PROTECTIVE HEADGEAR REQUIRED BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 1968-All motorcyclists and their passengers will be required by law to wear safety approved headgear whenever riding a motorcycle after the first of January. Headgear meeting Texas Department of Public Safety standards must bear a manufacturer's identification sticker on the back and reflective material on the sides (as shown in the photographs). A list of approved headgear may be seen at any police department, sheriff's office, Department of Public Safety office, or stores retailing motorcycle headgear.

## Screwworms Pose Threat to Foard Livestock Men

The fall screwworm outbreakaided by rains, winds and floods triggered by Hurricanes Beulah and Fern in the Southwest United States and Northern Mexico-continued to threaten Texas livestock producers, says County Agent Joe

Many of the cases are situated in the Hill Country-Edwards Plateau area of the state and southward and eastward in the overwintering areas of Texas, posing an additional threat to the entire Screwworm Eradication Program, the county agent emphasized. This means trouble ahead for next year," he added.

Still another factor of major concern, Burkett stressed, is the possibility that Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program ofsent in the same envelope. Spears ficials at Mission may not know just how serious the situation is "plot" to keep the registrations in the southern tip of the state, where high waters, a month after Hurricane Beulah, still make it mpossible for many ranchers to heck their herds for screwworms.




