> The Act empowers the Commission to adjudicate water rights in the State. Adjudication of a stream may be initiated upon the Commission's own motion, by a petition signed by ten or more claimants of water rights on the same stream, or upon a petition by the Texas Water Development

> The new law contains detailed procedures to insure due process and notice. Judicial review of the Commission's final determina-

tion is mandatory. The eventual determination in every water right adjudication will be final. The Water Rights Adjudication Act provides, "Except for domestic and livestock purposes or rights subsequently acquired by permit, no water rights shall be recognized in the adjudicated stream or segment un-

less included in the final decree." Upon final determination of water rights on a stream, the Commission will issue a certificate of adjudication to each person found

to have a water right. All permits for unappropriated water granted after a stream is adjudicated will be administered in the same manner as an adjudi-

cated right. During drought periods, especially on large streams, it will be necessary to closely supervise all rights. The Commission will divide the State into water divisions and appoint watermasters to regulate stream flow and water usage. Any person dissatisfied with the actions of a watermaster may appeal to the Commission and then to the courts.

The watermaster and necessary assistants will be paid by the Commission which in turn will be reimbursed by the holders of water rights.

Water users on non-adjudicated streams may enter into a written agreement with the Commission for administration of the stream flow and a special watermaster will be assigned.
