any phase of city beautification and improvement, such as care of the cemetery, city park, streets and cleaning of unsightly lots. If the program is approved and funds are received, the EOAC hopes to employ 50 or 60 people in the four-county area in this program.

A discussion among the group attending the meeting was held relative to the establishment of a neighborhood center in Crowell. An offer of the donation of the old American Legion hall was made for use as a building to house the neighborhood center, and it was suggested it be moved from its present location on South Main Street to the colored section of town.

Mrs. Wilkins said that the summer recreation programs conducted in Foard County, consisting of arts and crafts, band and recreation, were led by Crowell school personnel, and was operated in conjunction with a grant to the Palo Pinto OEO and the local OEO. She said the organization had only four days in which to make plans for the summer programs.

She added that the facilities are ready at the community center for the operation of the licensed vocational nursing program, for which application has been made. She said the application is now before the federal review board. The school, if approved, will train 20 persons for a 1-year period. Plans are for Mrs. Edith Roark to be the instructor and Mrs. Alene Williams to be her assistant.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."
